

MAC GETS SOLDIER FIELDER

Third Baseman Halcomb Signs Portland Contract—Tiger Infielders Expected.

IN THE spring of 1917, when the Portland club was training in Honolulu, Manager Walter McCredie became very much interested in the playing of a young third baseman of one of the soldier teams. Mac kept in communication with the player, as he had the makings of a good infielder. Saturday, nearly three years afterward, the signed contract of this player was delivered at the headquarters of the local team.

The player's name is Ralph Halcomb. He is a sergeant at Alcatraz at the present time, but expects to get his discharge in time to report to the Beaver camp at Ontario.

PLAYED ON KEARNEY TEAM

Halcomb is a left-handed batsman, and is a pretty good-sized fellow. During the 1918 season he played with Dick Cox, the Beaver outfielder on the Camp Kearney team. Last year he played on the All-Army team of the Bay district.

In addition to the announcement that Halcomb's contract was received, Mac stated that he expected to get one, and possibly two, infielders from the Detroit Americans. Indications are that H. S. Ellison and Benny Dyer will be shipped to the Mackmen.

DYER GOOD HITTER

Provided Portland lands both of them, the infield lineup for 1920 will be: Blue, first base; Ellison, second base; Dyer, shortstop; and Waterhill, third base. Along with these players, Mac will have Kingdon, Spranger, Alonzo Frye, Honeck and Halcomb.

In 44 games with the Tigers last season Dyer hit .247, which would mean that he would hit around the .270 mark in the Coast league. Ellison hit .216 in 66 games.

Should Blue continue to hold out, McCredie will probably call upon the Detroit club for a first baseman, and then again he might trade some of the surplus talent for a first-sacker.

The Beaver boss is confident that he will put out a team this year that will be his own in all respects. He believes that Kallio, Cunningham, Polson and Durning, new hurlers on the team, along with the available talent of last year's pitching staff, he will have a combination of hook masters which will be hard to beat.

SEEKING OUTFIELDER

He is hopeful of landing another outfielder. Dick Cox, who was playing fairly good ball until he injured his ankle, may come back strong this year. Then there are Cuyler and Barabuy to be considered. These two Southern California youngsters are being highly touted by Eddie Herr, who is scouting for the Detroit Tigers.

MAJORS TO OPEN YEAR APRIL 14

Final Games of American and National Leagues Set for Third Day of October.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—(U. P.)—Eight National league teams will get away for the 1920 pennant race on April 14 and will traverse 154 laps up to October 3.

John Heydler, president of the National league, made this announcement here tonight, following his return from a southern hunting trip with Ban Johnson.

Scenes of the four inaugural battles were not announced, as the details are to be considered at a league meeting February 19.

MEETING TO BE EARLY

Selection of a national commission chairman to succeed Garry Hermann is one of the vital problems to be solved during "baseball week," starting in Chicago February 9. Choice of the man who will step into Hermann's shoes depends almost entirely upon the joint committee of both leagues appointed more than a year ago to recommend a new chairman, according to the National league boss.

Mr. Johnson and I discussed the situation, but we have nothing to announce. We do hope, however, that the committee will get together and decide upon some successor agreeable to all parties," he said.

Several of the candidates for the chairmanship are said to have dropped from the ticket. Federal Judge Landis, Chicago, and William H. Edwards, New York, revenue collector, and State Senator James J. Walker, author of the Sunday baseball bill, are still in the running, but John B. Foster, late secretary of the Giants, and John H. Farrell, secretary of the National association, are said to have withdrawn.

MAY KILL SUNDAY BALL

Both, it is understood, would like to be named secretary of the commission to succeed John E. Bruce, who has announced his intention of withdrawing with Hermann.

Along with three boxing bills came rumors from Albany this week that the state legislature would be asked to repeal the Sunday baseball law.

Contests for both men and women have been announced for the occasion and the final affair of the evening will be a duck race in which everyone who participates in the matches is eligible to compete. Wild ducks with clipped wings will be thrown into the water and the swimmers who succeed in catching any of the fowl will have wild duck dinner the next day.

