

DANES FREED OF HUN RULE AFTER YEARS OF SLAVERY

Schleswig Occupied by Victorious Armies Until Plebiscite Can Decide Fate of That Province.

Flensburg, Province of Schleswig-Holstein, Feb. 1.—Schleswig is now occupied by interallied troops. In Sonderburg, Habersleben, Aabenraa and Flensburg, where the inhabitants are mainly pro-Danish, the soldiers were cordially received. Sonderburg was decorated with Danish and allied flags in honor of the occasion and when the troops of occupation came they were greeted with bands playing national hymns and with speeches of thanks to the allies.

An old man who in 1864 saw the German troops come in and haul down the Danish flag, was much affected when he saw the same white and red banner hoisted once more in honor of the liberators. He shed tears of joy.

QUARREL OVER ELECTION

In traveling from the Danish side of the border through the first and second zones of Schleswig, one could not help being moved by the happiness of the Danes who for 56 years have been oppressed by Prussian militarism. It was like traveling through a forest of flagstaves. Even the poorest peasant had the Dannebrog (Danish flag) flying from a staff in front of his house. The pro-Danish people must have bought thousands upon thousands of flags to fly on the historic day when they shall be permanently reunited to Denmark.

Much agitation preliminary to the plebiscite is being carried on by both sides but the Germans seem to be unfair in their tactics. They accuse the Danes of having established a big system of bribery and compulsion and say that the Danish farms in Schleswig threaten their pro-German employees with various things until they promise to vote for adherence to Denmark. Offers of food are made to influence the election in some places.

The Nook guard left Flensburg on Saturday by order of the international commission. The Germans in the city held a mass meeting at which protests against the allied occupation were made. After the meeting a big crowd followed the soldiers through the streets to the railroad station.

ERRED FROM SLAVERY

When they boarded the train that was to take them south the Germans were wearing flowers on their uniforms and their rifles. Flowers were showered upon them from the windows as they marched through the city. French and English troops arrived in Flensburg. The international commission came later and the Danes welcomed them with elaborate festivities. Their first feeling is one of joy that they speak and act freely after leading a more or less slavish life under the Prussian regime for more than half a century.

Danes in Flensburg know that in a great measure they have to thank President Wilson's humanity and political foresight for their liberty as he made self-determination by small nations one of the leading principles in the peace treaty with Germany. For this reason the Danes in Schleswig as well as the Danes in Denmark in these historical days let their thoughts and thanks go across the Atlantic to America and her president because of their work for world justice.

Fight Opens Between Poles and Reds on The Dunsburg Front

Berlin, Feb. 2.—Fighting is going on between the Poles and Bolsheviks on the Dunsburg (Dvinsk) front according to dispatches from Warsaw, where it is reported that serious operations are looked for.

It is said that Alexander Kerensky is organizing a new white Russian army to fight the soviet government. In official circles here it is the opinion that in case the Reds attack Poland all the powers signatory to the treaty must under the terms of that document send aid to the Poles.

Foch Denies Charge Against French for Soissons Slaughter

Paris, Feb. 2.—Marchal Foch does not wish to enter the controversy that has been started in America regarding the operations at Soissons, but he opposes the charge made by General Sum-

meral, that American losses were the fault of the French command," said General Weygand, chief of staff of the allied armies today.

"This statement was made in reply to an inquiry regarding Foch's opinion regarding the surrender of General Sumner, former commander of the First American army. This chaotic condition existed before and during the battle of Soissons due to lack of proper preparation by the French and that the victory was due either to accident or divine intervention, rather than to any military plan of action."

"Foch's viewpoint," added General Weygand, "is that General Sumner's knowledge of military science is dubious and that possibly the allied plan of battle was too complicated for him to understand. If unnecessary losses occurred they must have been due to the American commander's erroneous interpretation of the orders of the high command."

Professor Wanted In Germany; Pay Is Only \$35 Per Year

Berlin, Germany, Feb. 2.—The "German Medical Weekly" published the following: "The post of third professor of anatomy is open at Tuebingen university. With the salary fixed at 1200 marks (now equal to \$15) a year, it will be interesting to learn how many academicians will apply for the position. This is not an exceptional case, but rather the rule. While janitors of public schools are drawing 6000 marks (normally \$750) a year, with a number of special bonuses, full fledged university professors average 3000 marks (normally \$375) a year. That is what science has come to in the democratic German republic."

Conditions in the University of Berlin are sad. Well known professors there draw less pay than do the street cleaners. Tutors deliver their lectures clad in seedy, threadbare suits, and often they are compelled to borrow scientific books, which are too expensive for them to buy. One of them assured me that the minimum living salary for him and his family should be 1000 marks (\$125) a month.

"All our efforts to get salaries commensurate with the present prices have been in vain," he said. "And science having no market value in new Germany, we cannot find employment at living salaries."

Lightning Bolt Kills Veteran

GERMANS TRY TO SAVE EX-KAISER FROM TRIAL IN THE ALLIES' COURT

Unexpected Return of Dr. Mayer Believed to Be in Connection With Demanded Extradition.

Berlin, Feb. 2.—The sudden unexpected return from Paris today of Dr. Mayer, the German charge d'affaires, caused considerable stir here. At the foreign office, however, it was stated that there was no special significance in the incident, other than Dr. Mayer planned to come here from Paris often in order to keep in close touch with the government and make verbal reports to the foreign minister. Nevertheless it is generally believed that Dr. Mayer's return to report to the government has to do with the extradition list of alleged war criminals which the allies are expected to present officially before February 16.

As the day approaches for the extradition demand, both government and public are becoming keyed up to a high nervous tension, especially in view of the fact that the cabinet may go to the question on the question in various quarters. The German note asking the allies

to drop the demand for German nationals is taken as confirmation of the reports that the government has unofficial knowledge of the names of those wanted by the allies. On the other hand, this is vigorously denied at the foreign office.

"The government has clung and still clings to the faint hope that the allies will 'open to reason' and realize that it is not to their own interest to force the issue to a point where the present government will fall. It is believed that Dr. Mayer discussed this point with Premier Millerand. Wilhelmstrasse seemed considerably annoyed today that the information had leaked out in Paris that Germany had sent a note on the extradition question, a fact which had been kept dark here. It is known that the government is using every possible argument to persuade the allies not to insist on the literal fulfillment of that paragraph of the treaty of Versailles.

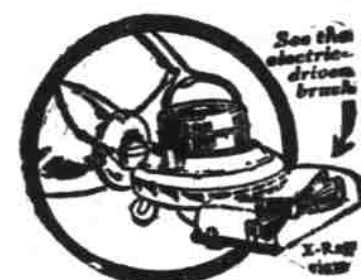

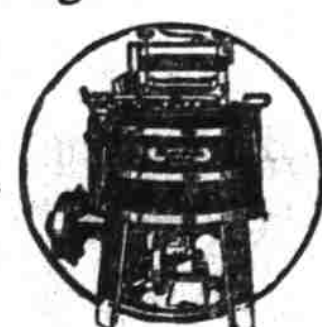
