

BOTTLE WAS LEFT BY KINDLY FRIEND, SAYS MRS. HOWEY

Conviction in Municipal Court Is
Dismissed in Higher Court
When Jurymen Fail to Agree.

Mrs. Elsie Howe, convicted of traffic law violation in the municipal court by Judge Rossman, was released this morning in the circuit court. She was accused of operating an automobile while intoxicated. Her husband, Jack Howe, is serving a 150-day jail sentence for being in the machine at the time in a drunken condition, but Howe was not driving.

When the jury, after five and one half hours' deliberation failed to agree, F. T. Lansing, deputy city attorney, and Tom Garland, attorney for the defendant, agreed that the majority vote of the jury should decide whether a new trial should be undertaken. As the vote was 4 to 2 in favor of acquittal, Judge Morrow ordered the case dismissed. The attorneys had previously stipulated that the case be tried before a jury of six.

The machine which Mrs. Howe was driving had careened into a filling station, knocking over the pump. Police testified they found a bottle of "moonshine" on the seat between the Howes. In explanation, Mrs. Howe said she was driving an automobile owned by her mother when she came upon Howe, who was slightly intoxicated. He got in and tried to persuade her to resume the marital ties which had been broken the month before by divorce. She refused to proceed to Vancouver as he asked, she testified.

It was about that time that a friend hailed them and got into the automobile, she testified, but she did not know his name. The man left the bottle and departed, she said. Howe insisted that she drink and finally, to appease him, she did so. The taste made her ill and this illness caused her to run into the pump, she testified.

Judge Morrow announced he would sign a parole for Howe, conditional on his leaving the state.

Passenger Steamer Maine Goes Ashore

Boston, Feb. 5.—(U. S. N. S.)—The passenger steamer Maine, New York to Bridgeport, has gone ashore at Execution Rock, Long Island sound. It was announced at the office of the Fall River line here today. No details are available.

Predicts High Prices for Silver
Oregon silver miners are assured of at least 10 years of high prices for the output of their mines, according to a bulletin just issued by the bureau of mines and geology. Inflation of paper currency throughout the world and increasing demand for silver in China and other Far Eastern countries where it is preferred to gold as a medium of exchange, are among the reasons given for the prevailing high price of the precious metal. For the first time in 46 years silver is valued at a higher rate than 16 to 1 to gold.

Mrs. Wilson Denies Threatening Brown, In Murder Mystery

Marysville, Cal., Feb. 5.—(U. P.)—Mrs. Gertrude Wilson, on trial charged with the murder of Charles Brown, declared under examination today that she had never threatened Brown. With one exception, she said, she never had called him a vile name.

She once called him a "dirty cad," she said, when she saw him with her sister in an automobile.

Mrs. Wilson denied she had told Alfred Grant after the killing that "murder has been committed." Charles Brown has been shot.

The court refused to allow the prosecution to introduce a letter said to have been written to Brown by Mrs. Wilson.

Woman Joins-in County Contest For Constable

Mary B. Jackson, 35 years old, Republican, has filed for the office of constable on a "square deal to all" platform. Mrs. Jackson is the first woman to ever file for the job of constable in Multnomah county, and is the first person to file the nominating petition for primaries this year. She asserts that she is perfectly able to perform the duties of the office, even though she is a woman.

Gervais Raiser's Sow Takes Prize; Is Sold for \$305

Salem, Feb. 5.—Lucy S. Pride, exhibited by E. C. Naffziger of Gervais, was awarded grand championship in the Durco hog show at the state fair grounds here Thursday, in competition with 40 of the best bred sows in the Northwest. The sow was sold during the afternoon to Lloyd H. Ewalt of Gervais for \$305. High average for the sale was made by W. L. Sheard of Dayton, whose animals averaged \$207.50. Buyers were in attendance from all sections of Oregon, as well as from Idaho and Washington. A picnic here some time next June is now being planned by the Durco Jersey breeders of the state.

Attorney to Have Fine Opportunity To Defend Himself

Robert Maguire, attorney, who many a time and oft hath appeared as counsel for prisoners in police court, today was given fine opportunity to himself appear as a defendant. He took it, and Friday will tell municipal judge Rossman why he motored about Portland streets without a proper license.

