

FIGHTING SON AND SCRAPPY DAD MEET AFTER NINE YEARS

War Ended, Greatwood Sr. and Greatwood Jr. Meet; Family's Blood Shed on All Fronts.

Fighters both, of a fighting family, Buck Private F. E. Greatwood, father, and Lieutenant Hugh E. Greatwood, son, are reminiscing in Portland after nine years' separation. Both are veterans of Great Britain's armies.

Wednesday the son will leave for England to rejoin his regiment. The father is employed at Liberty temple, having been discharged from Canadian forces in June, 1919.

Greatwood, senior, came to the United States from England 25 years ago. For 20 years he owned a fruit ranch in Southern California. Five years ago he came to Portland because his wife fell in love with Oregon's climate.

FIGHTING FAMILY
Hugh, the son, went to England nine years ago, and until 1917 there attended school. Then he was commissioned a lieutenant in the 1224 Outrigger Rifles, and sent to India. But before he left he had the pleasure of a very short visit with his father. For Greatwood, senior, couldn't resist the impulse to fight that had dominated the men in his family for years and had joined the Canadian army after repeated efforts.

"Why did I fight? Because they couldn't stop me!" the father explains when asked why he volunteered though far above age.

He was in Portland when the German war started. Straightaway he made for Victoria, B. C., where he met again and again only to be rebuffed to his demand that he be allowed to fight.

Finally, in 1917, age limitations were lessened, and the father was enlisted in the medical corps. He went to England and there was transferred to the infantry.

For months he packed a gun and assaulted Germans. Through Arras, Lens, Belgium, up even into Germany his regiment went. And all the while a buck private.

DEATH AND WOUNDS
But another son, Royce Greatwood, was in the American navy and carving a niche. A brother was killed in Mesopotamia, another brother died in France, a third brother so valiantly fought that he was awarded the distinguished service order and was wounded three times, a fourth was wounded in France. And, not content with this war record, Spencer, now only 17, the youngest son of the Portland man, was musician with the Gordon Highlanders in Victoria, B. C., and because the Canadian army wouldn't accept him for service!

Needless to remark that the father of the five valiant sons and grandfather of Hugh, Royce and Spencer, was himself a distinguished soldier. He was Colonel H. F. Greatwood of the East Surrey, stationed in India.

Brothers of the Portland Greatwood: Captain H. F. Greatwood, Leicester regiment, wounded in France.

KILLED IN MESOPOTAMIA
Captain W. Greatwood, member of the very Indian regiment of which Lieutenant Hugh, the son, is now enrolled; killed in Mesopotamia, 1918.

Lieutenant Harold Greatwood, British artillery, killed in France.

Lieutenant Colonel F. W. Greatwood, D. S. O., wounded three times and veteran of Mons retreat.

Royce, another of the Portland man's sons, was wireless operator on the steamer President Lincoln, American transport, when torpedoed. He was on a life raft 14 hours before being rescued and his brother wireless operator was drowned. He is now a student at Oregon Agricultural college.

Chicago Bank Crash Costs Two Paisleys Court Fine of \$1400

Chicago, Jan. 17.—(I. N. S.)—The final chapter of the Paisley bank crash here in 1916, which cost several thousand small depositors approximately \$400,000, was written here today when a jury in Judge Hebel's court found the two brothers—James T. and Oliver F.—guilty of receiving deposits after their banks were insolvent. They were fined \$1400 each. William H. Paisley, the father, was found not guilty.

All three of the Paisleys were convicted two years ago. The brothers were sentenced to three years each in Joliet and the father to one year. The supreme court last June decided they had not had a fair trial and remanded the case for retrial.

California Chamber Protests Location Of Soldiers' Home

Sacramento, Cal., Jan. 17.—(U. P.)—Protesting against the establishment of a home for disabled soldiers in their midst, the Paso Robles chamber of commerce and board of trustees today sent a telegram to Governor William D. Stephens asking him to block the plan.

The telegram said that it had been persistently rumored that the Paso Robles Hot Springs hotel had been optioned to the federal government for the purpose of making it a home for disabled soldiers. The signers said they objected to this because the hotel was not an appropriate place for such an undertaking, that it was in the center of the city and at the junction of roads that would make it embarrassing to the "unfortunates" as well as the traveling public.

The telegram said that they had no objection to an institution in their "vicinity," but wanted it in a more appropriate place.

