Corvallis, Jan. 31.—Dr. U. G. DuBuck, professor of psychology at the University of Oregon, spoke to Corvallis business men at the Commercial club luncheon regarding child welfare work in Oregon and told of the necessity of coordinating the agencies in this state that are working to care for the delinquent and defective children and adults. He said approximately 400 defective persons are in the Oregon institution and that this number accounts for but about 15 per cent of them.

Boy Scouts to Honor Leader Man Who Will Never Grow Up

Tribute Is Planned for James West, Long a Leader in Scout Work.



James E. West

James E. West, for 10 years the chief executive of the Boy Scouts of America and known to 400,000 boys of this country as "the man who will never grow up," will be a guest in Portland Wednesday.

When Mr. West was asked what he would like to do while in the city, he said he wanted to see and talk to as many boys as he could, and for that reason arrangements have been made for him to address two of the high school assemblies in the morning.

Prominent men will tender him a luncheon at the Arlington club at noon; in the afternoon he will be taken for a drive up the highway. At 6 o'clock he will be honored with a dinner at the Chamber of Commerce, for which several hundred invitations have been issued.

Following the dinner Mr. West will address a public meeting at The Auditorium, taking as his subject "Conservation of Boyhood." He is said to be a forceful speaker, holding the interested attention of his auditors, be they children or adults.

Mr. West's great interest in children is probably intensified by the fact that his early boyhood was spent in an orphan asylum, he having been left with neither parent at 6 years. By the time he was 16 years old he was practically one of the officers of the institution.

He worked his way through high school and later was graduated from the law school of the National university. Since then he has devoted practically all of his time to social and educational work.

"For every homeless child there is a childless home," is one of Mr. West's slogans, and early in his career as a social worker he found homes for 2000 babies. Later he turned his attention

to the Boy Scout movement and under his leadership the organization has had a tremendous growth. It has over 2500 branches and boasts of over 100,000 members who are in the work for the love of it, giving several hours a week to see that scouting "gets across."

The funeral of Arthur Mather, one of the leading merchants of Clackamas, was held in the Clackamas Congregational church January 22. Rev. E. C. Smith officiating. Mather was one of the best known business men in Clackamas county. He had resided in Clackamas since 1879 when he purchased the general store which he conducted to the time of his death. Mather was born in Netherplace, Newton Mears, Scotland, December 25, 1859, and came to Oregon in 1878. For many years he was postmaster and station agent at Clackamas, and held other offices of trust from time to time. He is survived by his widow, one son and three daughters, Arthur G. Mather, Miss Agnes Mather, Mrs. W. W. Foster and Mrs. R. W. Piper, and one granddaughter, Margaret Piper.

The funeral of Mrs. Harriet M. Riegan, who died Monday, was held Thursday afternoon from the Finley parlors and final services were at Greenwood cemetery. Mrs. Riegan was born December 18, 1852, on the Clatsop plains. Her parents were Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Wirt, pioneers of 1844-7, and her mother was one of the survivors of the Whitman massacre.