Maguire has had difficulty in removing the 1919 license tag from the front of his car. He said he could not wrench it loose, he had left his new 1920 tag at home, he told Traffic Patrolman Fred Lewis, who stopped him today at Broadway and Larrabee streets. Together they went to police headquarters after Maguire refused to reveal his age to the patrolman. He was released on his own recognizance upon being booked for violation of the state auto license law.

Drastic Laws to Jolt Drunken Joy Rider Are Sought

Walla Walla, Wash., Feb. 5.—More drastic laws to enable the sheriffs of the state of Washington to rid the road of the drunken joy rider were advocated today by Sheriff George L. Reid of Spokane in his opening address to the Washington State Sheriffs' association today. Sheriff Reid, who is president of the organization, recommended amendments to the joint, liquor and automobile laws to remove "jokers" which, he said, now make it exceedingly difficult to secure convictions. The sheriffs will visit the state penitentiary Friday, where they will inspect the Bertillon record.

Chamber Directors Against Limit on Railroad Earnings

Expressing opposition to any plan which would limit earnings of the railroads under private control, directors of the chamber of commerce Wednesday afternoon, drafted resolutions which were sent to Washington this morning. The directors based their opposition to limitation on the fact that the Western roads are strong roads and will need all excess earnings to push development in this territory, where development is needed most.

Civil War Veteran Dead
Freewater, Feb. 5.—Funeral services were held here for Matthew Mason of Fruitvale, a Civil War veteran, 77 years old. He is survived by his wife, three daughters and six sons.

POSTMASTER MYERS SAYS CHAMBERLAIN IS DOING HIM INJUSTICE

He Declares It His Constitutional
Right to Have Hearing
Before Senators.

Frank Myers, deposted postmaster of Portland, commented Wednesday on the reported refusal of Senator Chamberlain to aid in securing him a hearing before the senate committee as follows: "Myers will not get any hearing before the United States senate." It is what Senator Chamberlain is quoted in a dispatch from Washington as having said in comments on my request through friends for a hearing before the senate committee on the post office and post roads to show why I am being summarily removed from office.

I am amazed that the senator from Oregon should be so lacking in sense of fair play as to deny any man a hearing and impartial trial, contrary to the fundamental principles of Anglo-Saxon justice. Particularly is this so in view of the published statement made by Senator Chamberlain some days ago to the effect that he had no part in attempting to remove me or any control over the appointment of a successor.

Since the demand for my resignation I have repeatedly requested that I be given an opportunity to answer any charges that might have been made, but thus far without success. I have now appealed to the United States senate for justice. Senator Chamberlain, however, has refused to grant me an opportunity to appear in person or in some way to answer any charges that may have been made.

I am appointed by the president with the consent of the senate for a term of four years. I can be removed only in the same manner that I was appointed. The senate must concur in the order of removal in such a case. Being a member of the senate, it is the duty of the senate to appear in person or in some way to answer any charges that may have been made.

Since the senate is to be the jury which is to determine whether I shall be summarily removed from office before my lawful term expires, it seems to me to be highly improper that Senator Chamberlain, a member of that body and one of my judges, should approach the subject with the animus which Senator Chamberlain's interview clearly shows.

Albert T. Chandler Was War Veteran; Born in Tennessee

Albert T. Chandler, who died at his residence, 1461 1st Hoyt street, February 1, was one of the few surviving veterans of the Southern Confederacy in Portland. He was a native of Tennessee and was in his seventy-eighth year. Chandler resided most of his life at Medora, Ill. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Sarah L. Chandler, and six children. The funeral will be held at the funeral home of the Rev. Levi Johnson officiating, and burial will be in Riverview cemetery.

Mrs. Anna Beach
The funeral of Mrs. Anna Beach will be held Friday at 2 p. m. at the parlors of Miller & Tracey, with burial at Riverview cemetery. Mrs. Beach died Wednesday from the effects of burns received when her clothing caught fire from a stove. She is survived by her husband, Charles Beach, and a son, Harold, and was 38 years of age. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Perkerford, reside in Corvallis. Two sisters and a brother also survive.

Hamilton B. Johnson
Hamilton Boyd Johnson, aged 47, a native of Portland, died at the Multnomah hotel Monday. The funeral will be held at the Holman parlors Friday at 1 p. m. Johnson was a son of the late A. H. Johnson and is survived by his widow, a daughter, four brothers and four sisters. Three brothers, C. W. S. M. and A. R. Johnson, reside in this city.