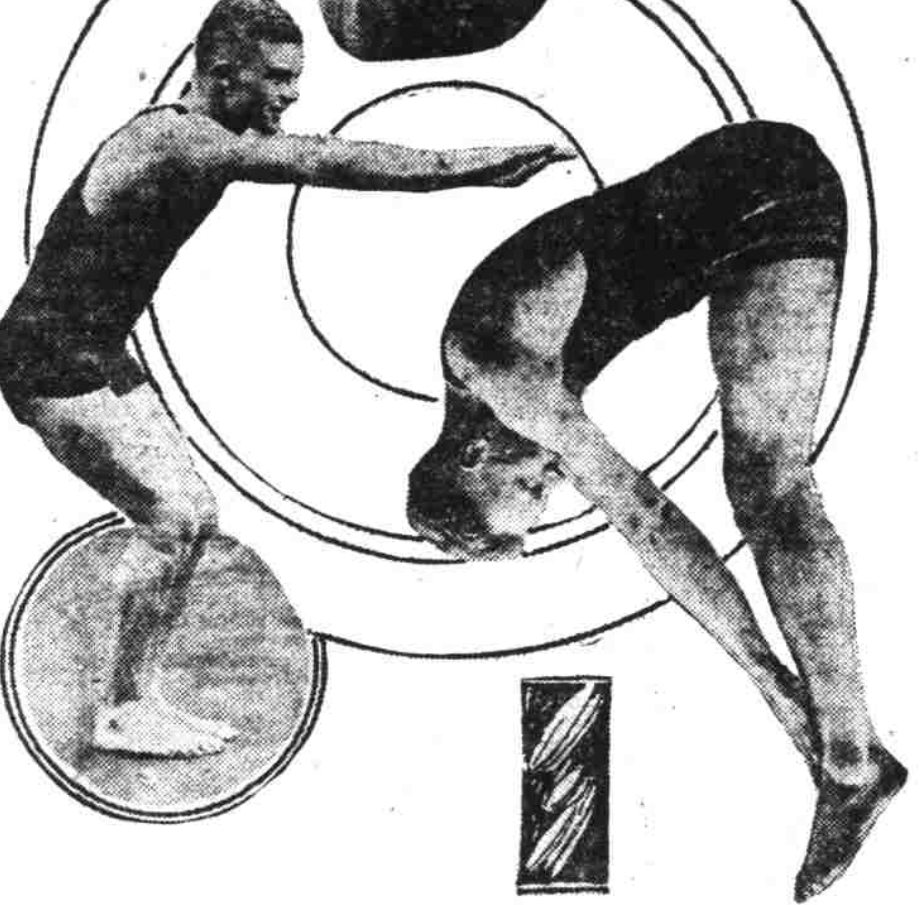

WOLFARD PLACED AT TOP OF STATE TENNIS RANKINGS

Former Stanford Star Won State and City Championships—Goss Is Second.

THE 1919 tennis rankings for the state of Oregon were announced by A. B. McAlpin, president of the organization. Saturday, Catlin Wolfard, winner of the 1919 Oregon state and Portland city championships, heads the list, with the veteran Walter A. Goss, winner of the Irvington club scratch singles last year, ranked in second place.

The ranking committee was composed of James H. Mackie of the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club, James E. Shiver of Irvington club and F. E. Harrigan, representing both clubs and the parent tennis body.

Phil Neer, now of Stanford university, who won the junior singles championship of the Northwest last summer and the Pacific Northwest men's singles title, was given third honors. Because he weathered the city championships until he met Catlin Wolfard, Rogers MacVeach is placed fourth.

Harry Gray, who ranged fifth, won the annual Alma D. Katz competition at the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club and was runner-up in the city tourney. The other tennis players ranked in the order named follow: Harry Westerman, A. D. Norris, Ariz. Munger, Deo Mallett and A. D. Wakeman.

Among the women, Mrs. W. I. Norrington, winner of the city and Irvington club championships, tops the list, while Miss Stella Fording, runner-up in the city contests, Mrs. F. E. Harrigan, Mrs. Harlan Wentworth and Miss Irene Campbell follow in the order named.

Valuable Hunting Dogs Are Poisoned In Eastern Oregon

La Grande, Jan. 24.—Local sportsmen are up in arms over the poisoning of several valuable hunting dogs this week. The work of getting rid of the dogs by means of poison has been going on for some time, but reached its climax this week, following the death of a number of dogs in the same vicinity. As the drug stores keep a list of the poisons sold, it is expected that the guilty parties will be traced down.

The Wing, Fin and Fleetwood club has offered a reward for any information leading to the conviction of the parties. Secretary A. Andrews, in speaking of the matter says: "More protection is due the dog owner, as he pays a state tax, a county tax and a city tax or license on his dog, while an owner of a horse pays only one tax, a county tax. But if his horse is stolen, the thief is usually caught and given a term in the penitentiary, while if some one poisons a \$100 or \$300 hunting dog, nothing is done, even though we pay the triple tax."

There are to be two games with the University of Oregon, two with the Chamawa Indians and a proposition is out with the board of control for a trip to Reno, Nev.

RUTH MAY SET UP A NEW MARK

Home Run King Will Play Seventy Games on His Favorite Field This Year.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—(I. N. S.)—Babe Ruth will set a new home run record next season!

