

ARGUMENTS PRESENTED ON LEGALITY OF UNIONS PICKETING SHOE STORES

Greenfield Bfings Action to Enjoin Labor Council From Conducting Alleged Boycott.

Further arguments on the legality of "picketing" stores which disagree with labor unions were set for hearing before Presiding Judge McCourt at 2 o'clock today. The arguments are advanced in the motion of J. R. Greenfield, proprietor of the Wright sample shoe shop and Greenfield's shoe store at Fourth and Morrison streets, asking a permanent injunction restraining the Central Labor Council from establishing pickets in front of his places of business.

John W. Kaste, attorney for the employer, attempted to draw a distinction early in his argument between the employees of the store and the union, stating that the difference existed not between Greenfield and his employees but between Greenfield and the Retail Clerks' Protective association. Attorneys W. S. U'Ren, William Campbell and A. M. Crawford represent the unions.

Court was adjourned late Thursday afternoon when Judge McCourt perceived the confusion of ideas which existed between the opposing lawyers, and they were given until today to prepare a stipulation so the arguments could be resumed on a working basis. The case is in many respects similar to that of the jewelers against the union, where in a circuit court decision was handed

FLU NURSES ASKED TO REGISTER NAMES AT HEALTH BUREAU

Reedsport Man Is Held On Charge of Possession of Still

Marshallfield, Jan. 30.—Deputy United States Marshal Tichnor of Portland arrested Frank Hicks at Reedsport on a charge of having a still in his possession. The still was seized several days ago. Hicks was brought to this city for a hearing before United States Commissioner Douglas. Deputy Tichnor brought two big stills to Marshallfield. One of these he found concealed in a barrel of water at the Cobb blacksmith shop at Reedsport. Cobb was arrested, charged with having mash in his possession. Lute King, brought from Reedsport, was bound over to the federal grand jury and he gave a \$1000 bond.

John Lindberg of Marshallfield was arrested, charged with having liquor and mash in his possession. His rooms in Marshallfield and a house he owns in Outside were searched.

MAJORITY OF OWNERS OF LAND MUST SIGN BEFORE DISSOLUTION

Ruling Given as to Action Necessary Prior to Steps by District Board.

Salem, Jan. 30.—The signatures of a majority of the bona fide owners of land in an irrigation district are necessary to a dissolution of such a district, according to an opinion written by attorney General George M. Brown for the guidance of T. S. McKinley, district attorney for Lake county. In his request for the opinion, McKinley stated that the question of dissolution was up before a district which included some 1600 land owners scattered throughout the United States.

Brown's opinion holds that the approval of a majority of the land owners must be had before the board of directors of an irrigation district can move toward the dissolution of the district, regardless of whether the owners held 10 or 100 acres. Admitting that the provision might work a hardship on some irrigation districts, Brown points out that it is a state law and can only be remedied by legislative action.

TEACHER VOLUNTEERS AS NURSE FOR PILOT ROCK

Washington Grain Fields Washed Out By Raging Waters

Pendleton, Jan. 30.—Miss Martha Johnson, a teacher with nine months' service as an army nurse, volunteered as a Red Cross nurse and was sent to take charge of the Pilot Rock emergency hospital. Miss Stasia Walsh, county health nurse, was released at Pilot Rock to go to Hermiston, where the epidemic has gained a strong hold. Miss Helen Cunihan of Seattle is serving local families as Red Cross nurse, while on furlough from the army service. More than 100 trays were sent afflicted families from the Red Cross diet kitchen.

More Cases Quarantined
Albany, Or., Jan. 30.—Two more cases of "flu" have been placed under quarantine, making a total of five. One of the patients is said to be in a serious condition.

Skehill, the author of "A Singing Soldier," proved himself instantly welcomed to Portland when he spoke here under the auspices of the Ellison-White lyceum bureau on two occasions. Skehill was resting at a local hotel when he caught cold and was removed to the hospital. He is practically unacquainted in the city and the knowledge that he is ill has just been spread.

The young war veteran lost the sight of both eyes and was four times wounded in battle. His wounds have healed and his eyesight was restored in what has been called a "miraculous" manner.
