

PICTURE DISPLAY AT ART MUSEUM IS IMPORTANT ONE

Exhibition of Pictorial Photography at Art Museum First Ever Obtained for Pacific Coast

The exhibition of pictorial photography now open at the art museum is one of the most important collections of camera work that has been shown in the United States. These represented are members of the Pictorial Photographers of America, a national organization with executive headquarters in New York city.

The first efforts to gain for the pictorial photograph recognition in the art world as a possible work of art and an endorsement as such by painter, sculptor and art critic, dates back some 20 years. At that time important exhibitions by the "Linked Ring" of London inaugurated annual exhibitions where the most individual work was shown. Then followed an active movement in this country fostered and developed by Clarence H. White, Gertrude Kasebier and Joseph T. Kirby of New York, P. Holland of Boston, Edmund Sterling and Eva Watson of Philadelphia and William B. Dyer of Chicago, now a resident of Portland.

PICTURES INDORSED

The efforts of these workers, responded to by the most advanced and progressive pictorialists of England and France, resulted in annual international salons held in New York city, at the Academy of Fine Arts in Philadelphia, Carnegie gallery in Pittsburgh and the Art Institute in Chicago. All pictures shown at these exhibitions were judged and indorsed by juries composed of artists and critics. In 1908 the same American workers mentioned above, aided by others who had developed remarkable skill and intense interest, notably Edward Steichen and Alvin Langdon Coburn, brought about an organization of free lances known as the "Photo Secessionists," who prosecuted the work of raising the standard of the photographic picture through their beautiful publication, Camera Work, and by important exhibitions at the Little Galleries in New York city.

The secessionists served the cause with good results for several years and their work has been taken up and is being advanced by the more recent organization, the Pictorial Photographers of America, democratic in its policy, but most exacting in the matter of the standard of pictures put on exhibition. The association annually assembles in New York city two or three traveling exhibitions which are shown in various art centers of the eastern part of the country.

FIRST EXHIBIT HERE

The present display at the Art Museum is the first that has been obtainable for the Pacific Coast and will go to Seattle later in the month and then to Denver. The exhibition for Portland has been largely brought about by William B. Dyer of this city, who has continued his active interest in pictorial photography since coming to Oregon several years ago. Mr. Dyer was one of the few American members of the Linked Ring of London, the Photo Secessionists of New York city, and now active with the Pictorial Photographers of America. The object of this exhibition is not so much to invite the public to judge as to what might be the best work shown, as it is to present all of the pictures possessing highest merit and portraying serious thought and purpose on the part of each worker in his or her own way.

Owing to the lack of wall space for the hanging of these pictures the committee has announced that the collection will be hung in two units. The first representing the East and local members was replaced January 21 by the second unit, representing the West and the Pacific coast which will occupy the walls until February 1.

