

MOVE FOR REPEAL OF FISH AND GAME LAW IS PROPOSED

Sportsmen's League Will Sponsor Effort to Have Commissioners Appointed by Governor.

Salem, Jan. 20.—A measure will be initiated by the Oregon Sportsmen league for the November ballot to repeal the new fish and game commission bill passed at the recent special session of the legislature, according to State Senator Thomas of Jackson county. The feature of the bill providing for the election of the members by the legislature has led to this determination, according to Thomas. The form of the commission is not opposed.

A companion measure providing for a new commission to be appointed by the governor will be offered at the same time. Thomas said, but whether any change in form will be decided upon has not been determined.

In addition, he said, a measure will be offered similar to that which died in committee at the special session which was intended to curb commercial fishing interests on the Rogue river. Other legislation in connection with the fish and game interests of the state may form part of the program, he said.

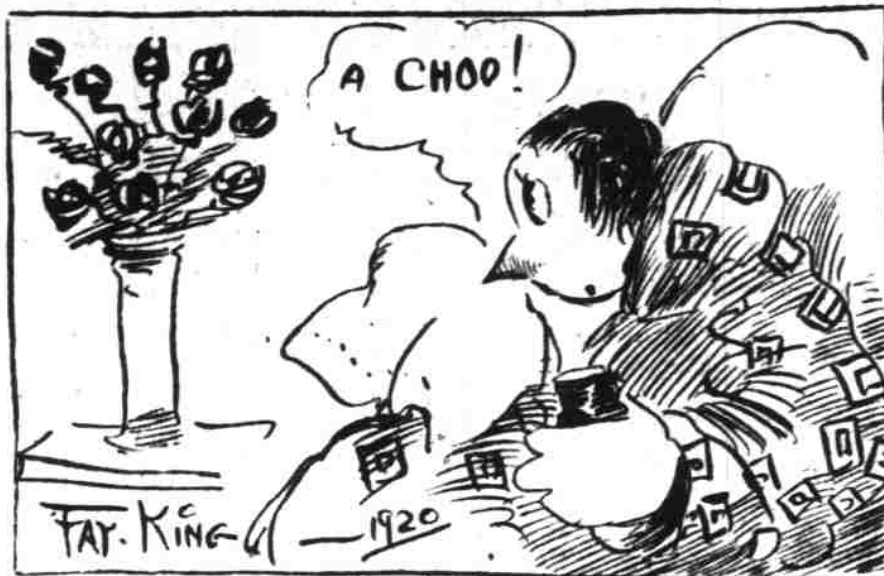
REFERENDUM ON FISH AND GAME LEGISLATION NOT EXPECTED

It has been their position that the commercial salmon interests ruled the legislature, authorized the nine-member scheme of fish and game commission reorganization and lobbied for and secured the indorsement of the old fish and game commission and its acts. It is anticipated that energy in securing signatures for the referendum petition will be a part of a general plan to create in Oregon a sportsmen's league of at least 10,000 members.

Court Requested to Reconsider Parole Of Youthful Forger

Salem, Jan. 20.—The circuit court of Josephine county has been asked, by Louis H. Compton, state parole officer, to reconsider its action in paroling Samuel Richey, aged 15, convicted of forgery, to the parole officer. The court will be asked to turn the boy over to the juvenile court, which, in the event he is found to be incorrigible, could remand him to the circuit court.

Compton declares that the state prison is no place for a boy of Richey's age and that he is not in the jurisdiction of the state parole officer. Richey is being detained in the city jail here until

his further disposition can be arranged for.

