

High School Basketball Season to Open :: Public Golfers Laying Plans for a Clubhouse

SCHOOL HOOPERS TO START

Opening Game of Interscholastic League Will Be Played Monday on Y. M. C. A. Floor.

WHEN the Hill Military academy and the James John high school quintets trot onto the Y. M. C. A. floor Monday afternoon, followers of the Portland Interscholastic league will settle down and await the outcome of the 1919-20 basketball season. The Cadets and the Saints have the honor of opening the campaign, and from then on it will be a busy season for the nine squads until March 8, when Benson Tech. and Columbia university play the final game of the schedule.

Originally, the season was to start last Monday, but the directors met and granted a week's postponement, due to the fact that Jefferson high's squad had been all shot to pieces as a result of several cases of smallpox. As it is, Coach Harold W. Quigley is still quarantined and will not be out for a week or 10 days.

JEFF TEAM HANDICAPPED

In his absence, H. C. Clifford, who will coach the 1920 Jefferson basketball team, has been whipping the Democrats into shape, and despite the handicap of having his players suffering from vaccinated arms, he expects them to appear against Franklin high Tuesday afternoon. In the event that the players are in no shape for a grueling tussle, the contest will be postponed until a later date.

The game Monday afternoon will not be the only one for the Cadets, as the schedule calls for them to meet Benson Tech. next Friday afternoon. Hill has been set back somewhat because of the extra week of vacation on the holidays, but at that Dr. Ernest Bates, coach of the contingent, promises that his boys will be on top for the game.

HILL TEAM CHOSEN

The lineup to start against James John will be something like this: Wilton Goodrich and Edward McManus, forwards; Captain Dagg, center; Homer Hayden and Irving Day, guards; Thomas Pollock, left half; and George Wright as a relief guard. Bert Hathaway, the manager, has not donned a suit as yet, but he may find time to do so later. The Cadets do all their practicing in the school gymnasium, and so far they have had two practice games, which put them in fair shape for the opening of the league race.

Coach J. E. Kalmback, in all probability, will start Clarence Toole and Dalton Brown, left half and right half, respectively; Frank Hedges at center; Captain Harlan Hyatt and Dickie Girt at guards for James John. The lineup for the Saints is still in the making, but it is expected that the team will be in good shape for the opening of the league race.

Just who will referee has not been determined, but it will be either H. A. Goode or Dr. W. A. Fenstermacher, according to present plans. The referee, however, named by the official referees, went East, and it is not known whether he will return in time to officiate in the basketball campaign.

TO PLAY IN CITY

The contest is set for the Y. M. C. A. gymnasium because of the fact that the two schools involved could not come to an agreement on a high school gymnasium or the Peninsula park hall. It was decided, among other things, that the league that in case the institutions for each game could not come to a settlement as to the floor to stage the match, the Y. M. C. A. would be considered as neutral for both delegations.

Admission to all games has been set at 15 cents a ticket. Monday afternoon's match will start at 3:30 o'clock.

Besides the Hill-James John affair of Monday and the Jefferson-Franklin of Tuesday, three other embroilings are set for this week. On Wednesday Hill School of Commerce and the Lincoln high school will battle, followed on Thursday by Columbia university and Washington high. Friday's game is between Hill Military academy and Coach Billy Bryan's Benson Techers.

WASHINGTON STILL WITHOUT CONTEST FOR "TURKEY" DAY

Graduate Manager Denies That Wisconsin Has Asked for Place on Schedule.

SEATTLE, Jan. 17.—Rumors to the effect that the University of Wisconsin had asked for a chance to display its football prowess against the University of Washington eleven here next fall have been branded as false by Graduate Manager Darwin Mesnest.

"No Eastern college has sent an invitation to us asking for a game for 1920," said Manager Mesnest in discussing the Wisconsin rumor. "Until we receive such an invitation we cannot say whether the faculty will allow us to accept the game. Such a game would be played in Seattle on Thanksgiving day, if played at all."

Washington's football schedule is still up in the air, due to Washington State scheduling a game with the University of Nebraska at Lincoln for Turkey day of 1920. The College football game yet to be arranged with the University of California team on the guarantee basis. If the game falls through, the Golden Bears will in all probability meet Washington at Seattle in the final game of the season.

Coach C. J. Hunt, coach of the Purple and Gold eleven, has been in the Middle West on personal business. Some of the Washington supporters have figured out that he is also trying to figure out a strong eleven from the "Big Ten" conference to furnish the opposition against his charges next fall. Nothing definite will be known along this line until his return, which is scheduled for the latter part of this week.

