

BIG SUM IS ASKED TO PROTECT COAST

Congress to Be Asked for Large Appropriation to Expand Naval Projects Along the Pacific.

Washington, Jan. 20.—(I. N. S.)—Wide expansion of naval projects on the Pacific coast is now being planned, Senator Phelan, of California, announced on Monday. Congress will be asked to make a large appropriation to afford protection to the Pacific coast, Senator Phelan declared, and already the support of some of the majority leaders has been secured.

An investigation is being made of the needs of the Pacific coast, and it was proposed to develop the Pacific coast to a point equal to that of the Atlantic coast in naval protection and facilities. Senator Phelan declared that with a Pacific fleet now assigned to the West coast, there is great need for extension of the naval projects. He declared that there is being drawn up a large program of naval extensions, which will be submitted to congress and the navy department. This program will include recommendations for development of Pacific coast ports, and for the construction of new yards and enlarging of old yards and supply depots.

"The Pacific coast needs protection," Senator Phelan said. "With the Pacific fleet on our coast, it is necessary that we have the facilities for the fleet which will make that a real protection." Senator Lodge, Republican leader, has been consulted with regard to the proposed program, Senator Phelan said, and he has given his approval to it in part. Senator Phelan did not state where the proposed projects would be located, but he stated that a thorough investigation of conditions on the Pacific coast is being made before the program is submitted.

"The navy department has made two reports on needed facilities on the Pacific coast," Senator Phelan said. "This includes naval bases, drydocks and training stations. Among the items is one for \$10,000,000 for the increase of the permanent naval establishment in San Francisco bay. Another is for \$1,000,000 to be spent at San Diego. These appropriations and the others recommended for smaller points along the coast, will be brought before the committee for attention at the first meeting to consider such appropriations."

Snowshoe and Ski Parties Have Sport On Mt. Hood Slopes

Winter sports have been unusually good on the northern slopes of Mount Hood during the last few weeks, says W. M. Cooper, forest ranger from Parkdale, who is on a short detail at the forest service. Besides several Portland snowshoe and skiing parties that have visited the mountain recently, local "slides" have succeeded dances in the social life of the valley. Certain slides have been set aside for coasting, and during the moonlight nights were used constantly by parties gotten up among the local residents.

Helix Schools Are Closed Because of Influenza Outbreak

Pendleton, Jan. 20.—Ten persons are reported ill with influenza at Helix, 20 miles north of Pendleton, and a quarantine has been placed against all public gatherings as a result. The school was not allowed to open Monday. The W. H. Shannon family, including the father and three sons, Mr. and Mrs. Jens Jensen and three children and Lloyd Davidson are victims. The cases are isolated. No cases are reported in Pendleton.

Word of the death of Mother Mary Stanislaus, for 23 years superior of St. Joseph academy here, was received Monday from the mother house of the Sisters of St. Francis in Philadelphia. She was instrumental in the establishment of St. Joseph academy and St. Anthony hospital here, and was widely known throughout this district.

Young Lads Sent To State School on Vandalism Charges

Baker, Jan. 20.—Edward and Asa Dunn, aged 14 and 17 years old, have been committed to the state industrial school. They were charged with the destruction of property on the Henry Herburger ranch on Beech creek, and are said to have confessed to acts of vandalism.

Five cases of smallpox in Baker have been placed under quarantine.

Wallace B. Landreth has been awarded the contract to carry mail along the newly established route between Baker and the upper Burnt river valley. The contract goes into effect February 1. At present mail is taken via the Sumpster Valley railway to Whitney and forwarded by stage to Hereford and Unity, often entailing long delays.

Pershing Really Did Say 'Lafayette, We Are Here,' He Says

The cheers had died away. The great Auditorium organ was silent. Seven thousand people were filling the big hall with the buzz and rustle of their departure.

General Pershing had praised Portland's war service and had said of Oregon soldiers that when ordered into difficult action at the front they had always more than realized his expectations. He had praised labor and argued for deportation of radicals who refuse to learn the English and American institutions. He had bent with tear-filled eyes over little Jean Abercrombie, who had presented him a cluster of Portland roses for her dead daddy's chief and kissed her on each rosy cheek.

Then he turned from the scores of detaining, congratulatory hands, only to confront another questioner. "General," said this intrusive person, "I'm a newspaper man but not on the story of your visit here. I want to ask you one question. What did you actually say when you bowed before the tomb of Lafayette?"

The commander-in-chief of the American army paused. He bent his brow in the effort of recollection. Then he smiled, the Pershing smile which won the hearts of Portland children, Sunday. "What I actually said and literally said," he replied, "was 'Lafayette, we are here.'"

'Sandy' Demurs to 'Slaughter' Charge
