

J. S. SMITH WILL GET YOU IF YOU DON'T WATCH OUT

Man Who Will Enforce Prohibition in Oregon Gives Out Few Don'ts for the Bibulous Crowd.

Bad days have come upon the drinker. Beer, cider, wine, whiskey, cognac or anything else per cent of alcohol, is under ban. If you are "caught with the goods," you are liable to a \$1000 fine and a six months' jail sentence.

For on midnight Thursday the national prohibition act went into effect, two thirds of all states in the union having ratified the eighteenth amendment to the constitution.

GEE, IT'S STRONG

You can not now carry liquor on your person.

You cannot transport it in any vehicle or common carrier.

You cannot keep liquor anywhere except in your home.

You cannot possess cider, grape juice or any other similar concoction, if it has more than one half of 1 per cent of alcohol.

You cannot manufacture, sell, barter, buy or otherwise deal in liquor unless you get special permission from the federal prohibition director.

KRAEMER IS MAN

And if you are caught doing any of these things, the government need not prove that you violated the law. The burden of proof is on you. You must prove that you did not violate the eighteenth amendment.

But who is going to see that the national prohibition act is enforced? The answer is John F. Kraemer, national prohibition commissioner at Washington, D. C., and his thousands of assistants.

The United States has been divided into 10 districts, with a supervisor in charge of each. The supervisor for this district is in San Francisco, and his special agents will cover Washington, Idaho, Oregon, Nevada and California.

LAW TO BE WATCHFUL

In Oregon, the federal prohibition director is Johnson S. Smith, former deputy collector of internal revenue here.

"My force will frequently and rightly inspect every drug store and other possible storehouse for alcohol or liquor illegally obtained," he said Saturday.

"There are only two firms licensed to import alcohol, but even their cargoes must be delivered to a government warehouse for inspection.

MEDICOS ARE BOUND

"Physicians cannot prescribe alcohol except in a denatured form, following one of 10 government formulas.

"Druggists must obtain a permit from this office before being allowed to sell alcohol.

"The law is tight—tighter than a drum."

Judges, city, county, state and federal officers will work for a dry nation. Smith declares he will make a campaign for solidified public sentiment in the rigid enforcement of the prohibition act.

COOPERATION ASKED

"We will ask clubs, societies, churches, and every other kind of organization to back us up in our campaign.

"Already I have received scores of telephone calls telling me of alleged prohibition violations."

The internal revenue officers who have enforced previous prohibition legislation under direction of the collector of customs, henceforth will act under supervision of the supervising agent at San Francisco.

They will make raids, gather evidence,

assist prosecution and in other ways help run down the old order that changed not.

PENALTY IS SEVERE

"The prohibition law is the law of the country. The good citizen will assist in its rigid enforcement. My appeal is to everyone. Help us make the country dry within the meaning of the eighteenth amendment," Johnson said.

And if you don't or won't, your first offense might bring you a \$1000 fine and six months in jail. Your second offense might cost you not less than \$200, not more than \$2000, or imprisonment not less than one month nor more than five years or both such fine and imprisonment.

COMMITTEE OF REALTY MEN TO EXAMINE CITY PLANNING COMMISSION

Meeting of Portland Realty Board Addressed by A. L. Haley, Engineer of Port of Vancouver.

At the Friday noon meeting of the Portland Realty board Chairman Newell of the city planning commission submitted a motion calling for a reconsideration of the board's action the previous week in opposing the proposed zoning ordinance, now pending before the council. The motion, however, found small favor with members of the board and was defeated.

ZONING COMMITTEE APPOINTED

Members of the Realty board are determined that the proposed ordinance shall be given careful study by the public before being adopted by the city commissioners. A committee was appointed at the last meeting to investigate the work being done by the city planning commission.

Members of the committee are J. O. Elrod, Herman Von Borstel, Donn Keasey, Frank L. McGuire, J. G. Rainier, Coe A. McKenna, L. E. Carter, J. Fred Staver, A. L. Ritter and Herbert Gordon.

The committee was instructed to make a thorough investigation of the work of the city planning commission and the methods pursued by Charles H. Cheney of San Francisco, consultant of the commission. The majority of the members of the board canvassed on the subject express themselves as favoring a zoning ordinance, but they find many objections to the ordinance presented by the city planning commission.

ENGINEER GIVES ADDRESS

The principal speaker at Friday's meeting of the Realty board was A. L. Haley, engineer of the Port of Vancouver, Wash. Haley has made an extensive survey of the natural resources of Oregon and Southwest Washington and gave an inspirational talk on the possibilities for development. He was especially enthusiastic over the proposed harnessing of the Columbia and Deschutes rivers to supply electrical power for industrial uses.

Clay, silica, coal and iron deposits of enormous extent await the promoter and capitalist, according to Haley. Production of wood pulp and reclamation of waste paper are two other industries of great importance to Portland, he declared.

WOODEN SHIPS FOR LUMBER

One of the most important industries proposed by the speaker was the construction of wooden sailing vessels for coastwise and offshore shipping from Columbia river ports. He suggested building four and five-masted barkentine, 200 feet between perpendiculars, with an extreme beam of 44 feet and a moulded depth of 21 feet 6 inches.

Vessels of this type would have a carrying weight of 2700 to 3000 tons, and would carry 1,500,000 feet of fir lumber in dimensions up to 80 feet in length.

