

1920 IS FINEST YEAR IN HISTORY LOCAL Y. M. C. A.

Membership Totals 5020, Ranks Higher Than Any West of Chicago and Is Ninth in Nation.

The achievements of the Portland "Y" during 1919 have been analyzed in the annual statement of the association just issued. The year has been the largest in the history of the organization in the number of members, classes conducted, meetings held, functions promoted, students graduated, attendance at the building and other lines of activity.

Membership totals 5020, ranking highest west of Chicago and ninth in the nation's "Y" associations. A service department has been conducted, religious, social and membership, which has conducted a constant series of meetings and social functions. The boys' and young men's divisions contain a total membership of 816 with activities including the Spirit lake camp, 15 organized Bible clubs, four H. Y. clubs, Y. Dell lodge, boys' division lobby, young men's division lobby, gymnasium and swimming pool. A total of 1472 men have been placed in positions, 12,335 vocational interviews have been given and 2823 class received from employers.

Men and boys to the number of 1045 have taken systematic physical class work; total attendance at regular "gym" classes, 32,807; 799 physical examinations have been given, 133 clubs and teams maintained and 54 hikes and outings held.

In its "Y" school Portland has 1546 students enrolled, the second largest west of Chicago and tenth largest in the country.

Subscriptions to the 1920 budget for the maintenance of the Y. M. C. A. will be undertaken by committees within a few days.

Bogus Ex-Service Men to Be Jailed, Is Aim of Legion

APOSTOLIC AIRPLANE TO ARRIVE HERE WITH SKY PILOT STEERING

Big Three-Seated Curtiss Plane to Be Used Here in Campaign for Near East Relief.

Long more or less a misnomer, the "sky pilot" will come into actual being in Portland Saturday or Sunday when the great three-seated Curtiss Oriole airplane, flying overland from Tulsa, Okla., through Los Angeles, arrives in Portland with a regular preacher at the wheel.

The big plane is the recent purchase of the Apostolic Faith mission of Portland which on Monday was tendered to State Chairman S. C. Lancaster for use at his direction in connection with the approaching campaign for Near East relief. The mission has also placed at the disposal of the committee one of its large auto trucks, with a driver.

Workers from all over Northern Oregon attended a conference at the Hotel Benson Monday and a conference of workers from Southern Oregon is being held today at Eugene. Chairman Lancaster and Director J. J. Handsaker are in Eugene assisting in organization. An appeal for the continued financial and moral support of the United States in the efforts of Armenia and

the other famine-stricken Near East countries to become self-supporting, was made at the conference by General Mesrop Agapetian, military leader and diplomat, who also addressed the Chamber of Commerce at its noon meeting.

2 Drives for Funds In Portland Have Favorable Action

Applications of the Pisgah Home colony and Near East Relief society to conduct campaigns for funds during the month of February have been favorably recommended by a committee representing the presidents' council of the various civic clubs in a letter received by Mayor Baker Wednesday morning. The committee was appointed some time ago to investigate all applications for drives. The Pisgah Home asks for authority to conduct a campaign for \$25,000 during the last week in February. The Near East Relief society's drive is for \$75,290.
