The weather is much cooler over a strip of country reaching from Manitoba to Oklahoma, and is noticeably milder in parts of Tennessee, North Dakota, Alberta, and British Columbia. The temperature is generally above normal except in the extreme northern Plains region and on the California coast.

Fined For Violating Game Laws—Reports of a series of fines for infractions of the state game law have been reported from various parts of the state. At Tillamook, N. E. Melchior and Welby Elliott were both fined for angling without a license, found guilty at a fine of \$25. Rohl Vanloo, Felmo Breachab and Frederick Delbaeker of Baker were each fined \$50 and given six months in jail, being paroled on the jail sentence, at La Grande, for hunting on a state game refuge. Ray E. Davis and Heraldo McIntosh were fined \$25 at Corvallis for shipping bear skins out of the state unlawfully. McIntosh was convicted on two counts and two sentences imposed.

Woman Speaks on Poultry Raising—Mrs. Allen Seidel, who built up a paying poultry business and established what experts declare to be a model poultry farm, will repeat her talk on successful poultry raising in Multnomah county in a series of talks at branch libraries during the month. She spoke to an overcrowded hall last week in Albina branch. Her second talk will be Friday of this week in Lents branch. The next will be in Peninsula branch, Friday, February 13, the next in North Portland branch, on Thursday, February 19, and the final one in Arleta branch, Thursday, February 26.

Olin Accepts O-W. R. & N. Position—W. H. Olin, with the firm of Reed Bros., Seattle, will be the assistant general freight and passenger agent for the O-W. R. & N., at Seattle, when the railroad goes back to private control March 1, according to an announcement made by Frank W. Robinson, traffic manager of the O-W. Monday. Olin was formerly associated with the Great Western railroad. An assistant to the traffic department at Seattle is a new step for the O-W.

Young Trout Better Protected—Protection of young trout in the new Ochoco irrigation project is being effected by the fish and game commission by the installation of a double screen near the intake which will hold the trout in the upper end of the canal. When the water becomes low in the fall a permanent screen will be built. Without the screen precaution the young trout would go to the head waters and be left high and dry when the waters receded.
