

HOOVER'S VISION SAVING MILLIONS OF LATVIAN LIVES

America's Preponderance in Humanitarian Work Makes Up for Decline Diplomatically.

On the American Relief Association Train in Latvia, Jan. 19.—(Delayed).—After one has inspected the kitchens in the recently freed provinces of Latvia one marvels at the vision of Herbert C. Hoover and his extraordinary administrative ability which is saving 4,000,000 emaciated children in this country. Many persons deplore the apparent decline of America's influence in the political and military affairs of Europe and some lament that America is not using her great commercial opportunities in the devastated regions of Central and Eastern Europe, but this makes America's preponderance in humanitarian work stand out more effective and penetrating than any diplomatic influence can be.

Several times I have witnessed the popularity of the American representatives and the gratitude of the people for the American relief work, but never have I seen a more forcible, genuine and thrilling demonstration of it than today when the whole population of these ruined and starving little towns gathered at the relief kitchens personally to thank Mr. Orbinson and to express their love and admiration for the American people. Mr. Orbinson, who was on his way to Divine to feed 10,000 starving children, was hailed, together with America, in prose and verse in the Latvian, Hebrew, Russian and German languages, but no language was more eloquent or persuasive than the beaming eyes of the children. Their affection for their "American uncle" was pathetic.

ARE EDUCATIONAL CENTERS
Mr. Orbinson is giving his children more than food. In fact these American Relief association kitchens are educational centers where the poorest children for the first time in their lives come in touch with sympathy and kindness. It is a new kind of children's club where community of spirit inspires the children; it is apt to be an important center of communal life—in fact, the dominating institution in every town. It is a practical school of national equality and religious toleration. Children of all nationalities and religions eat together. All the committees are organized on an "international basis" and it is gratifying that in their tremendous exaltation the children as well as their parents and the communal representatives hail America not simply for the food distributed but chiefly for the kindness and sympathy shown.

AMERICA IS FAIRY LAND
It is difficult to exaggerate the importance of the American Relief association in this corner of the world. It is saving not only the lives but the souls of the new generation which was growing up in a world of permanent wars and a wilderness of mutual hatred. In the imagination of these unfortunate children foreigners were inevitably conceived as wild beasts causing all the misery. Now the foreigners—Americans—are bringing them food, sympathy and love. The American kitchens, in fact, are fairy lands in the imagination of the terrorized, emaciated little creatures. The association is now feeding 67,000 children in Latvia and is about to add 10,000 more in Divine.
The A. R. A. kitchens have established a new and great principle. The children must be fed; if the community is unable to feed them, it is the task of other communities to hasten to their assistance. The work started by the American Relief association will live forever and America will be hailed as the savior of the new generation.

Egypt's New Woman Found Defiant of Old Laws of the Harem

Cairo, Egypt, Jan. 22.—(I. N. S.)—The "new woman" movement in Egypt is rapidly growing in strength and, despite the ancient traditions of Mohammedans, is being favorably received. Harem laws are being broken with impunity and many of the younger women have discarded their face veils and are taking part in political processions engineered by the Egyptian nationalists. At the beginning of the political riots women of the lower classes took part in the looting, but now the cry of "emancipation" has spread to all classes. The girls in the government schools joined the boy students when they went on strike against British rule.

Census Discovers 700 New Cities
Washington, Jan. 22.—(U. P.)—New cities are being discovered by the 1920 census, officials said today. A city in the census classification is a community of 10,000 inhabitants. In the 1910 census, 601 were discovered. In the present census the total probably will reach 700.



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Kolchak Is Safe; Rumor of Capture By Reds Is Untrue

London, Jan. 22.—(I. N. S.)—Admiral Kolchak, commander of the anti-Bolshevik forces in Western Siberia, has not been captured, as claimed by the soviet government, but with his suite is safe at Nijnadinsk, it was announced today at the weekly conference of correspondents and officials at the war office.

A Russian wireless dispatch from Moscow said that Kolchak had been captured on December 27.

OTHER NATIONS TO AMEND PACT, TOO

Belgian, British, French and Italians All Want to Change League of Nations.

Brussels, Jan. 4 (delayed).—Other nations besides the United States desire amendments to the pact of the League of Nations. The unofficial congress of league societies, which has just finished its sessions in Brussels, has put forth a number of resolutions which urge amendments to the covenant. The Italians demand compulsory arbitration and the British and French together want an international court of justice to be embodied in the league on equal terms with the assembly and executive council.

The French consider indispensable the creation of an international military staff to enforce the decisions of the executive council by the use of armies, or else, they say, the council will be flouted right and left as is now the experience of the Paris peace conference and as was formerly the experience of the peace tribunal at The Hague. The delegates from all the nations unite in demanding gradual disarmament. These resolutions show popular discontent in England, France, Italy and other countries with the League of Nations as it is now constituted. The difference between them and the United States is that they are willing to sacrifice some of their ideals and accept the pact as it stands and strive for amendments afterwards, whereas the American senate will accept no compromise at all. All of America's demands must be satisfied at once or she will not enter the league.

Besides adopting these resolutions the congress of Brussels decided to constitute itself into a permanent organization. At periodic intervals hereafter a congress will meet in other capitals of Europe. A general council will be appointed to regulate the executive affairs. Here in Brussels a permanent bureau will be established where any supply of lead from any corner of the world may gather information about questions relating to the league.

Californian Shops With an Aeroplane

Oakland, Cal., Jan. 22.—(U. P.)—"Aerial shopping has come," a member of the aviation committee of the local chamber of commerce said today after Aviator C. V. Pickup landed on Clay street, in the main shopping district. Pickup flew a "baby ace," a single seater plane. The "stunt" was arranged by the local chamber of commerce.

Rancher's Bank Roll Vanishes With Angel

Chicago, Jan. 22.—(I. N. S.)—The Chicago police were searching today for Robert Pates, a well-to-do Nebraska, and the "angels" who lured him and his \$5000 roll away from Mrs. Pates here. Mrs. Pates asked the police to

find her husband. She said they recently sold \$5000 worth of cattle and that they started to New York for a vacation. When the train reached Northwestern station, Chicago, her husband said: "Wait here. I hear the angels calling. I'll get off and see what they want!" She waited four hours and then sought the police.

Martial Law to Rule Huns Indefinitely, Says Minister Noske

Berlin, Jan. 22.—(I. N. S.)—Martial law is to be continued in force throughout Germany for an indefinite period, it was announced today by Minister of Defense Noske. "The government has no intention of raising the military restrictions at this time," said the minister.

American Embassies May Be Prohibited From Use of Wines

Washington, Jan. 22.—(I. N. S.)—Prohibition is worrying even the diplomats. The state department today is in a quandary as to whether a ruling on prohibition should be leased to members of the diplomatic corps of the United States. American embassies in foreign lands are technically a part of the United States and thereby the embassies, in the strictest sense, must be dry. "Dry" banquets and social functions in "wet" countries would place the American embassies at a distinct disadvantage, officials admit, for light wines and beverages are considered as necessities to dinners in many foreign countries.
