

SINN FEINERS DEFY BRITISH CONTROL OF IRELAND'S AFFAIRS

Revolutionary Leaders Plan to Place in Public Office Men Who Are Now in Jail.

 Dublin, Jan. 21.—(I. N. S.)—The Sinn Feiners are planning today to make immediate challenge for government supremacy in Ireland, now that they captured most of the local administrations in the recent election.

The local government board at Dublin Castle has the power to veto all proposals of the local boards, but the Sinn Feiners declare that they will refuse to carry out Dublin Castle's dictates in the future.

The first challenge to Dublin Castle, the seat of British authority in Ireland, will come within 10 days, when nominations for sheriffs are made. Each local board forwards three nominations to the lord lieutenant for final selection.

The Sinn Fein organization at Cork has given notice that it will send in the following:

Alderman Murray, who is now in jail, and who will select the jury to try himself if he is made sheriff; Denis McNeill, who is charged with shooting Chief Constable Cortt and who was afterwards daringly rescued from prison by his friends, and Michael Ahearn, who is wanted by the police in connection with the charge of possession of five barrels of bombs and hand grenades.

McNeill and Ahearn have both been in hiding since they were rescued from jail.

Many Fishermen Lose Lives During Storms

London, Jan. 21.—Twenty-one fishermen were drowned, 16 are missing and many fishing boats have been sunk in a storm, said a dispatch from Christiania.

Canada's Embargo On Newsprint Is Cause of Protest

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 21.—(I. N. S.)—Strong protests are being lodged with the Canadian government by the American authorities against the embargo on the shipment of newsprint paper to the United States by the Fort Frances Paper company. American newspapers have united with the United States government in the protests.

It is understood that, in addition to protesting to Ottawa, the United States government has lodged a protest with the British government at London. London is reported to have already taken the matter up with Ottawa.

The Canadian government so far has shown no inclination to recede from its original attitude.

30 French Soldiers Are Murdered by Syrian Insurgents

London, Jan. 21.—(I. N. S.)—Thirty French soldiers were killed or wounded when 600 insurgent Syrians attacked the French force "east of Alexandria," said a Cairo dispatch to the Daily Express today, quoting advices received there from Damascus.

A new Syrian revolt is reported to be developing in the Takiya mountains. (Alexandretta is in the French sphere of influence in the extreme northern part of Syria. It is in the Gulf of Iskanderun.)

Bolshevik Armies Cheer Deportees on Soviet Ark Buford

Hango Finland, Jan. 21.—(U. P.)—The American transport Buford, the "soviet ark," which carried 249 undesirable aliens deported from the United States to this port, sailed Monday for home. She was accompanied by her convoy, the destroyer Ballard.

The deported radicals crossed the border into Bolshevik Russia late today at Terjoki. They were received with cheers by the Bolshevik military forces.

GERMANY FACING COLLAPSE, IS VIEW

Industrial Leader Says Boundaries Patched Up Would Avert Danger Threatened.

 Berlin, Germany, Jan. 21.—"War weakened Germany is bleeding to death and will collapse soon unless the allies patch up her boundaries to prevent the unhindered outflow of her industrial products and the simultaneous influx of all manner of nonessential luxuries that are eating up the country."

This view of the present economical situation of Germany was given me today by Walther Rathenau, Germany's great industrial leader, who, besides being the head of the German General Electric company, is also the author of a series of widely read books on the new Germany.

"For the first time in the history of the world," he continued, "a civilized country has been left with its boundaries dangling up in the air, so to speak, without knowing where its sovereignty begins or ends. I am referring to the break in the German frontier along Belgium and France. Day after day many automobiles bearing cigarettes, soap, perfumes and lace cross from this section into Germany without our authorities being able to control the imports, because men wearing the uniforms of the allies accompany the cars. And, vice versa, scores of automobiles cross from Germany to the French and Belgian sides carrying off our best industrial products which have been bought up for a song.

What is the significance of this? "It means that our life blood is ebbing out slowly. It means that our factories, which we have put back at work at such tremendous cost, are getting for their products luxuries which we had done without for years. Not that I blame the people; they are entitled to these luxuries, but if this vast amount of smuggling is kept up, if the hole in our western frontier is not patched up it will be impossible for Germany to get well again financially, economically or industrially. It will be impossible for Germany to pay her war debts."

Three Persons Die In Flames; Building Partially Leveled

New York, Jan. 21.—(U. P.)—Three persons were killed and seven overcome in a fire Tuesday which partially destroyed a five story brick building at 22 Maiden lane.

The fire started on the second floor in the office of the Interborough Badge & Metal company. Celluloid is used largely by the badge company and several explosions spread the fire.

One girl, trapped on the fifth floor of the building, jumped to the street below and was instantly killed. Another of the dead was said to be a fireman.

A number of girls were trapped on the top floor and were carried down by firemen. Of these seven were so badly overcome by smoke that they were taken to a hospital.

United States Will Not Ask Criminal Trial of Ex-Kaiser

Washington, Jan. 21.—(I. N. S.)—The United States is not a party to the request for the extradition of the Kaiser from Holland for trial by the allies, it was learned at the state department late today.

Secretary of State Lansing, as a member of the peace conference, opposed a criminal trial of the Kaiser, but favored a political trial.

Failure of the United States to ratify the treaty was given as the reason for the failure to be a party to the request for extradition.

Severe Storms Off Norway
 London, Jan. 21.—(U. P.)—Many boats have been lost in severe storms off the coast of Norway, a dispatch from Christiania reports. Thirty-seven fishermen were drowned when one vessel foundered.

Clemenceau Declines Gift
 Paris, Jan. 21.—(I. N. S.)—Former Premier Clemenceau today refused to accept an estate which had been offered to him by his admirers as a gift from the nation.

Paper Coin for Silver
 Berlin, Jan. 21.—(I. N. S.)—Silver coins are expected to vanish completely from money circulation in Germany as a result of the offer of the reichsbank to exchange six and one half marks in paper for every silver mark piece.
