J. FARMER OUT WITH A DEMAND

Beaver Outfielder Wants More Coin, Although Granted Raise; Holdouts Number Six.

AT this writing the Portland Beavers can be divided into four groups.

These divisions are signed, unsigned, holdouts and those who have not been mailed contracts.

The groups and the players in each are as follows:

SIGNED

Delmar Baker and Arthur Koehler, catchers.

Al Sutherland, R. K. Dunning, Fred Lake, George Hier, Ernest Frye, Carl Johnson, Frank Juney, William Leber and Harry Morrison, pitchers.

Carl Spranger, Alonzo Frye, Ralph Halcomb, Albert Honeck and Carl Tuma, infielders.

Walter Schaller, Richard Cox, Cuyler and Barnaby, outfielders.

UNSIGNED

Carroll Jones and Harry Polson, pitchers; Wistertall, infielder; Frank Walker, outfielder.

HOLDOUTS

Clyde Schroeder and George Cunningham, pitchers; Lew Blue and Wes Kingston, infielders; Jack Farmer and George Maisei, outfielders.

The other group contains the name of Rudy Kallio and Lee Dempsey. No contracts have been mailed to these players, but they will go forward this week.

Included in the signed group are a number of youngsters, who may not be taken to the training camps.

TEX EXPECTED TO SIGN

The unsigned groups can be likened unto a fellow on the fence. Wistertall will likely attach his name to the contract tendered him, and Polson is expected to do the same. Jones can be put in the doubtful class and Walker may also be included, although McCredie will probably trade him.

Jack Farmer is the latest player to join the holdouts. Farmer's demand for more money seems unreasonable, as he, like Schroeder and Maisei, was on the sick or injured list during many weeks of the 1919 campaign.

INCREASES GRANTED

Increases were granted to three of the holdouts—Blue, Kingston and Farmer. Cunningham has offered practically the same sum as he received from Detroit and Maisei notified the McCredies that he would not play unless he was given the same salary as last year.

One of the reasons that Schroeder was not given an increase is that his world last year did not entitle him to it, and another is that he was started at \$450 above that paid any player breaking in with the Beavers.

Schroeder is not a young pitcher. He has been hurling around in these parts for a number of years, but never seems

If the other Coast league clubs are having the same trouble as the McCredies are in signing up players, we would not want to be in their shoes. It would not be surprising if some of the holdouts were placed on the suspended list.

BIG DEMANDS MADE

Throughout the entire country the players are making unreasonable demands for increases. Baseball staged quite a come-back last year, but the players do not take into consideration the increased cost of staging games, which includes hotel and boarding bills and railroad expenses, to say nothing of the uniforms and other equipment.

CADDOCK WILL TRY JOE AGAIN

Defeated Mat Artist to Make an Effort to Regain Crown Lost to Stecher.

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—(U. P.)—Earl Caddock, the soldier wrestler of Iowa, who failed to win the world's championship last night from Joe Stecher, may make another effort to regain the title.

Gene Melady, Caddock's manager, said here tonight his charge was not through with the mat game and would try to work his way up to another bout with the champion.

"I have no alibis," Caddock said. "Stecher won the bout on pure merit, and I was the first to congratulate him. I made a mistake in not taking on a few heavy matches before going in for the championship."

"All I can say is I did my best," Caddock said. "Stecher beat me and that's all there is to it. I thought all along I would win."

NO ALIBIS TO MAKE

"You know Earl returned to the game only a few months ago, after a long absence, during which—," Melady began. He was interrupted at this point by the former soldier.

"What's the use of going into that, Gene?" he asked. "I was beaten fairly and squarely on the mat. Let it go at that. I made my mistake in taking on a man of Stecher's ability so soon, and my errors of judgment do not interest the public."

Caddock was pressed to answer if the superior weight of his adversary was a vital factor in the victory.

"His superior weight and strength, of course, were contributing factors," he said. "I did tire, but not until the last 15 minutes. He put a couple of those scissor holds on me and you know they do not refresh you any. However, I can't attribute my defeat to any reason or cause."

STECHEER GIVES CREDIT

Stecher, the winner, was equally gracious in his comment.

"I gave him all I had. He made me work my hardest to win. He was one of the fastest men I ever met and wonderful on the defense. I think I am stronger, more experienced and a better wrestler than I was when we met in 1917," he said.