K. of C. Classes in Soldiers' Behalf To Open Monday

Actual class work for the free night school being held in Portland for the benefit of the ex-service men by the Knights of Columbus committee on war activities will start Monday evening.

On Thursday and Friday evenings last week the opening meetings were held and classes arranged. A total of 457 students have now registered for the work and there is still time to start in, it is announced, by registering at the back building, room 205, or by reporting for class at the time of meeting of the particular subject in mind.

A complete schedule of the 20 classes which the Knights of Columbus will maintain in its school has been announced by Principal J. P. O'Hara as follows:

Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings—7:15 to 8:15 o'clock: Auto mechanics, bookkeeping, mechanical drawing, high school mathematics, beginners' English. 8:15 to 9:15 o'clock: Auto mechanics, accounting, business English.

Tuesday and Thursday evenings—7:15 to 8:15 o'clock: Arithmetic, radio telegraphy, Spanish, stenography, penmanship, typewriting, citizenship, public speaking. 8:15 to 9:15 o'clock: Commercial law, typewriting, American history and citizenship, French.

Professional Men Keenly Interested In Dental Meeting

Anticipating a largely increased attendance of professionally interested men, officers of the Portland District Dental society have arranged a program of unusual interest for their monthly meeting, to be held Tuesday at the auditorium of the Portland hotel, where similar sessions are held on the third Tuesday of each month.

Believing "the next great step in preventive medicine will come through the dental profession," officers have sought to add interest to their regular meetings and draw to the society many Portland dentists who are not members. By lantern slides and lectures, clinics and general discussion the monthly meetings are transformed into post-graduate courses, officers aver, all leading to the big annual state meeting.

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IDAHO MEN LEASE BAY HORSE MINES IN BAKER DISTRICT

Development of Mining Properties in Grant County Has Been Marked During Year.

Baker, Jan. 17.—Mining in the Baker-Grant district took another step forward this week when P. H. Miller and Charles Brown, both well known Idaho mining men, announced that they have leased the Bay Horse properties on the Oregon side of Snake river, 10 miles below Huntington, from H. E. Holmes of Seattle and Fred M. Johnson of Baker.

The lease includes a contract to develop, and the lessees have taken an option to purchase for \$25,000. The Bay Horse is a gold and silver prospect upon which underground work has been done, but which has never been thoroughly developed. Mr. Brown and Mr. Miller say they are confident that the property can be made a substantial producer, and they plan to begin development work immediately in preparation for the shipping of ore next spring.

PROGRESS MADE IN 1919
The year just closed is claimed to have marked a new era in the Baker-Grant county mining district. Chief among the new developments during the year was the lease of the Eureka and Excelsior mine in the Cracker Creek district near Sumpter, by the Oregon-Idaho Investment company. This mine, the lessees claim, will be Oregon's greatest precious metal producer next summer, and the work of renovating and re-equipping the mill is now nearing completion.

During the fall the Highland mine near Haines was developed into a paying proposition and the shipping of high grade ore continued until lack of power compelled the plant to cease operating during the last week in December.

Dredging operations continued in the McEwen valley also until power was cut off, and next spring will usher in a revival of this phase of mining, when the Sumpter Gold Dredging company will begin operating its dredge purchased last fall from the Powder River Gold Dredging company.

MINES YIELD GOOD RETURNS
The Continental, Independence and La Bellevue mines in the Grant district are reported to be yielding large returns and T. S. Kinney, manager of the La Bellevue, has announced that four new mines will be developed next spring in the same region.

The Cornucopia mines are continuing to produce their quota of Baker county's 80 per cent share of Oregon's gold and silver output, and according to reports operations there are certain of continuing their present pace throughout 1920.

Despite the condition of the gold market the White Swan and Chicago-Virtue gold mines near Baker have entered a new phase of development, and plans are being made to renew development at the Saker gold mines during the coming summer.

The resumption of train service between Homestead and Copperfield next month is expected to stimulate production at the Iron Dyke mine near Homestead, where the main shaft is reported to have reached a depth of 455 feet and where the mill has been kept in steady operation all year. Development here has been retarded by the fire that closed the Ox-Bow tunnel on the Snake river branch of the Oregon Short line and stopped traffic, but repairs to the tunnel are nearly completed.