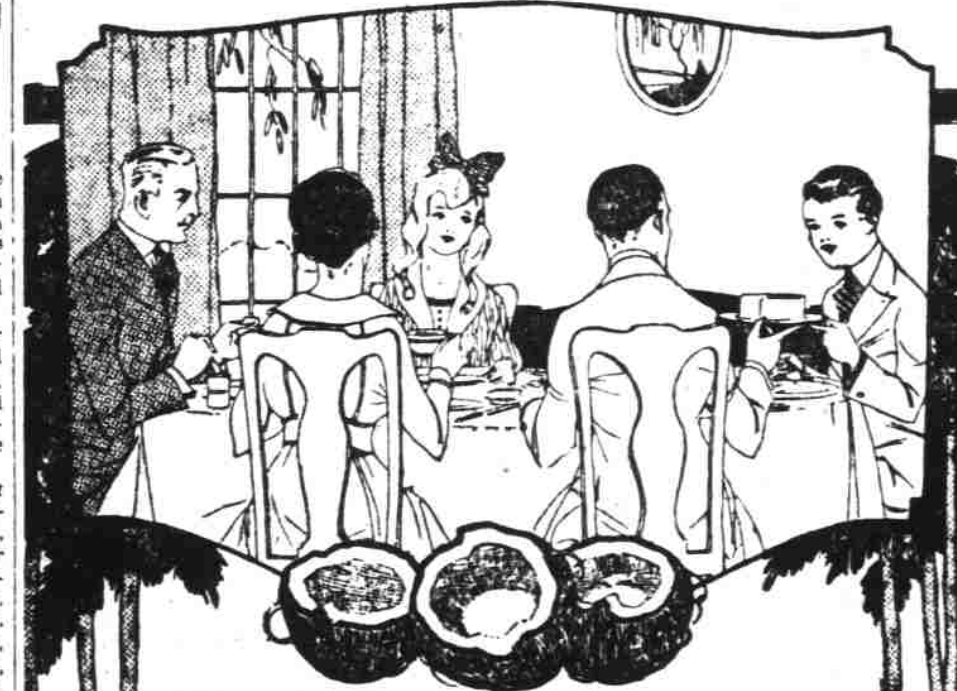

FEDERAL GRAND JURY CHARGES FOUR WITH SUGAR PROFITEERING

Many Indictments Are Returned for Alleged Violations of U. S. Revenue Laws.

Four alleged sugar profiteers were indicted by the federal grand jury which reported to Federal Judge Wolverton Monday afternoon. Sixty-five true bills and six secret indictments were returned. Most of them concerned alleged revenue law violations.

Charged with having sold sugar for more than the 13 cents a pound fixed as a fair price by the federal board, Joseph Lotoff, L. F. Eckert, Jacob Rassi and A. W. Anderson were named in indictments for alleged violations of the food control act as amended.

Alleged revenue law violations brought indictments against the following persons: Catherine Hayora, Joe Hayora, Henry Hayora, Vicko Glovich, Chester B. Frazier, John Jackson, A. V. Murphy, Harry Traver, Jack Raspolich, Pete Rosich, Joe Ulrich, C. C. Cassey, Walter S. Basy, Henry McMahon, Charles Straight, Mrs. N. L. Connelly, William George, Henry Hoeckler, P. G. Stahl, H. W. Hoeckler, J. D. Roach, Pete Ceboff, Nick Ceboff, Adolph Strabel, Matt Lake, Simon Skedro, J. D. McGinnis, John Klobos and L. B. Kennedy.

Other violations are charged as follows: William J. Thomas, narcotics; Simon McKee, settling forest fire; Lee Wing, narcotics; Johnnie Martin, white slavery; A. B. Jones, white slavery; Wong Sei Sid, narcotics; Albert H. Huber, stealing postage stamps; Salvatore Battaglia, resisting federal officers; William Langstaff, white slavery; Eddy Simms, narcotics; Joe Herskowitz, postal theft; Charles A. Elwell, embezzling money orders; Gus Pickers, receiving packages stolen from mail; Gus Conrad, postal theft; William Langstaff, violation immigration act; John L. Burdell, narcotics; Angelo Tigli, using cereals and fruits to make liquor unlawfully; Charles Fong, narcotics; Ho Hung, narcotics; J. C. Matthews, misuse of postal certificates; Charles Chin, narcotics; Gloyd Slantey, narcotics; Wan Larkin and Andrew W. Jones, narcotics; J. L. Lowe, narcotics; Lee Tong, narcotics; David Copperfield, burning dwelling on Klamath Indian reservation; Iven Lowman, white slavery.

Included in the true bills returned were those against Ollie Davis, alleged to have stolen Pullman blankets from the railway administration; J. S. Baker, alleged to have operated a still; W. Rutz, said to have sent obscene matter through the mails from Astoria to Seattle; and Levi Bomly and Willie David, Indians, alleged to have stolen cattle on the Klamath Indian reservation.

Thomas H. Maguire Appointed Deputy District Attorney

Thomas H. Maguire, formerly connected with the district attorney's office as chief clerk and later captain in the 148th field artillery, has been appointed deputy district attorney by District Attorney Walter H. Evans. The new deputy will have charge of the complaint department and will handle most of the cases in the district court.

Maguire served with the Oregon National Guard at the Mexican border from June, 1916, until February, 1917. In April, 1917, when the guard was transferred to the federal service, he was commissioned first lieutenant of cavalry. Later he reached the rank of captain and was assigned to the 148th field artillery. He arrived in France in January, 1918.
