

UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF FORESTRY WANTS UNDERBRUSH SAVED

Forester Says People of West Should Unite to Conserve Trees Protecting Water.

Moscow, Idaho, Jan. 24.—The forestry school of the University of Idaho, working in conjunction with the forest service, is urging the preservation of timber and undergrowth on the watersheds in the West to preserve the supply of water for irrigation purposes. Clarence E. Favre, a graduate of the school of forestry here, but now in charge of the Humboldt forest reserve in Nevada, has been lent to the university forestry school for a series of lectures for its ranger course now in session. In his addresses Favre lays stress on the need of protecting the watersheds to retain the snow and moisture. In summing up this situation, Favre says:

"The Western states can, perhaps, be classed as essentially an irrigated district, and therefore anything that would serve to diminish the stream flow or cause the flow of streams to be irregular in these states should be a matter of intense interest not only to those directly concerned but to all the people of the United States.

"It has been recognized for a number of years that stream flow can be influenced very materially by providing or maintaining a vegetative cover on the headwaters of our streams. We, however, fail to recognize in the great majority of cases that this vegetative cover should consist not only of tree growth but also of various other plant species such as grasses, weeds and brush. While the growth serves to protect the snow from the rays of the sun, it does not furnish a serious mechanical impediment to the rapid run off, nor is the root system of trees such as to most effectively retain the surface soil when being washed by rapidly flowing water. It is rather the undergrowth that is the real reservoir which supplies the irrigation water in the time of real need in the summer months.

"It can thus be seen that irrigation farming is closely associated with the business of protecting and regulating stream flow, which in turn involves the protection of the forests, hence forestry. There is also another important industry of the West that must be closely associated with forestry and also with farming, and that is stockraising. Certainly the majority of our farmers in the Western states are directly or indirectly interested in stockraising which in turn is dependent very greatly upon the remaining public domain in our national forests."

William H. Webb

William H. Webb, one of the best known real estate men in the city, died Wednesday at his home, 490 East Nineteenth street, at the age of 56. He was a native of Georgia, and had been in the real estate business in Chicago before coming to Portland in 1910. At one time "Bill" Webb, as everybody soon learned to call him, was in the hotel business in San Antonio, Texas. His specialty was in leasing business properties and many of the most important deals in the city in these lines had been managed by him.

Webb was from an old Southern family. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Mabel Webb, and a daughter, Miss Virginia Webb, both of this city. His mother and two sisters reside in New York city, and a brother, Eugene Webb, lives in Miami, Fla. The funeral services were held Friday at the Pinney chapel, the Rev. A. A. Morrison officiating. Final services were at the Portland Crematorium.

William H. Webb was noted for his many services to his friends and his kindly interest in everyone. He sought to do good in this world's goods that each party to a transaction regarded him as a friend, as indeed he was, serving both with faithfulness and pleasure.

IDAHO SOLONS ARE TO HOLD SESSIONS IN ROOMING HOUSE

Unusual Meeting Place Necessary For Special Suffrage Session; Capitol Being Rebuilt.

Boise, Idaho, Jan. 24.—When the Idaho solons gather here on February 11 for the special session of the legislature, called by Governor Davis to take action on the woman suffrage amendment, they will hold their meetings in a rooming house taken over by the state.

The two new wings to the state house, under construction, will not be completed until December 1. The old wings that quartered the past sessions of the legislature have been razed. Consequently the state has taken over a rooming house directly opposite the state house, where the special session will be held next month.

Ninety per cent of the delegates to the convention of the Idaho State Federation of Labor are favorable to the Non-Partisan league and its program and will support that organization at the coming state legislature, is the opinion of R. P. Park, president of the federation, upon his return from the convention at Pocatello.

Senator John F. Nugent, in a letter to Lewis Williams, collector of internal revenue in Idaho, says he is hopeful of ex-Governor James H. Hawley's appointment to a position in the cabinet to succeed Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the interior, who some time ago announced his intention to return to private life. Fifteen United States senators also have pledged their support to Hawley, according to Senator Nugent.

