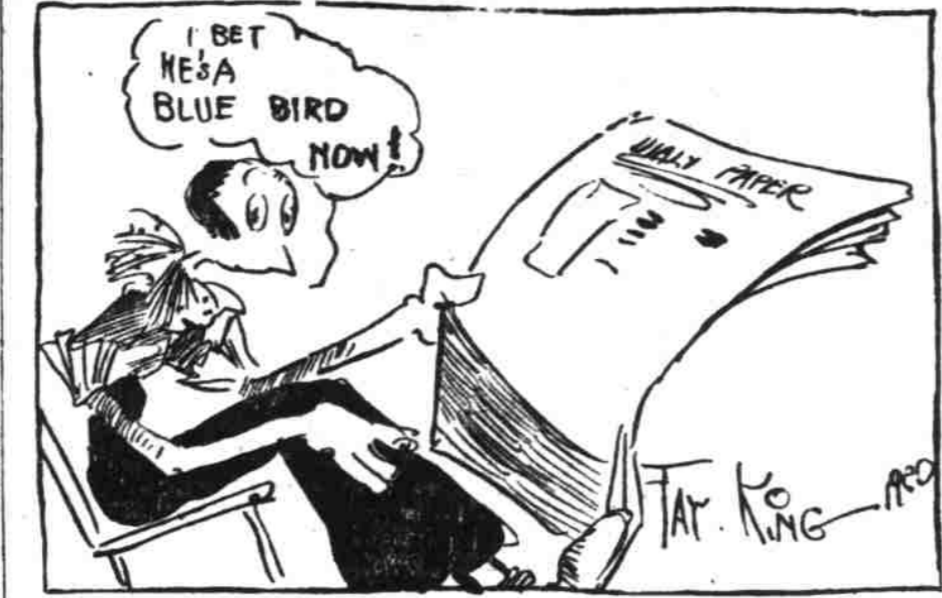

Carl R. Gray, new president of the Union Pacific system, will be the guest of honor of the Chamber of Commerce at a special luncheon in the main dining room of the Oregon building next Tuesday noon, according to tentative arrangements.
