The lectures, each to be followed by discussion, are upon the following subjects: "The Old Testament Prophets and Their Present Day Social Message"; "The Social Unrest and Its Implication for the Y. W. C. A."; "Industrial Womanhood's Struggle for the Abundant Life"; and "Industrial Girls' Challenge to the Y. W. C. A."

The lectures will be delivered at the Portland hotel January 25, 27, 28 and 29, at 3:30 p. m., and each afternoon lecture will be repeated on the evening of the same day at 8 o'clock. **Child Caring League Gains Better Laws**

THE newly formed Child Caring league of Oregon, of which W. D. De Varney is president, has established a record for achieving a really remarkable piece of legislation while yet in its swaddling clothes. The league, which has for its purpose the coordination of the interest and effort on behalf of the child caring institutions of the state, has been in existence only a month.

One of the first problems to confront the organization was the matter of financing the institutions, the support now received from the state being only half and in some instances only a third of the amount necessary to care for the hundreds of little charges in the various institutions. De Varney felt that a larger appropriation was the right and equitable way of meeting the deficit, but thought the two weeks remaining before the opening of the special session of the legislature was too short a time in which to get the matter properly before the people. Senator Robert S. Farrell encouraged a whirlwind campaign to "put it over," and De Varney devoted his entire time to the matter.

The bill provided for an increase of the \$8 and \$10 appropriations per capita to \$16 and \$20, and has the unusual experience of receiving unanimous support of the ways and means committees of the senate and of the house. The bill also provides that when a child is being partially supported by a relative, that the difference between that amount and the regular appropriation be made up by the state. Heretofore if any individual support was received for a child, nothing could be done for the state. The fund created by this increase will be used for maintenance only.

This is the first of a number of constitutional things which the league is planning.