Purchase by the state of Idaho of 1280 acres of public lands on which now is situated the Warm river hatchery, is proposed by the state land commissioner, I. H. Nash, who today took up the case with the state land board and later, with the land board's approval, to Otto M. Jones, state game warden. The tract in question was offered to the state some 10 years ago at the price of \$125 per acre, but although the hatchery there was operated by the state, no move to buy the land was made. The federal offer still holds good, Commissioner Nash believes, and, cooperating with the state game warden, he hopes to consummate the purchase at the \$125 price. The tract is in the Island park district of Fremont county.

Following a checking of his accounts by examiners of the state department of finance, who found discrepancies amounting to approximately \$900 which could not be accounted for, Arthur C. Tracy, auditor of Valley county, has resigned that position. Mr. Tracy balanced the book by paying the necessary amount over to the county. Carl Kitchen was appointed by the board of county commissioners as auditor.

Two thousand head of sheep were drowned near the mouth of the Owyhee

river when an ice gorge formed in the river, and, sweeping down, blocked just below the feeding camp of Sam Ballantyne. The gorge backed the water up to the camp and sheep herders were awakened to find their beds floating about the room. In its wake, the gorge caught about 2000 head of sheep, which at present values would be worth at least \$30,000. The gorge occurred in the night, thus preventing any chance of rescuing the sheep.

The John Regan post of the American Legion has demanded that the state land board recall and rescind all action taken leading to the segregation of more than 500,000 acres of land in Owyhee county for reclamation by the Twin Falls-Bruneau Land Water company. The effect involves the expenditure of \$60,000. A report of a committee charged that the members of the state land board had used the large powers of their office to further the alleged scheme of segregation, promoters to bring about the segregation.

Following adoption of the report the commander of the post was authorized to draft resolutions addressed to the state land board, the state commissioner of reclamation, the department of the interior, congress and others, stating why the American Legion opposes the company getting control of the land.

Only one vote was recorded against the report, cast by a member of the committee which drafted it. Miss Florence Murray of Grangeville has the distinction of being the first woman deputy sheriff to be named in the state of Idaho.

For the last few months she has been acting as deputy county recorder. In taking up her new duties she will be given the same work as a regular deputy sheriff, with the only difference being for prosecutions, but also will make arrests.

U. OF O. AND O. A. C. TO DERIVE GREAT BENEFIT IF NEW LEVY CARRIES

Greater Progress in Education Will Be Made if Voters Sanction Legislature's Work.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Jan. 24.—A bill providing for an annual tax of 1.2 mills for additional support of the University of Oregon and the Oregon Agricultural college was passed at the special session of the legislature just adjourned. To this is added .06 of a mill for the support of the Oregon State Normal school. The 1.2 mills assigned to the university and the college are to be divided on the basis of three sevenths to the university and four sevenths to the college. At the present assessed valuation of property in the state of Oregon this tax levy will yield about \$250,000 for the university and \$80,000 for the agricultural college.

STATE MONEY MATCHED
In addition to passing this measure the legislature also made an appropriation of \$100,000 toward the completion and equipment of the new building of the university. This is in addition to the appropriation of \$100,000 made contingent upon the securing of \$100,000 from private subscription to match the state appropriation. In order to secure the balance of the \$100,000 appropriated by the state originally it will still be necessary to secure about \$20,000 more from private sources. Approximately \$80,000 has already been pledged and enough has been paid in so that \$75,000 of the state money has been matched and contracts have been let for approximately \$100,000 worth of construction on the building. The \$50,000 appropriation made by the legislature makes it possible to go ahead at once and start contracts for the construction and completion of the building at the earliest possible time. If all goes well with construction the building or at least a part of it ought to be ready for occupancy by the opening of college in the fall of 1920.

