PRESERVE OREGON
SCENERY. AIM OF
CAMPAIGN BEGUN

Forester Warns Against Destruction of Natural Beauty by Logging Operations and Otherwise.

A campaign for the preservation of Oregon's natural scenery along the sides of the new forest highways to be constructed this year has been launched by the forest service. District Forester George Cecil, in a letter to his supervisors, has sounded the warning against the destruction of scenic effects through logging operations along highways or through felling timber for highway construction itself.

"During the present period of road construction," says Cecil, "irreparable damage will be done in the forests unless a due regard is had for proper landscape and scenic effects. The government cannot escape the responsibility where roads are constructed through appropriations to the forest service. Not only does the service willingly accept that responsibility, but it feels it should take a leading part in the movement for the preservation of trees along scenic highways through cooperation with all road building agencies operating in and near the national forests."

SERIOUS DAMAGE DONE

Cecil calls attention to the serious damage done to some of the important highways of Washington by logging operations on private lands and refers to the national park administration, the National Parks association of Washington and the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce as organizations working toward the preservation of Northwest highways.

Regarding the proposal that the forest service acquire private lands of permanent forest nature in and near the forests through land exchanges, Cecil defines the policy of the forest service as being favorable to the acquisition of considerable bodies of permanent forest land traversed by important highways and suitable for addition to the forest, but not favoring the securing of narrow strips of land running many miles outside the forest, because of administrative difficulties.

LANDSCAPING IS PROBLEM

The problem of national forest lands, says Cecil, is that of proper landscaping, as regards the cutting of trees and the proper location of important forest roads, changing the road location to reach not only some valuable scenic areas, but decrease construction costs, preserving camp grounds, increasing the scenic value through leaving clumps of trees within the right of way and other items of a necessary recreational plan. Just as a carefully worked out recreational and landscape plan will be a living monument to the administration, says Cecil, "so will a carefully supervised job constantly testify to inefficiency."

In all cases of timber cutting on areas intersected by public roads of sufficient recreation and scenic importance, a border of trees should be left uncut, Cecil warns his supervisors.

HOW BORDER SHOULD RUN

"This border should run from 200 to 500 feet in width," says the district forester, "and the timber borders should be given appropriate parklike treatment." It is suggested that:

Visitors be opened through these borders wherever good exterior views are available.

Due caution be exercised to keep an open view of the road for the protection of motorists.

Wherever possible, a pleasing border of native shrubbery be kept between the roadway and the trees.

"In connection with timber cutting of all kinds," advises Cecil, "recreation areas of value for camp grounds, summer home sites, etc., must be protected in their tree cover."

WIDE COOPERATION SOUGHT

Cecil urges the attack of this problem upon national forest lands as a pre-requisite for securing the cooperation of commercial clubs, county courts, state road commissions and engineers, in securing preservation of trees along roads through private lands and logging works outside as well as inside the forests.

"Few people are advised of a damage of the character we are considering until after the damage is done," reminds Cecil, "and for this reason we must cooperate with agencies having to do with road construction or granting rights of way before the contemplated projects are put through."

Only 1000 Pioneers

Live in Oregon Now,
George Himes Says

Just what is a pioneer? George Himes, secretary of the Oregon Historical society, says, the real Oregon pioneers are those who came to Oregon either by crossing the plains or via Cape Horn up to and including 1855, and those who were born in Oregon up to 1859, the year when Oregon was admitted into the union as a state.

So far as can be determined, about 1000 pioneers are still living. Himes has a completed list of all those who came to Oregon in the years 1812, 1843 and 1844, but after that, the lists are incomplete and have not been segregated into yearly groups.

Himes is constantly adding to and classifying his pioneer information. One of his incomplete bits of research is the determination of the predominance of the previous residence of pioneers north or south of the Mason and Dixon line. Out of 7500 cases, Himes found 56 per cent to have come from the north, 33 per cent south and the balance to have come from foreign countries.

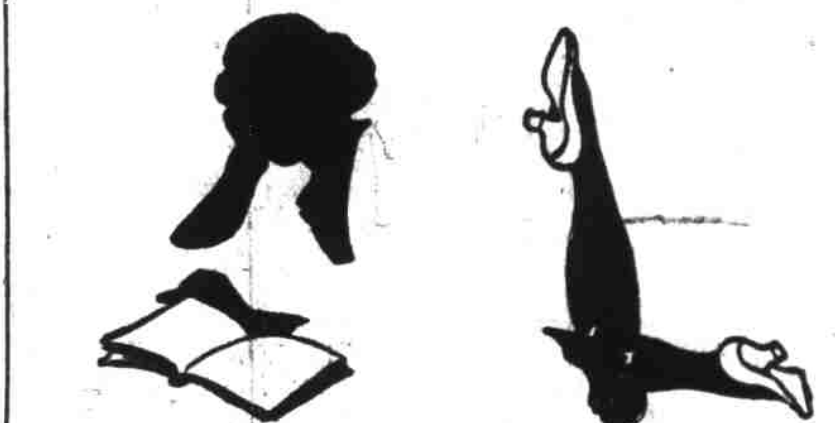