WASHINGTON WILL HAVE TEN LETTER MEN OUT FOR CREW

Coach Leader Sets February 20 as Date for Opening of Spring Practice.

SEATTLE, Jan. 17.—Spring training for the crew at the University of Washington will start February 20. Twenty men, including 10 former letter men, have been named by Coach Ed. Leader for the varsity training team which starts on that date.

Included in the list of men that have been named is the entire crew that won the Pacific Coast championship in 1917. Part of the 1919 crew, which defeated both California and Stanford for the coast title honors on the Oakland estuary, are also included in the list. The rest of the list is composed of freshmen stars from the 1919 eight, in addition to the 1918 crew, which won the intercollegiate race, but who show great promise, in the opinion of Coach Leader.

The late arrival of four complete sets of oars, which were ordered by the management early last fall, will hold up the initial turnout. If they fail to arrive by the twentieth of next month, practice will be held with the available material.

The fresh turnouts will be held at the same time. Due to the oar shortage, the "Babes" will have to go on the lake in shirts, probably between 4 and 6 in the afternoon. Between 15 and 100 candidates have reported daily since the first call was sounded last fall.

From present indications, Coach Leader will pick the 10 best first-year men and assign them to a training table of their own. The expense for both training tables will be borne by the oarsmen and by the student body.

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Many American Horses Exported Crack Standard Breeders Are Sold

ALMOST every day some new name is added to the list of fast American trotters sold for export and if the exodus is not checked before long we will begin to feel our losses severely. Irrespective of the very sizeable sums of hard cash that remain with us in lieu of these horses, this is especially the case with the last notable instance—the sale of the black stallion Binland (2:03 1/4) by far the best and fastest standard-bred trotting stallion that has yet been brought by the foreign press. And as regards Creceus, that famous horse was far past his prime when he found a new home in Russia—where he died, perhaps mercifully, in December, 1915, before the "red terror" had taken its toll of him. Binland, however, is right now in his prime, and there is a very great likelihood that he had remained in this country, he would have been sold to a faster record than that of Creceus, even.

IS SPLENDID SPECIMEN

Our trotting breed, to date, has produced few such splendid specimens as Binland, whose breeder is W. L. Snyder of Springfield, Ohio, his sire being Binjolla (2:17 1/4), son of Binogen (2:06 1/4); while his dam was Alice Wren, by Ashland Wilkes (2:17 1/4). Alice Wren was for some years the favorite driving mare of the "Babes" and was sold to a faster record than that of Creceus, even.

The price paid for Binland by the Italians remains private, but it is known that it was a big one, probably in the neighborhood of \$15,000. But whatever it was, there is nothing left in America to duplicate him, consequently we suffer a distinct loss that cannot be replaced by money, when we bid him good bye.

Pendleton Hoop Squad Is Named

Pendleton, Jan. 17.—Although no definite schedule has been drafted, Pendleton high school's basketball team, named today, Ted Straughn, who captained the 1919 football squad, and Dwight French, its fullback, are forwards; Dick Lawrence is center and Ed Kirtley and Jens Terjeson are guards. The boys are well and heavy and, with the exception of Lawrence, have had football experience as well. Games with numerous teams in the inland Empire are being figured on now.

McTarnahan Named As Mat Instructor

Wallace McTarnahan, former Lincoln high school and Multnomah Amateur wrestling champion, and boxer, has been named wrestling instructor of the Spokane Amateur Athletic club. McTarnahan gained considerable fame as a pitcher for the Lincoln high school of the interscholastic league. An accident caused the loss of three fingers on his right hand, which enabled him to grip the horseshoe in such a manner that he could make it break in numerous ways.

East Has 19-Year-Old Ice Skating Wonder

Charles Jewtraw of Lake Placid, the 19-year-old skating marvel, who announced three Eastern championships at the recent races at Newburgh, N. Y., appears to be the greatest amateur speed skater developed since the days of the great Edmund Lamy. Jewtraw took the quarter mile and one mile races at Newburgh, defeating fields made up of many of the Eastern cranks. Then Jewtraw turned in a sensational victory in the five mile event.

Local Trapmen on All-Stars Seavey and F. Troeh Honored

Baseball and football affords a great many sporting writers an opportunity to air their views on these sports and to agree with the "recognized leaders," but when it comes to selecting all-American trapshooting teams we have the field pretty much to ourselves and we pick the teams through a method that will stand all efforts to pull teams apart.