The Dalles Enters Race for Columbia Bridge at Seufert

The Dalles, Feb. 5.—The Dalles has opened a campaign to secure the proposed mid-Columbia bridge across the narrows at Seufert as the most economical and practical site. Seufert is four miles above The Dalles and there the river is less than 200 feet wide, making but one span necessary. The following committee was appointed to endeavor to convince engineers that the narrows is the proper place for the bridge: Frank Seufert, P. J. Schindler, E. B. Schindler, N. A. Bonn, W. H. Wilson, E. C. Pease, E. O. McCoy, J. T. Rorick.

That America is lost to Christianity unless our public school teachers instruct in the Bible, was the assertion of Mrs. Louise Kelley of Spokane, addresser of the B. E. Schindler of Christian churches in session here. Pendleton Wants Viaduct to Cross O-W.R. & N. Tracks

Pendleton, Feb. 5.—A viaduct on South Main street, to provide an overhead crossing of the O-W.R. & N. tracks in the local yards, will be sought by this city. The matter now rests with the Commercial association for reference to the proper authorities. Such a crossing is deemed inevitable, owing to the growth of the south hill district and the fact that the high school is located there. Railroad tracks cross South Main street at intervals for more than two blocks with no warnings maintained.

J. R. Raley is the new president of the Pendleton Commercial association and will take office March 2, succeeding George C. Baer. G. A. Hartman was elected vice president. C. K. Cranston and John Dickson, secretary and treasurer respectively, were reelected.

Dispute Over Auto Dealer's License Is Settled in Court

The dealers' license controversy between the police and local automobile dealers was amicably settled by Judge Rossman of the municipal court this morning. The judge ruled that the dealers and salesmen could keep a dealer's license on a machine as long as it was for sale, provided they drove the car personally. The dealers agreed to purchase regular dealer's plates for their service cars and agreed also that they would not loan plates to friends for use. Judge Rossman also gave the dealers permission to remove their cars through the streets at night for advertising purposes.

Appointment of 16 lieutenants in the city fire bureau will be made Friday by Fire Chief Dowell, following the recent examination, when 60 applicants took under supervision of the civil service board. Deficiency Bill for \$88,000,000 Passes; \$29,000,000 Cut Off

Washington, Feb. 5.—(U. P.)—The house today passed the second 1920 deficiency bill, carrying \$88,000,000. During hearings before the house appropriations committee, approximately \$29,000,000 was cut from the original estimates. Amendments providing \$9,000,000 for naval repairs were defeated. Most of the entire second deficiency was expended incidental to settling war accounts.

Service Men Get Preferred Rights

MRS. MARY DALEY TELLS JURY HOW NELSON WAS SHOT

Dead, Man Slapped Thomas R.
Miller and Latter Immediately
Fired Revolver, Witness Says.

May Daley, star witness for the state in the murder trial of Thomas R. Miller, was on the witness stand most of this morning and was put through a severe grueling. Mrs. Daley was housekeeper for Miller and was standing by his side when he shot and killed Guy R. Nelson November 23.

Mrs. Daley testified that she had known Miller since last May and that she had lived at his house since the middle of June. At 10:30 the night of November 23, she said, she expressed a desire to call on her sister, Ida Nelson. Miller refused to let her, she testified, threatening to take both his life and hers. Her sister called her by telephone about that time and in the conversation received the impression that Miller and Mrs. Daley had been quarreling.

Nelson and his wife hurried to the Miller residence at 420 First street. "The Nelsons first came to the back door, where the cowman's jury," she said. "My sister called out to let them in, and Miller shouted out asking who was with her. Miller had his gun in his hand and threatened to kill her from the door and said if Nelson came in he was going to get killed. Nelson opened the door and came in."

"What are you doing to her?" he asked. "Nelson reached over and slapped Miller, and Miller shot him. Nelson must have been about four feet away."

Mrs. Daley testified she and Miller had been having trouble at different times. He struck her and threatened to kill her during their quarrel on the night of the shooting, she stated. He also put the gun to his head and said he was going to end it all, she asserted.

