

INDUSTRIAL COURT TERMED SOLUTION OF LABOR ISSUES

Dr. Suzzallo Says Teachers Have
No Right to Strike; Business
Agent Is Defended.

Dr. Henry Suzzallo electrified an audience of 500 business men with a new philosophy for the governing of industrial disputes at the Chamber of Commerce, Friday afternoon. He spoke under the auspices of the Progressive Business Men's club. Teachers have no right to organize unions, he affirmed. Neither have policemen. Neither have firemen. These constitute classes equally in service to the two great controversial divisions of labor and capital. But to the walking delegate he gave a new dignity. Perhaps a new name, "Economic councillor." Employers who resent the business agents' representation of workers in their own shops, could as logically resent the representation of a client by his attorney or the representation of a builder by his engineer.

FIRST PRINCIPLES BASIC
But the background of the position taken by the president of the University of Washington was that the applied principles of American democracy could and should settle industrial difficulties and unrest. The nation needs a spiritual reconstruction and a return to its basic ideals, he observed.

As criminal courts supplanted the feud violence of the clan and the private settlement of quarrels, as civil courts were later established to do impartial justice in property controversies, so the court of industrial relations to compel arbitration of disputes between employer and employee must sooner or later take the place of the strike, the boycott and the lockout, Dr. Suzzallo predicted.

But such a court to be a success, he amplified, must have the support of majority public sentiment, must have a great body disinterested and fair in respect to either side upon which to draw for judges and arbitrators.

CAMPAIGN IS URGED
Therefore the educator believes the compulsory court of industrial relations is a thing for the future, not the present. Great educational campaigns in the schools and among adults must precede it.

Dr. Suzzallo declared that organized labor is little different in principle from corporation organization of capital. He affirmed the right of labor to organize, to bargain collectively and to be represented by business agents.

Ira L. Riggs, president of the Progressive Business Men's club, presided. President P. L. Campbell of the University of Oregon presented the speaker of the day. President W. J. Kerr of Oregon Agricultural college spoke briefly. The Royal Rosarian quartet furnished the music.

Dr. Suzzallo will speak at a City club dinner at the Benson hotel at 6:30 this evening.

Plan for Removal Of Entrance Light Meets Opposition

The proposal of the Columbia river pilot board to remove the entrance light and "whistler" at the north side of the harbor entrance and to replace it with a less conspicuous marking will reduce the safety of the channel, according to C. J. Towner, secretary of the Columbia River Trollers' association. "The change proposed will be particularly dangerous to vessels coming from or going to the north," said Towner. "Any marking less conspicuous than at present simply renders the channel more obscure and it is a point where it is essential that the channel be plainly indicated. We don't want a guess work channel."