Pictures of Scouts On Trip Are Shown

Late Silverton Man Planned Settlement

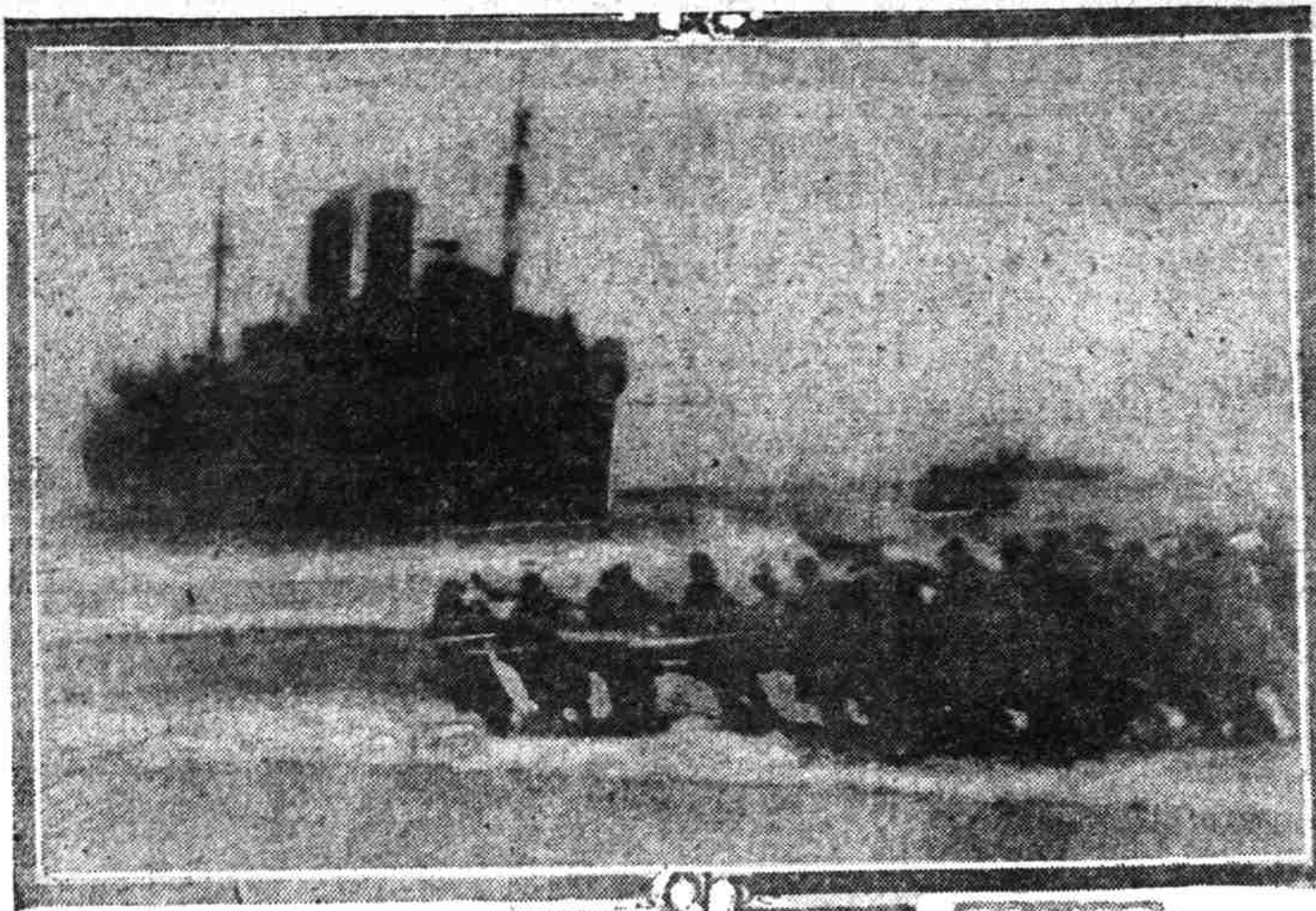
Silverton, Jan. 24. — In the recent death of C. C. Wenger of the Swiss settlement, six miles south of this city, one of the prime movers in the formation of the settlement passed. Mr. Wenger came to Oregon in 1876 and letters which he wrote and which were published in Eastern and Middle Western papers led many Mennonites to Oregon, who settled near Silverton, forming the Swiss settlement, a thrifty settlement. Mr. Wenger's body was buried in a plot which he had given for a cemetery.

British House Lifts Ban on Typewriters

London, Jan. 24. — (I. N. S.) — More records are being broken by the "mother of parliaments." After a spirited battle in the press gallery, age old traditions have been shattered and typewriters are to be admitted. A special room has been set aside for them. There are few country weeklies in the States where a "club" can be found without knowledge of the usual office "mill." In Fleet street, but few reporters use a typewriter, though all know shorthand. The sentiment against them is so great that it was only after the younger generation in parliament's press gallery "went to the mat" for weeks that they won a place for typewriters in the house.

Yellow Pine Tract Put Up for Sale by The Forest Service

The district forester is advertising a small tract of yellow pine timber on Antwine creek within the Okanogan national forest, the minimum price of which is \$2 per thousand feet for yellow pine and \$1 for Douglas fir. The timber adjoins the tract which was sold a few months ago to a local company which is cutting apple boxes for the Okanogan fruit business.

A contract was approved Thursday with the H. B. Stanton Lumber company for about 4,000,000 feet of timber to be cut on the Henry creek watershed on the Colville national forest. The price is \$2 a thousand feet of yellow pine, \$1 for Douglas fir and larch, and 25 cents per cord for cordwood.