The Realty board voted to endorse the movement started by the council of associated civic clubs for the retention of the Alcazar Players next season, and a committee consisting of Herman Von Borstel, George Engelhart, F. D. Taylor, Frank McCrillis, J. J. Jennings, P. B. Cleveland and Frank L. McGuire was appointed to cooperate with committees from other clubs in securing the purchase of season tickets to the Alcazar theatre.

DROWNED MAN'S BODY TO BE TAKEN TO OLD HOME FOR SERVICES

George Robeson Lost Life While Employed in Logging at Silver Lake, Wash.

Oregon City, Jan. 17.—The body of George Robeson, who lost his life by accidental drowning at Silver Lake, Wash., near Silver Lake, where he was engaged in logging, arrived in Oregon City this evening accompanied by the widow and the four children. Robeson, who was 46 years of age, was well known in the Colton district, where he previously made his home. The funeral cortege will leave from the undertaking parlors of E. A. Brady at 9 o'clock Sunday morning for Colton, where the services will be held.

Appearing before Circuit Judge Campbell today, Frank Ruffe and D. E. Boone of Portland, jointly charged with J. Holland with stealing 29 sacks of wheat from the warehouse of George H. FREIGHT TRUCK LINES FROM WALLA WALLA TO BEGIN OPERATION

Another Step Taken Looking to Cheap Rates From Inland Empire to Portland.

Walla Walla, Wash., Jan. 17.—Freight connections from Walla Walla to the Columbia river steamboat lines and the possibility of the long sought for cheap rate to Portland have progressed one more step with the establishment of an auto truck freight line here, which will carry produce from this section to Pasco and Yakima. Other points to which the auto lines will run are Pendleton, on the south, and Lewiston, Idaho, through Watsburg and Dayton, Wash., on the east, thus connecting Portland with the innermost points of the Walla Walla and Touchet river valleys.

Walla Walla will be the central distributing point for this section and the company's patrons, who are large jobbers, will ship to Walla Walla, where the freight will be sent out via auto truck. The company already has 10 offices open and plans to extend business still further.

The extent of the business which the operators expect is shown by the fact that a grain elevator for the use of the company is soon to be installed. One truck has already been assembled.

Clackamas County Raisers Organize Jersey Cattle Club

Oregon City, Jan. 17.—The Clackamas County Jersey Cattle club was organized this afternoon at a well attended meeting in the Commercial club rooms, called by County Agricultural Agent R. G. Scott. Officers were elected as follows: President, N. H. Smith, Logan; vice president, John Cole, Molalla; secretary, Mrs. A. Malar, Boring; director, William McCord, Oregon City, and E. O. Fisher, Beaver Creek. Another meeting will be held February 28 at the home of D. F. Stone in the Twilight district, when the Twilight calf club will give a demonstration of calf judging. This club of boys won first prize over all at the Pacific International Livestock exposition last December.

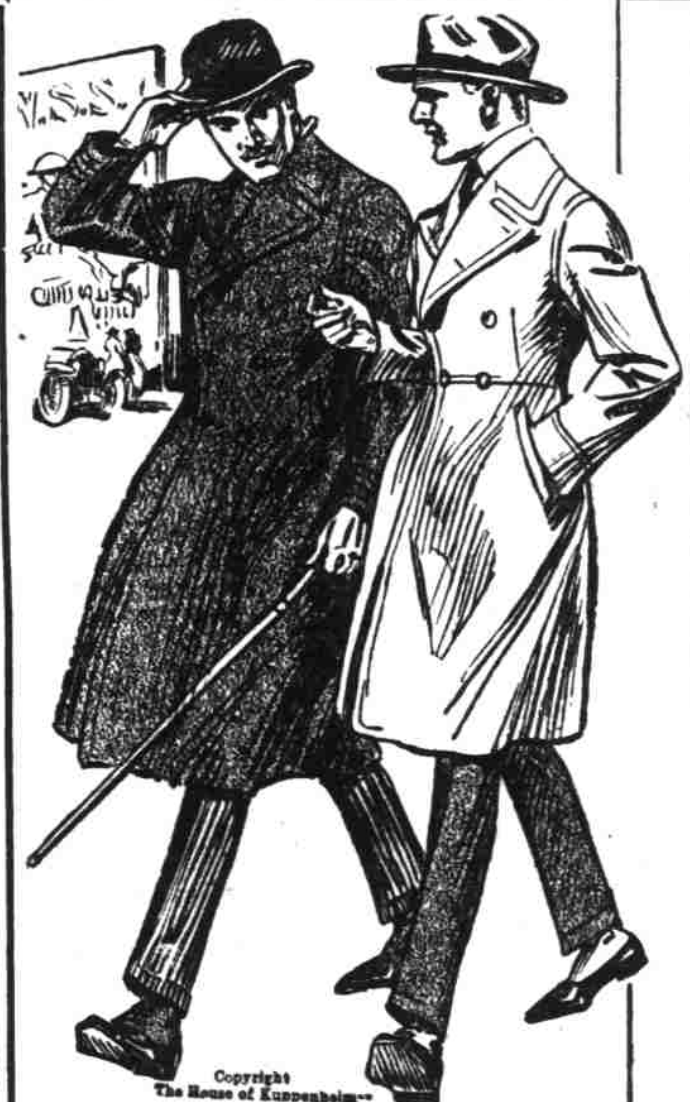