This is the confident prediction of the Babe Ruth Boosters' association, with members in every city and village throughout the land. And here is the reason:

As a member of the New York Yankees the burly Babe will play perhaps 70 odd games of baseball on the Polo grounds next summer. And the Polo grounds are made to order for Ruth's pet brand of home runs.

The Baltimore Babe has a habit of hitting the ball high and far away toward right field stands and fences. He often hits a ball so high that it looks like a handball to the outfielders. And at the Polo grounds the right wing of the big stadium offers a rangy and spacious net for Ruth's homers. Because he hits a ball high he will undoubtedly put many a one into that right field wing.

MADE THREE IN FOUR GAMES

The more excitable members of the Ruth Boosters' club are predicting undreamed of things for the star slugger. The conservative element is agreed that Ruth will probably better his 1919 mark by five or six homers. If he can hammer out six more he will set the mark at 35, which will be some record for future sluggers to shoot at.

Figuring that Ruth made four of his 23 homers at the Polo grounds last summer and visited the metropolis only three times, it is easy to see where the boosters are getting their ideas. Naturally, the Babe hit a homer in 50 per cent of the games in which he appeared in New York, and he could not have played in more than 10. Therefore what is to be expected of him in some games with the Yankees this year in a park made to order?

NOT A FLASH IN PAN

Nine of the Babe's circuit smashes of 1919 were made at Boston. His records in the other cities follows: New York 4, St. Louis 3, Philadelphia 2, Chicago 3, Cleveland 2, Detroit 2, Washington 1. And there is no reason to believe that he may not better these records on foreign fields, with the exception of Boston.

Ruth's hitting has been no flash in the pan. He has always been a steady wielder of the willow, and though there is a chance that he may find it difficult to hit better than .322, his very fine average in 130 games last season, the chance that he will knock out more home runs than he did last season is stronger because of a change in clubs.

Ruth is the brightest star in the biggest drawing card in baseball today. Ty Cobb, Eddie Collins, Walter Johnson, Eddie Cicotte, Grover Alexander, George Sisler and some others are still scintillating, but they are not in the baseball firmament with the brilliance that is Ruth's.

WILL INSPIRE YANKS

Harry Frazee was able to get an unheard of price for Ruth because of that fact. For the same reason, Colonel Ruppert and Hutton were willing to pay that unheard of price. One hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars tops the best previous price paid for a ball player by about seventy thousand berries. Some \$100,000 was paid for the star in 1915, and at \$35,000, yet Ruth, apparently is worth that money to the New York club.

If he lives up to expectations he will draw it all back to the turnstiles next summer.

Harry Frazee could not be blamed for selling Ruth. He got a fabulous price and disposed of a player whose brilliant hitting had an effect on the playing of the other members of the Red Sox, many of whom are temperamental players. The Yanks, of course, are taking the same chance in billing Ruth as their headliner. But the members of the Yankees are new to Ruth as a club mate and he is new to them. Therefore he will be more of an inspiration to the Yanks than an object of envy.

FRENCH TO HANG UP A BIG PURSE

Seven Hundred Thousand Dollars May Be Offered for Bout; Georges Coming Soon.

PARIS, Jan. 24.—The record breaking purse of \$700,000 may be offered for the Dempsey-Carpentier fight by a syndicate of French sporting men anxious to have the bout held in France. If this amount is raised, it will be divided \$400,000 for Dempsey and \$300,000 for Carpentier. The French syndicate is headed by Prince Murat.

In the meantime other promoters are still campaigning to land the fight for America. Nate Lewis of Chicago, who is now in Paris trying to sign Carpentier to meet Dempsey in New Orleans in behalf of Dominick Tortorich, said to Universal Service today:

CONTRACT EXPIRES SOON

In regard to Cochran's offer to bet \$100,000 that Carpentier will sign an iron-bout contract not to fight anywhere but in England under his management, Francois Deschamps assured me yesterday that Carpentier, under Carpentier's management, will sign with Cochran, will be free to accept other offers after February 1, unless Cochran is able to produce Dempsey's signature by that time.

It practically makes it a certainty that the bout will not be staged in England, for it is not considered possible here that Dempsey will accept Cochran's offer, inasmuch as both Tortorich and Tex Rickard have offered at least twice as much.

WATCHING FOR RELEASE

Prince Murat, who is heading the French syndicate, declares he is confident that the patriotism of French sportsmen will mean the raising of the proposed \$700,000 purse an easy matter, and that it will be possible to post satisfactory forfeits as soon as Carpentier is released from his contract with Cochran.

