

## 80 EX-SERVICE MEN PLACED IN POSITIONS BY K. OF C. BUREAU

Employment Feature Part of the  
Work of New Night School,  
Opened Recently.

Eighty ex-service men have obtained permanent positions through the Knights of Columbus free employment bureau, room 205 Beck building, according to a statement today by T. M. Maloney, executive secretary.

Two men regularly canvass the city to list positions. While 190 jobs have been offered, 375 ex-service men have applied for work.

The employment bureau is operated in conjunction with the night school, opened a short time ago at 230 Grand avenue north by the Knights of Columbus committee on war activities. Men attending the school are aided in securing work. It is the effort of the bureau, explains Maloney, to secure steady employment for the men, and the short time positions which are placed before the bureau are generally turned over to Liberty temple.

Students are still being enrolled at the night school, according to Principal J. P. O'Hara. Anyone desiring to take up the work and not yet registered, is urged to do so immediately. Special arrangements are made for private instruction to those starting late. Students can still be accommodated in all the classes except auto mechanics. More than 250 have been registered for that, and as only half that number can be cared for, the remainder have been put on a waiting list. Total registration at the school has reached 544.

## Radical Changes in Creamery Control Is Planned in Bend

Bend, Jan. 29.—Plans are being laid for radical changes in the organization of the Central Oregon Farmers' creamery in Bend, probably from a cooperative organization to a corporation. The officers elected were: President, Charles Lipchen; vice-president, Julius Pederson; secretary-treasurer, Almus Neff.

Considerable opposition is being manifested in Bend public schools to the order of the state board of health for vaccination of all school children.

## Tichenor Finds Men Who Were Laboring At Booze Industry

Marshfield, Jan. 29.—Raids were made on illicit manufacturers of whiskey at Reedsport by Deputy United States Marshal F. B. Tichenor, who arrived here Wednesday with five prisoners, three fully equipped stills and a large amount of mash.

Several days ago federal detectives found a still in the Hotel Umpqua at Reedsport. Deputy Tichenor arrested the proprietor of the hotel, Nicholas Browne, on a charge of manufacturing liquor. Browne denied knowledge of the still being in the hotel. Two other stills were found in the country near Reedsport and were seized. Charles Cobb, Fred Eggen, Samuel Conrad and L. K. King were arrested. They will be given a preliminary hearing before United States Commissioner Duncan Douglas.

## La Dow New Federal Auditor of the O-W.

Herbert N. LaDow, chief clerk of the disbursement of accounts division of the O-W. R. & N., has been appointed federal auditor of the O-W., and San Francisco & Portland Steamship company, succeeding Ralph Blaisdell, who has resigned to go with the railroad administration, according to an announcement made by J. P. Brien, federal manager of the O-W. The appointment becomes effective February 1. LaDow has been with the O-W. as chief clerk of disbursements since February, 1915.

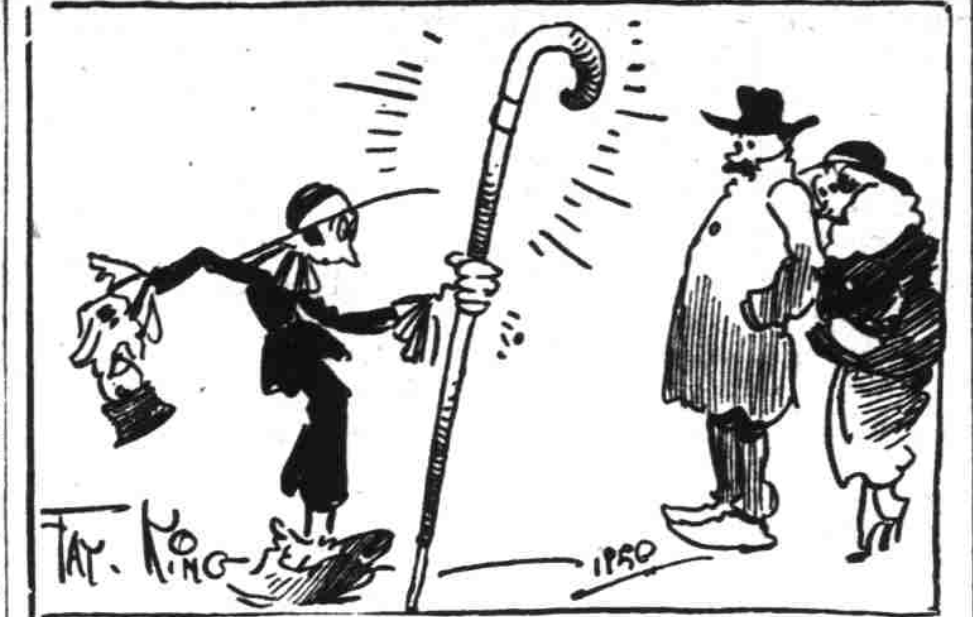

## Pioneer Woman Had Been Resident of Oregon Since 1845

Albany, Or., Jan. 29.—Mrs. Rachael Jane Smead, a resident of Oregon for three-fourths of a century, died at her home in this city Tuesday night, lacking four months of being 88 years old. Mrs. Smead was a native of Knox county, Ohio, coming to Oregon with her parents in 1845. They first settled at Oregon City and two years later the family came to Linn county, where Mrs. Smead had since continuously resided. She had been a resident of Albany 36 years.

Two sons and two daughters, M. V. Smead of Sweet Home, Mrs. Ida Walborn of Crook county, and Douglas and Emma, Smead of Albany, with 12 grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren, survive.

Three cases of Spanish influenza have been reported and quarantined in Albany, and there are five cases of scarlet fever. Dr. Riggs, school health officer, reported having found school children afflicted with scarlet fever in a most infectious stage. The Madison school was thoroughly fumigated.

## MILWAUKIE TEACHERS READY TO STRIKE FOR MORE PAY, THEY SAY

Seventeen Insist on \$25 a Month  
Increase; Board Declares It  
Can't Be Done Now.

Seventeen Milwaukie school teachers say they will quit this evening unless paid more money, while school board members say salary increases are simply impossible at this time.

Seven high school teachers, one special teacher and nine teachers in the grade schools have united in laying down the ultimatum. Their demand is for a flat rise of \$25 a month.

C. D. Hanson, a resident of Milwaukie, said Wednesday evening that 75 per cent of the people of the town had signed a petition asking the board to grant the teachers more pay.

The school board admits some justice to the claim of the teachers, but A. H. Zanders, clerk of the board, said the deficit for the year is already \$13,500, and that no money will be available until May from the bonds authorized at a special election. Mrs. Pearl Wiswinger and C. M. Flach are the members of the board.
