KOEHLER SIGNS FOR THIS YEAR

Five Players Have Signed Beaver Contracts; President McCarthy to Visit Portland.

ARTHUR KOEHLER, second string catcher of the Portland Beavers, has signed his name to a 1920 Beaver contract and the same is now pending safely in Judge McCredie's roll-top.
Koepler was greatly pleased with his contract, in fact, he signed in a letter to the judge that he liked it so well that he hated to return it.

"That's fine," said the judge. "You very seldom run across a player who will sign without a lot of squabbling." Koepler's signing brings the number of regulars now in the fold to five, Del Baker, Walter Schaller, Dick Cox and "Budd" Sutherland being the other players who have returned their signed contracts.

BLUE IS PEEVED
"Lefty" Schroeder and Lew Blue have their contracts, but neither have signed as yet. Schroeder wants an increase and threatens to quit unless he gets a salary boost, while Blue is of the opinion that he is of major league caliber.

Blue is a mighty sweet looking first baseman, but is not yet ripe for the majors. At the start of last season, he did not appear as a world beater, but during mid-season he improved wonderfully. If he starts off this year in the same style that he finished the 1919 season, there is no doubt that he will advance in 1921.

LUX TO BE BARRED IN RING GOES

Welterweight Battler Disqualified by Portland Boxing Commission; Roper to Arrive Today.

MORRIS LUX, welterweight boxer, has been disqualified from boxing in any smelter under the auspices of the Portland boxing commission.
This action was taken at a meeting of the commissioners Monday, because Lux claimed exemption from military service on the grounds that he was an alien. The commissioners were unanimous in their approval of a resolution which will bar any alien who secured deferred classification, from appearing in local smelters.

The commissioners also decided to cut down the expense of running smelters by pruning the prices paid to boxers in the preliminary events. It is the plan of the commissioners to give the fight fans the best possible main and semi-windup events, but preliminary boxers will have to come to earth if they want to get money for their "coffee and a cigar."

A limit of \$2000 for boxers in each smelter, unless some high class or special event is scheduled, has been set by the commissioners.

Captain Bob Roper, who meets Boy McCormick at Milwaukee, January 28, will arrive in Portland this afternoon. He will start training immediately after his arrival.

Frank Kendall, matchmaker of the Milwaukee commission, has signed Lackey Morrow of Tacoma to meet Aberdeen Jimmy Duffy in the curtain raiser of the smelter.

Jimmy Duffy has been substituted for Alex Trambitas in the 10 round contest against Joe Miller at the Presidio in San Francisco next Monday night.

TWO RING BILLS ARE WATCHED

New York Lawmakers to Consider Boxing; Board Backing Fifteen-Round Law.

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—(U. P.)—The fate of two boxing bills which have today been presented to the New York legislature at Albany will be watched with keen interest by boxing promoters in this section who are in the race for the Dempsey-Carpentier fight.
One of the bills, introduced by Senator James J. Walker of New York, would create a state boxing commission and permit 15-round bouts. Fifteen rounds, it is argued, is practically a "championship" distance. The army, navy and civilian board of boxing control is said to be behind this bill.

The other bill, presented by Assemblyman Harry J. Boies of Brooklyn, calls for 12-round bouts and also provides for the appointment of a boxing commission. Both bills provide for decisions. Should either of the bills become a law it is considered a certainty that the Dempsey-Carpentier fight will be held in the United States. A 12 or 15-round bout to a decision, it is pointed out, would assure the boxing fans of the money's worth. While watching the fate of the boxing bills with interest the various promoters have been practically brought to a standstill in negotiating for the fight. Charles B. Cochran, who plans to sail back to England next Saturday, firmly maintains that he has an option on Carpentier's services and today exhibited a cablegram from M. Dempsey acknowledging such.

RICKARD IS WAITING
Tex Rickard, who intimated that he might have an interesting announcement to make as late as a week ago, is still mum. It is believed Rickard is waiting on decision of the state legislature with regard to rescheduling boxing. William Fox, whose offer the fight has topped all others, is waiting on the fate of the boxing bills as well as an answer from Jack Kearns.

Hunt announced that business dealings in the East and an offer from Carlton college, where he formerly coached football, influenced his decision to quit the local institution. Hunt will accept a salary of \$4500 at Carlton, which is over \$1000 more than he received here.

Announcement of Hunt's resignation was first published in The Journal Monday night. His resignation did not create any surprise among the close followers of the intercollegiate sports in the Northwest.