CARPENTIER IS TO SAIL FOR AMERICA MARCH 15

Paris, Jan. 24.—Georges Carpentier, heavyweight champion of Europe and aspirant to the world's title, is to sail for New York on March 15, accompanied by his manager, Francois Deschamps, on his way to Los Angeles to fulfill a motion picture contract. It is expected that the Frenchman will give a few exhibitions while he is in the United States, and it is also considered probable that the much-talked-of match with Jack Dempsey also will be arranged before he and Deschamps start back home.

Should the match be arranged to take place at Tia Juana or somewhere in the United States, of course Carpentier will be likely to make the trip, but he will remain until after the match in order to become thoroughly acclimated.

Bill Unmack to Give Lecture at 'Winged M'

William Unmack, former sporting writer of San Francisco and an overseas "Y" secretary, will give a lecture to senior members of the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club in the "Winged M" gymnasium Tuesday night, his subject being "The history of the game." He will be illustrated with motion pictures of the interallied games held in Paris last June. Unmack has been held in all the principal clubs and colleges in the East, and he has planned on touring the Northwest, visiting various clubs and schools. Motion pictures of scenes on the battlefield will be one of the attractions. The event is free for men members of the club only, and will start at 8 o'clock, according to an announcement made yesterday.

Fair Association To Meet Here Monday

A very comprehensive program has been arranged for the annual meeting of the North Pacific Racing association which opens at the Imperial hotel, Monday morning, at 10 o'clock.

President George R. Walker of the association will appoint the various committees, following his response to the address of welcome to be given by Mayor Baker. These committees will report at the Tuesday afternoon session.

Indications are that harness racing in the Northwest will enjoy a very successful season this year.

Mrs. Wolgast Files Suit Against Ad

Los Angeles, Jan. 24.—(I. N. S.)—Ad Wolgast, veteran of the prize ring and one time lightweight champion of the world, was made defendant in a suit for separate maintenance filed today by his wife, Mildred Wolgast. Mrs. Wolgast asked for an allowance of \$250 a month, that her husband be restricted from disposing of his property pending a hearing, and that she be awarded a share of the property, which she alleged was community property.

COACHES SEEKING P. C. JOBS

Applications for Position at Stanford and Corvallis Are Many; Washington Seeks Man.

THREE Pacific Coast Intercollegiate conference football teams—Oregon Agricultural college, University of Washington and Leland Stanford—will introduce new gridiron mentors to the followers of the American game next fall.

Applications for the positions at Corvallis and Palo Alto are said to be pouring into the hands of athletic committees, while Washington is on the lookout for a high class coach to succeed Claude J. Hunt, who resigned last week to return to Carleton college in Minnesota as athletic director.

Enoch Bagshaw, former University of Washington star and coach of the Everett, Wash., high school eleven for the past nine years, is being boosted as Hunt's successor. Bagshaw has made a wonderful record at Everett and has turned out some of the best men in this section of the country.

Others mentioned for the post are Arthur J. Williams, coach of the University of Southern California team; Forrester, Wayne Sutton, Ernie Wells, coach of one of the scholastic teams in State, and Allison, coach of the University of Washington team.

DOBE NOT COMING

Rumors that Gil Dobie, former University of Washington mentor and now head coach of the United States Naval academy eleven, would return to the Coast are idle gossip. There is little likelihood that Dobie will leave Annapolis, although reports were circulated that he would accept a position at Stanford. Dr. A. D. Browne, athletic director at Stanford, stoutly denied them.

It has been learned upon good authority that William J. Helms, who put Georgia Tech on the football map, may succeed William H. Hargis as football coach at the Oregon Agricultural college. President Kerr's decision whether the new man shall be athletic director or coach of the football team is awaited before any definite action is taken by the athletic council.

MAHAN AT STANFORD

M. E. Fuller, former coach of the University of West Virginia team and a former Yale man, who was one of the applicants for the position at Oregon Agricultural college, has accepted the directorship of athletics at the University of Colorado. Fuller formerly coached Colby college and the University of Maryland.

Although there has been denial of report that Bob Evans would be replaced at the Leland Stanford university, it is understood that the Palo Alto alumni has taken a hand in the question of putting the Cardinals at the top of the heap on the gridiron again. Evans made a wonderful record with the Cardinals last year.

Following the Harvard-Oregon game at Pasadena, reports were circulated that Eddie Mahan, who assisted in whipping the Cambridge eleven into shape for the contest, would succeed Evans as head coach of the Cardinals. That William Hargis, also an alumnus of the Harvard team, will be stationed at Stanford.

THREE ARE SIGNED

Andy Smith will have charge of the California team again next season. Gus Welch of Washington State college and Shy Huntington, who carved a name in the football hall of fame by his work during the past year, have signed their 1920 contracts.

In the Northwest conference, the University of Idaho will have a new coach, a member of the All-American team, has been offered the berth as coach at Idaho, according to advice from the East. Harley, it is understood, will offer in order to finish his education.