DREDGING OPERATIONS NOT TO BE HAMPERED BY LEGISLATIVE ACT

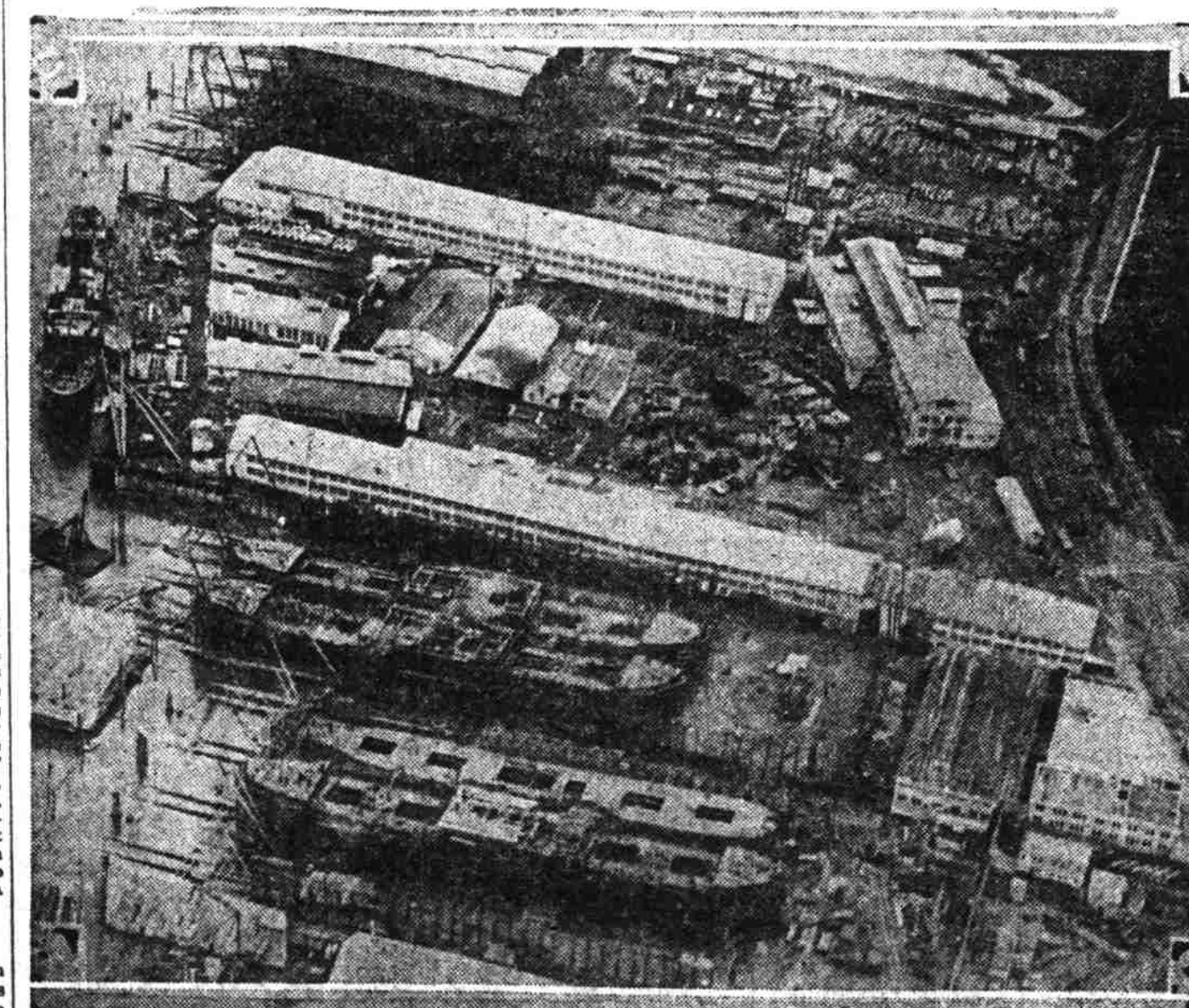
Bill for Restoration of Agricultural Lands Will Have but Slight Effect.

Baker, Jan. 24.—That the proposed bill to compel the restoration of all agricultural lands worked by gold dredges in Oregon will not suspend the operation of any dredge is the opinion of Senator W. H. Strayer and Representative Allen A. Smith, who will submit the bill for adoption at the next session of the state legislature.

The Baker county legislators believe, moreover, that only one dredge, that of the Powder River Gold Dredging company, operating in the McEwen valley, will in any way be affected by the measure, basing their opinion on the claim that there exists a device now used in California that separates surface soil from the gravel beneath and replaces it as the dredging progresses.

The Western Dredging company already plans to employ this device on its property in Northern Malheur county. The Sumpter Gold Dredging company will not operate in agricultural land. The dredge near Canyon City is said to be working only ground that is valueless for other purposes. Senator Strayer and Representative Smith believe that the Powder River Dredging company can conform to the law and at the same time continue dredging by simply adding the soil restoring device to their equipment. The McEwen valley dredge is reported to have been extracting gold at the rate of \$1000 a day.