It is quite a simple matter, too. All we do is to take the ten leading shooters in the amateur averages and the ten leading shooters in the professional averages and group them together and present them to you. Quite simple, don't you think?

But when you select your teams there is something to be told, and that is where we come in good and strong. As we have oftentimes repeated, there was a time when the professional shooter stood head and shoulders above the amateur, but that day has gone by. It is worth noting that the ten leading amateurs in the 1919 trapshooting averages compiled the remarkable average of 77.2 per cent for a year's shooting, but when it comes to selecting all-American trapshooting teams for all five years, Frank Wright of New York and Frank Troeh of Washington are the only amateurs on the 1919 team who were on the 1918 team. They have made the team three straight years. Woolfolk Henderson of Kentucky made the team three years, but in 1918 he didn't shoot at enough targets to qualify. He is back on the team this year.

SENCER ON EVERY TEAM

Charles Spencer of Missouri has made all five of the professional teams. Bart Lewis, Homer Clark of Illinois and Rush Rase of Nebraska have made the team the last four years. Lester German of Maryland made the team four years running, but is off in 1919, so is John Taylor of Ohio, who was on the team in 1916, 1917 and 1918. Rase, Clark, Lewis, Spencer and Huseman, members of the 1918 team, were the shooters who came through in 1919.

GRIFFMEN LIKELY TO BE IN RACE

Clark Griffith Enters Select Circle—Named President of Washington Club.

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—(I. N. S.)—Clark Griffith, the peppy Old Fox of baseball, has realized the ambition of a lifetime.

His ascension to the presidency and part ownership of the Washington Nationals marks the climax of a long career in the national game, for "Griff" today is a full-fledged magnate.

Rising from the ranks of the pitching fraternity, and "Griff" was one of the best and headiest hurlers of his day—he graduated to the managerial stratum. He owes much of his success to Ban Johnson, for it was Big Ban who secured for Griffith the position of manager of the Yankees when they first began to play ball in New York. Little wonder, then, that Griffith is stringing with Johnson in the factional fight that is going on in the junior major.

TRIED HAND WITH REDS

When the Yankees and the Old Fox came to terms of the ways Griffith was to manage the Reds, landing the berth partly because of a strong recommendation from Johnson. Later, when Griffith's time came to leave the Yankees, he was told by Johnson to way on to step into the management at Washington, and has been there ever since.

With a free rein to conduct the affairs of the Senators as he sees fit, Griffith undoubtedly will give the fans in the national capital the strongest team they have ever been asked to support. Star players are scarce, it is true, but there is always a way to strengthen a ball club, and "Griff" can be depended upon to put new life into the team.

FUTURE IS BRIGHT

With Sunday baseball legalized in the District of Columbia and in New York, the outlook for American league teams playing in the East is much brighter than it has ever been, for baseball is going to settle down to its normal level next season and business will be good.

The Senators, despite the fact that they were not among the leading contenders for the pennant, played to big crowds at home last season, and if the Old Fox can build up a winner around Walter Johnson and a few of his major league players, he will be sure to make money next year.

Griffith is a keen baseball man in every sense of the word. During his playing days he attained success by using his head rather than his arm. What's more, he is a shrewd business man and always has ranged among those who have constructive ideas in baseball.

That he will succeed as president of the Senators is a foregone conclusion. He realizes the public loves a winner, and that it is impossible for an owner to win pennants he can at least hold the confidence of the public by doing everything within his means to put a team in the field that can deliver a first class brand of baseball.

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GOLFERS TO HAVE OWN CLUB

Plans Afoot to Organize Patrons of the Municipal Links in Eastmoreland.

PLANS are being formulated for the organization of a club among the local golfers who play over the Municipal links in Eastmoreland. The backers of the club have not yet announced their plans but it is understood that the club will be organized in time to permit the entry of some of the players in the Pacific Northwest Golf association championships to be staged in Vancouver, B. C., next June.

The club will be modeled after the Jefferson Park club of Seattle and some of the Eastern public courses club. A large number of players have signed their intention of joining the club so that some of Portland's rising youngsters may be given the opportunity to play for the Northwest title.

CLUB HOUSE PLANNED

A clubhouse, it is said, will be erected on the course, which will be operated in conjunction with the present office of John John, professional. Lockers will be installed in the clubhouse and a regular schedule of tournaments will be played during the season.

The first nine holes of the course, which were opened for play last season, are in good condition. The upper half of the course will be opened for play during the middle or the latter part of this summer. The fairways have all been seeded, as have the fairways.