Mrs. Ida Nelson, the widow, took the stand shortly before noon and corroborated most of the testimony of her sister. Motecle Police Officer Wright was the first witness for the prosecution, testifying that Nelson was dead when he arrived and that the lock on the front door was unbroken.

FORMER INSPECTORS LOSE Fail to Act in Time Against City Civil Service Board

Because they had failed to serve a writ of review within 60 days of the action taken by the civil service board in their cases, A. S. Gross, J. N. Wheeler, W. A. Harman and David Calbreath find themselves without remedy at law in the decision handed down by Presiding Judge McCourt Wednesday.

The men were formerly employed in the department of public works as inspectors. An ordinance was passed compelling inspectors to take examinations to qualify for any branch of the inspection service. The four men refused on the ground that they were already inspectors. They were removed and the action was later approved by the civil service board. They explained Wednesday to Judge McCourt that they had thought they were allowed six months instead of 60 days to appeal.

DECISION AGAINST THORNTON Loses \$25,000 Suit for Alleged Loss of Wife's Affections.

Presiding Judge McCourt Wednesday decided against Luke Thornton, who was suing Florence L. Crawford for family law known as "Mother" Crawford, head of the Apostolic Faith mission in Portland.

INFLUENZA CLAIMS THREE NEW VICTIMS; CONDITIONS IMPROVE

Eighty-Six More Cases Reported
in Portland; Outside Situation
Is Much Better.

Three more deaths in Portland from influenza and 86 additional cases diagnosed as "flu" were reported to the city health bureau this morning, according to Dr. George Parrish, city health officer.

Deaths recorded by the health bureau include Leland Briggs, 56, Hazel hotel; Gertrude Jenkins, 32, influenza hospital in South Portland, and Mole Alhade, 50, Good Samaritan hospital. All three deaths followed attacks of influenza along with pneumonia. In all seven deaths have been recorded in Portland since the epidemic broke out.

Since the return of the epidemic 572 cases have been turned in to the health bureau. Dr. Parrish states that a large number of cases diagnosed as "flu" have turned out to be colds and grippe. An average of 592 telephone calls daily are received by the health office regarding influenza and smallpox quarantines as well as the routine business of the office.

Dr. David N. Roberg, state health officer, reports that the epidemic has all but spent itself in districts outside of Portland. Pendleton, Roseburg, and Burns, which were in the throes of an epidemic a few days ago, are showing a big decrease. Fifty patients, however, have been quarantined for influenza in Canyon City, Grant county, according to a telegram received by Dr. Roberg this morning.

There will be no meeting of the local reality board Friday noon.

Many Killed When Islands Are Swept By Wind and Wave

San Francisco, Feb. 5.—(U. S. N. S.)—Many lives were lost and great damage done to cocoanut plantations by a hurricane and tidal wave, which visited the islands of Makatea and Moorea, in the French Society Islands group, on the night of January 23, according to reports reaching here with the arrival of the steamer Tofua, in port today. Tahiti, south of Papeete, suffered severely, the reports said. Native and Japanese plantation workers and their French overseers were the victims, according to wireless reports to American Consul Thomas B. L. Layton, a passenger on the Tofua.

Does Chiropodist Believe in Trinity? Reed Pupils Asked

Following a conference held Tuesday between District Forester George Cecil and Forest Supervisors T. H. Sherrard of the Oregon, F. H. Brundage of the Columbia, R. H. Evans of the Whitman and Minam, R. L. Fromme of the Olympic and A. G. Weigle of the Snoqualmie national forests, announcement was posted upon the forest service bulletin board this morning that until further notice the forests would be in charge of the following supervisors:

Columbia, Shirley Buck; Oregon, Carl B. Neal; Whitman and Minam, J. F. Irwin; Olympic, O. F. Erickson; Snoqualmie, Lewis A. Green, Jr.

Buck, the only forest service official authorized to give any information, declared the change is only an "internal arrangement." Sherrard and Brundage, whose offices have been in Portland, are today in Tacoma attending a rangers' meeting.

The supposition is that the supervisors relieved of their forests will be placed on duty at other forests to be worked out along fire protection and other lines.

Los Angeles Loses 150,000 Over Night; May Be in Portland

Los Angeles, Feb. 5.—(U. P.)—What has happened to 150,000 people who used to live in Los Angeles?

The aid of school children and telephone operators was enlisted today in an effort to find out.