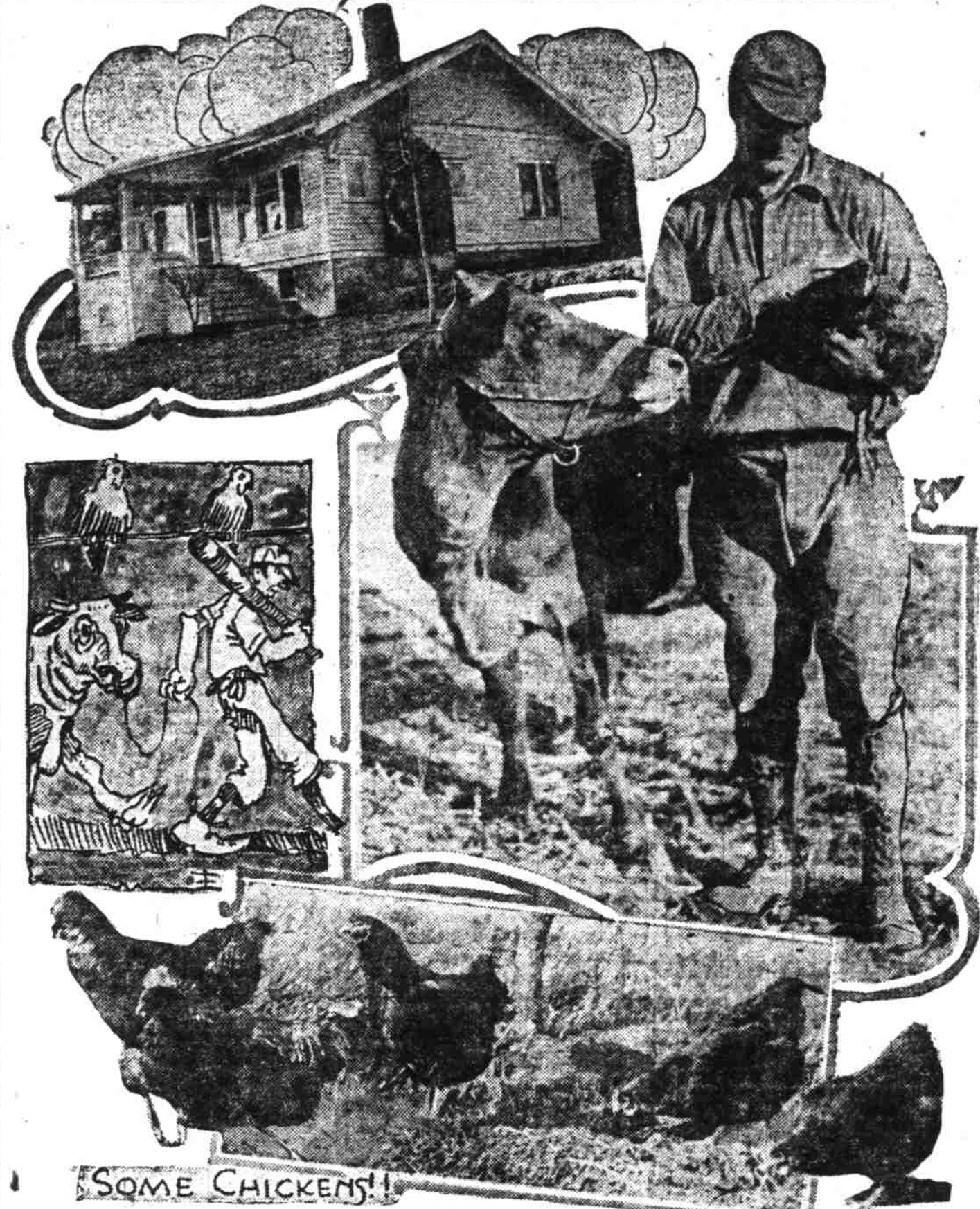
Entries for A. B. C. Close February 18

WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY, Salem, Jan. 31.—Coach Mathews will leave Salem with the "Bearcat" basketball squad on a flying trip through Washington next Monday. The Willamette five will only have two days' rest from their tussle with Eugene when they leave for the big town. Six games will be played in seven days and according to the present work of the squad a successful trip is to be expected.

The "Bearcats" have put in a lot of work since they were trimmed by Whitman in Salem and they will probably give a very good account of themselves when they meet the "Missionaries" at Walla Walla on February 4 and 5. On the 6th they will play the Willamette American Legion team at Ritzville and they will meet the Spokane university five on the 7th at Spokane. The team rests on the 8th and the next two days meet the University of Idaho at Moscow and W. S. C. at Pullman.

Coach Mathews will take eight men, and, according to the latest dope, Captain Wapato, "Tuffy" Irvine and Gansans will go as forwards, Rene Jackson and "Percy" Austin for center and "Russ" Rarey, Brian McKittick and Jeter Jillette as guards.

Will Arrive in Portland Next Week to Train for Contest With Anderson.

JOE BENJAMIN left New York Saturday for Portland to begin training for his fight with Freddie Anderson here the latter part of February.

A message to Willie Bernstein, who will look after Benjamin until Billy Gibson's arrival later, said that Benjamin would stop in Spokane, his old home, for a few days before coming to Portland.

Gibson and Benny Leonard, the lightweight champion, will leave the East immediately after Leonard's tilt with Johnny Dundee, and will be in Portland in time for the Anderson-Benjamin bout. It is likely, says Bernstein, that both Gibson and Leonard will be in Benjamin's corner the night of the fight.

Three Portland boxers entertained the fight fans of Corvallis Friday night. Frankie Webb and Kid Rosco, both of this city, boxed a fast six round draw, and Bud Stevens, another local product, went four rounds to a draw with a Corvallis offering.

The Portland club has 30 players on its roster, but McCredie plans to take only 25 to the Ontario training camp. Los Angeles and Oakland each has 22 players enrolled, and San Francisco and Sacramento each has 21. The Seattle club has 20 men and the Vernon and Salt Lake teams have 17 each.

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San Francisco
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440-Yd. Cinder Oval To Be Laid Soon

Eighth coast artillery corps, located in the Bronx, New York city, will lay a quarter mile cinder track indoors as a drawing card to athletic events they will stage in the world's largest armory.