UP TO VOTERS
Much satisfaction has been expressed by the friends of the university over the action of the legislature. The \$50,000 for the women's building insures its early completion and the joint millage measure to be submitted at the special election this spring will, if it carries, provide sufficient funds not only for taking care of increased cost of maintenance of the university, because of the greatly increased enrollment and rising prices, but will also make possible a substantial building program. It is to be realized that an energetic campaign is necessary to show the people of the state the need for much greater support than has been given in the past if the state is to have higher educational institutions in which it can take pride. It is very certain, however, that friends of the university will unite in putting on, in cooperation with friends of the other institutions of education in the state in general, a very strong campaign which will insure the passage of the measure.

DEFICIENCY MEASURE
Reduction Exceeds \$36,000,000 Sum
Washington, Jan. 24.—(U. P.)—Carrying a total of new and re-appropriations of \$99,894,842, the second deficiency appropriation bill was reported to the house today by the appropriations committee.

The total is a reduction of more than \$36,000,000 from the estimate.

WOMEN GAIN HIGH PLACE IN AFFAIRS. VIEW OF OFFICIAL

Mrs. Preston, Washington School Head, Finds Pre-war Language Missing; Portlanders Lauded.

Olympia, Wash., Jan. 24.—Women in politics and national affairs are not merely tolerated, they are listened to, applauded and encouraged. This is the statement of Mrs. Josephine Corliss Preston, state superintendent of public instruction, president of the National Educational association, and one of the vice chairmen of the national woman's executive committee of the Republican party, who returned this week from a trip to Washington, Chicago, San Francisco and Nevada.

"Women have not gone back to the language of the pre-war period," she said. "They have laid aside their knitting and Red Cross activities, but they are vitally interested in the issues of the hour."

Mrs. Preston has returned with a more enlarged vision than ever of the crisis the nation is facing because of the teacher shortage and the calamity it is certain to bring was discussed. In Chicago it is true that school teachers, the poorest paid and most loyal, are being paid less than janitors. A girl who does the simplest sort of baking in a tailor shop in Chicago, working 44 hours a week, with ideal surroundings, gets practically twice as much as does the school teacher.

"People are commencing to realize that tens of thousands of teachers are leaving their posts and answering the call of more lucrative professions and trades. Everywhere the leading educators and leaders in public affairs are aroused concerning this problem of teacher shortage and realize that if the bulwark of the nation is to endure we must remedy the futile compensation system by which our teachers are paid."

Mrs. Preston was present at the meeting of Western Republicans in San Francisco, at which party affairs in the West were discussed. "Too much cannot be said of the fine showing and impression the women from the Northwest made," she said. "Mrs. J. H. Mendenhall of Seattle, state chairman of the Republican women of Washington; Mrs. L. C. Davenport, state chairman for Oregon; Miss Margaret Roberts of Boise, Idaho, and Mrs. George McMath, Portland clubwoman, gave the reports. In all my travels through the East and California I met no able women than these four from the Northwest."

Among the speakers whom Mrs. Preston hopes to obtain for the N. E. A. convention were: Herbert Hoover, president, John Finley, W. C. Bagley, Payson Smith, Sarah Louise Arnold, Cora Wilson Stewart and the nominees for president, Republican and Democratic.

O. A. C. RIFLE CLUB TO ENTER PICKED TEAM IN INTERCOLLEGIATE FIELD

Busy Program Being Outlined to Make the Members Capable to Compete in National Shoots.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Jan. 24.—The O. A. C. Rifle club now has 48 members and plans to affiliate with the National Intercollegiate Rifle association are nearing completion. Special tryouts will be held soon for the purpose of picking a team to represent the club in the national intercollegiate contest.

Each club entering will shoot off its score on its own grounds. The comparison of scores will decide the contest. Many crack shots of regular army teams have joined the club, and the members are enthusiastic over its chances of winning the contest.

The members of the club have been divided into three groups, each group practicing one night each week. A field range west of Corvallis will be used for long distance work. Regular field rifles will be used. Any student or faculty member is eligible for membership in the club. There is an initial fee of \$1 which is the only cost to the club members, the government furnishing arms, ammunition and supplies.
