Lecturer Has Big Message—The Coningsby Dawson lecture which will be given in the Masonic Temple auditorium, February 20 will, it is expected, be attended by a smart, representative audience. His book, "Carry On," was one of the most widely read of war books. Dawson is a real personality, full of vigor, and he brings a new message. Since the war he has been on the western front making a study of reconstruction problems and the remaking of the world. He is an Englishman, a graduate of Oxford, who came to America to become an author and publisher, enlisted with the Canadian forces and was given every opportunity by the government to see the things that would give him a clear message to the people. The lecture is sponsored by a group of prominent women, who will make the proceeds a gift to the woman's building fund of the Oregon university.

Forest Expert to Speak—The work of the forest rangers and methods adopted for use in the Oregon national forests will be interestingly set forth by A. G. 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84 MOTORISTS UP FOR LAW BREAKING

Autoists Are Haled Before Rossman for Driving Without Tail Lights.

Eighty-four motorists from all walks of life were haled before Municipal Judge Rossman Saturday and charged with operating their automobiles without tail lights. In almost every case the driver pleaded guilty and was allowed to go on the promise that the light would be repaired. A few of the offenders who got "sassy" with the policemen when arrested were fined \$2.50 each.

Judge Rossman demanded in a majority of the cases that the oil lamps be replaced with electric lights. Several drivers were ordered to place an electric light on the car and return Monday with the car repaired. Sentence was continued until that time.

"Driving without a tail light causes a large number of accidents," said Lieutenant Frank Ervin. "It is a worse practice than driving without a headlight." Early this week four young men were seriously injured on the Linnton road when a machine in which they were riding struck with a truck ahead of them loaded with logs. The truck did not have a tail light.