Drifts and cross-cuts, as well as initial underground work, are being made at the Rand-McCarthy, Copper King, River Queen, the Asurite, the Roger O'Toole, the Two Shoes, the McDougall, the Fidelity and the Farrell group, all mining claims in the vicinity of the Iron Dyke, with intentions of beginning ore shipping and milling next spring and summer, while it is thought possible that many other smaller prospects in the same neighborhood will probably be developed in the near future.

GENERAL OUTLOOK PROMISING
The general outlook for the whole district is regarded as unequalled since the original gold rush of 1870, and while it is not expected that the golden era of olden days will be repeated, the present advance of the mining industry is regarded as far more healthy and substantial. At that time rich pockets and surface deposits of gold produced great wealth but were soon exhausted. Now the development is being carried into the ground into large ore bodies.

15,000 MILES OF RIVERS PLANNED FOR NAVIGATION

Direct Water Route From Chicago to New Orleans to Result From Middle Western Plans.

Chicago, Jan. 17.—(I. N. S.)—Governor Frank O. Lowden today received from the secretary of war a permit for the construction of the Illinois waterway, which will connect up and make serviceable for water-borne commerce 15,000 miles of inland rivers in the Middle West. The project embraces the improvement of the Des Plaines and Illinois rivers.

Direct water route between Chicago and New Orleans and from the lakes to St. Paul and Minneapolis are established by the permit and when completed it will also open up water connections with Pittsburg and Ohio river points. Water commerce enthusiasts predict that the opening of the route will prove of great importance to St. Louis, Memphis, Kansas City and the Southwest.

"Its opening will be of inestimable value to farmers of the great producing states of the entire Mississippi valley and the Northwest and will mean a great saving of freight costs," said Governor Lowden today.

The cost of the work is estimated at \$20,000,000. Locks will be 600 feet long, 110 feet wide, accommodating fleets of barge boats carrying from 6000 to 8000 tons of freight.

Two Foreign Students At Eugene; 24 States, 34 Counties Listed

University of Oregon, Eugene, Jan. 17.—Students of the university come from 34 counties of Oregon and 24 states in the United States. Two foreign countries are represented. Jefferson and Lake are the only two counties at present without a representative in the student body. Multnomah leads all the counties with 351 students, Lane coming next with 257, Marion 60 and Jackson fourth with 51.

Washington state sent 66 students, California 28 and Idaho 22. Alaska and Hawaii are represented each with one student and the Philippine Islands with two. One student is registered from British Columbia and one from India.

Dr. Mayer Is Named German Ambassador To French Capital

Berlin, Jan. 17.—(I. N. S.)—Dr. Mayer, a member of the Centrist party and a lawyer of Munich, has been named German charge d'affaires at Paris. The announcement is expected soon after the appointment of Senator Smathe from Hamburg as charge d'affaires at London and Baron von Lucius, former minister to Stockholm, as ambassador to Rome.

Great Britain resumed relations with Germany at noon Friday when Lord Kilnarnock presented his credentials as charge d'affaires. He talked for an hour with the German foreign minister.

Strong Appeal Made At Moscow by Bishop

Moscow, Idaho, Jan. 17.—One of the strongest addresses heard in the Chamber of Commerce rooms in months was delivered Wednesday by Bishop Johnson of Colorado, who is touring the West in the nation-wide campaign for church extension. Rev. W. H. Bridge, rector of St. Mark's Episcopal church at Moscow, has asked the church extension fund for \$100,000 for a hotel, church and rectory, to be built here, for the accommodation of students of the University of Idaho, and Bishop Johnson came to inspect conditions here and make his report. He announced that he was well pleased with what he had seen, and with general conditions in the West.

CLACKAMAS COUNTY IS TO ORGANIZE A PUBLIC HEALTH ASSOCIATION

Meeting Called to Give Expression to Appreciation of Work of Public Nurse.

Oregon City, Jan. 17.—A meeting of people from every section of Clackamas county has been called for Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock in Oregon City for the purpose of forming an organization to support the work of the public health nurse. This organization will be called the Clackamas County Public Health association.

Five other counties in Oregon now have such associations, and they are functioning most efficiently as factors for community betterment. The plan of organization is as representative as possible, each community center in a county having at least one member on every committee of the association, and this local group of workers is headed up by a community vice president.

This week, in anticipation of the county meeting next Tuesday, nominating committees are at work in each of the seven community centers of Clackamas county making up the local tickets of officers and committee members. The reports of these seven committees will be presented at the organization meeting.

The meeting will be held in the Commercial club rooms in the Masonic temple.
