

ALLEGED NARCOTIC DISPENSERS CAUGHT IN NET OF SHERIFF

Deputies Take Two Men Into Custody After Ruse Is Worked on Suspected Operators.

Ralph E. Bellenger and William E. Terry, said to be bootleggers, were arrested by Deputy Sheriffs Christofferson and Kendall at Tenth and Jefferson streets Wednesday night when a ruse perpetrated by the officers brought the men into the net for an alleged attempt to dispose of narcotics. They are at the county jail facing state and federal charges.

Earlier in the week the pair attempted to sell to a drug clerk 12 ounces of cocaine at \$60 an ounce. The clerk delayed the transaction and communicated with the sheriff's office. Following instructions from the sheriff, the clerk met the pair Wednesday night at Tenth and Jefferson streets. They handed him the cocaine, and he turned over an envelope stuffed with paper in lieu of money.

Christofferson and Kendall interfered at that point, and in spite of Terry's effort to flee in an automobile, both men were captured.

Terry is said to have returned from British Columbia recently, and it is supposed he smuggled the narcotic into Portland from Canada.

Government Urges Capture of Mexican Abductors of Askew

Washington, Feb. 5.—(I. N. S.)—The United States has made an urgent request upon the Mexican government to take immediate steps to capture the abductors of Joseph A. Askew, an American, kidnapped on February 2.

Confirmation of the kidnapping of Askew was received by the state department today. Bandits attacked the plantation of the Tiahualillo Co.'s ranch at Lerdo, Durango, on the night of February 2, and carried Askew away with them.

Edward P. Ripley, Head of Santa Fe Railroad, Is Dead

Santa Barbara, Cal., Feb. 5.—(I. N. S.)—Edward P. Ripley, chairman of the board of directors of the Santa Fe railway, is dead here today following illness of long standing which became acute about a week ago. Mr. Ripley underwent two operations in Chicago last September, later coming to Santa Barbara to recuperate.

Mrs. Ripley and their son-in-law, and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. S. M. Coe, were with the noted railroad man at the time of death.

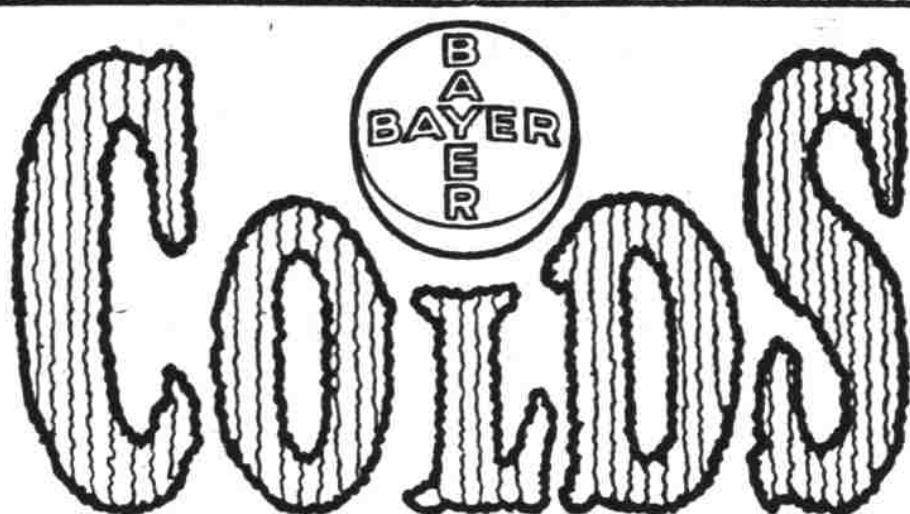
3 Cents a Plate for Hot Food Served to Pupils in Umatilla

Rice, cocoa, potato soup, vegetable soup and stew are some of the foods which have appeared on the menus. Teachers have observed a slight improvement in the work since the installation of the hot lunch plan.

Crane Postoffice Advanced in Rating As Business Grows

Crane Or., Feb. 5.—Postmaster Cain has received notice that the Crane postoffice has been advanced from a fourth class to a third class postoffice. The Crane postoffice was established in October, 1916, when Dr. E. A. Wilkinson was appointed postmaster. Dr. Wilkinson held the office until the spring of 1918, when he moved to his ranch near Welsch, Idaho. S. M. Talbot was retained as deputy until the appointment of R. R. Cain as postmaster, taking effect July 1, 1918. The business of the Crane postoffice has advanced rapidly during the past year. The parcel post matter handled in the Crane postoffice has averaged more than 150,000 pounds per month. As a separating office Crane supplies every postoffice in Harney county, with the exception of two.
