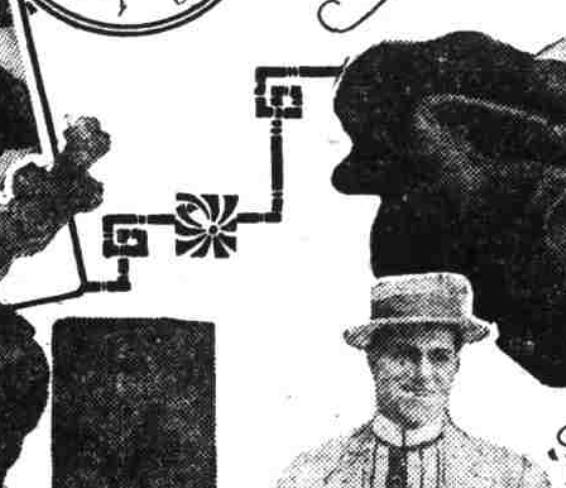

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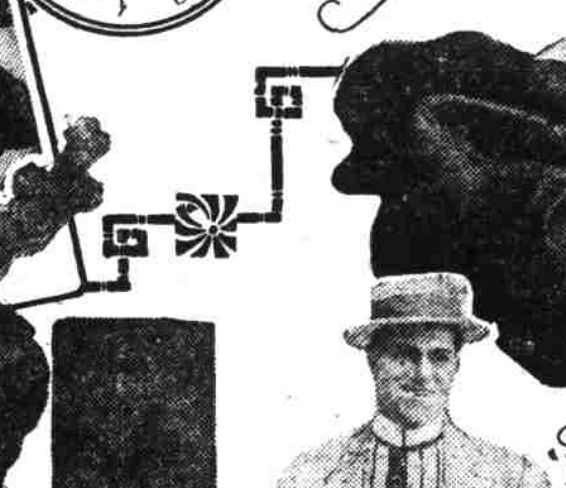
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"Some steppers" are Joe and Pearl Mattus, described as that "wee couple." They contribute comedy, songs and dancing.
