TODAY'S FORECASTS
Portland and vicinity—Tonight and Sunday, rain; strong southeasterly winds.
Oregon and Washington—Tonight and Sunday, rain or snow; fresh or whole southeasterly gale on the coast.

WEATHER CONDITIONS
An important low pressure area is approaching the North Pacific coast and the pressure is moderately low in the Gulf states and East Tennessee, but elsewhere the pressure is high, the highest readings being in North Dakota. Precipitation has occurred on the North Pacific coast, in the extreme Southwest and from the Northern Plains states eastward to the Atlantic coast and southward to the Gulf of Mexico. The heaviest rainfall reported was 1.62 inches at Galveston, Texas. The weather is mild on the North Pacific slope and on the immediate Atlantic coast, but in other sections is colder. In parts of Montana, Alberta and Saskatchewan the temperature is more than 40 degrees below normal.

The low pressure area noted off Vancouver Island is moving southward and is expected to come fresh to the coast. It is expected from Cape Blanco northward today, tonight and probably Sunday. Southeast storm warnings were ordered at 7 a. m. for all Oregon and Washington coast stations.
Satellite humidity at Portland: Noon yesterday, 76 per cent; 2 p. m. yesterday, 85 per cent; 5 a. m. today, 87 per cent.

Former Policeman With Morals Squad And Editor Indicted

C. W. Beaver, former moral squad policeman, in a grand jury indictment returned Friday afternoon, is accused of having supported 14-year-old Evelyn Mack at local hotels and of having concealed her whereabouts from his brother officers, who were conducting a search for her.

Robert G. Duncan, former secretary of the Retail Grocers' association and a well known trade journal editor, was indicted on the charge of criminal libel. Duncan, in an article printed in his Trade Journal for January 2, 1920, is alleged to have libeled F. E. Foote, ex-secretary of the United Grocers of Oregon. Duncan was examined by the grand jury at his own request.

Gus and Sam Mekas were freed of blame for a near riot which occurred in their candy shop, the Busy Bee, on Washington street. Four ex-service men were involved in the excitement.

Other indictments returned were: Stanley Robinson, larceny; Kelly Gragg, statutory offense; and Herbert Brim, age, assault and battery. The grand jury for January is expected to make a final report on Tuesday, according to George Mowry, deputy district attorney in charge.

Additional Acreage In Fruit Signed Up

A large additional acreage of fruit was signed up at an enthusiastic meeting of the Oregon Growers' Cooperative association at Springbrook, Friday. With 200 more acres the tonnage will be sufficient to warrant formation of a marketing unit and erection of a plant. The meeting was attended by 120 growers of the Newberg-Springbrook section. Organization Manager C. I. Lewis spoke.

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J. D. FARRELL REFUSES TO DISCUSS RUMOR HE IS TO QUIT U. P. ROAD

Local Railroad Officials Leave for Huntington to Join President Gray's Inspection Party.

"I'm not discussing that matter at all," said J. D. Farrell, vice president of the Union Pacific system, Friday, when questioned as to whether he had any intention of resigning from the Union Pacific system.

Reports have been circulating freely for more than a month around the local railroad offices that Farrell intended to leave active service with the Union Pacific. But at many times during the last 10 years similar reports have been circulated to the same effect.

The reports of several years ago were believed to be an outgrowth of the illness of Farrell, which, however, did not impair his efficient management of the O-W, at any time. At the present time Farrell is in better health than ever before and railroad sub-officials are at a loss to find the source of the reports.

Farrell, accompanied by J. P. O'Brien, federal manager of the O-W; F. W. Robinson, traffic manager; William C. Murray, general passenger agent, and H. E. Lounsbury, general freight agent, left Friday evening for Huntington where they are scheduled to meet Carl Gray, president of the U. P. system, this morning.

Gray, accompanied by H. M. Adams, vice president in charge of traffic in making an extensive tour of Union Pacific properties. A complete inspection of the O-W line is to be made before the party comes to Portland, which will likely be about Thursday.

Charles H. Gardner, Prominent Business Man of Orton, Dies

Toledo, Or., Jan. 24.—Charles H. Gardner, aged 66, died Saturday at his home in Orton. He was one of the foremost men of Lincoln county. From Illinois he came to Orton in 1889, where he embarked in the implement business. After four years in Portland he came to Lincoln county and engaged in the hardware business here with E. J. Avery. In 1909 he was appointed county judge by Governor Benson and was re-elected in 1910. During his tenure of office the first rock roads in the county were constructed.

For several years he had been in the garage business at Newport. Disposing of this business several months ago, he purchased the general merchandise store and postoffice of E. M. Frazier at Orton, where he was living at the time of his death.

He was a member of the local Masonic lodge. His body was taken to Portland for cremation. He is survived by his wife.

Woman Badly Burned When Gown Catches Fire From Gas Stove

Mrs. Peter A. Kikes, aged 33, of 731 Union avenue north, is at the Portland Sanitarium in a serious condition, as a result of burns received at 9 o'clock Friday morning when her nightgown caught fire from an open flame gas heater. Her condition was somewhat more favorable this morning.

Only by the quick action of John Gilson, 22, who lives at the same address, was Mrs. Kikes' life saved, when she ran screaming into the hall, her clothing and hair a mass of flames. Gilson snatched up a blanket, and wrapping it around Mrs. Kikes, smothered the flames.

Dr. F. H. Dammasch was called at once, but was unable to secure a room in any of the larger hospitals. After trying in vain at St. Vincent's and the Good Samaritan he rushed his patient to the Portland Sanitarium in an Arrow ambulance.

Mrs. Kikes was dressing her three children when the accident occurred. She had leaned over to adjust the clothing on one of them when her gown was sucked into the blaze of the heater. The light fabric flared up and the flames swept up her back and into her flowing hair.
