

ARIZONIANS DO NOT WAVER IN ANSWERING JURY BOX QUESTIONS

Plain, Blunt Replies of Prospective Talesmen Makes Jury Selection Easy.

Tombstone, Ariz., Feb. 5.—(U. P.)—"I ain't one of them waverin' men," Thomas Barker of Douglas, who made remark from the jury stand, said further that his opinion of the Bisbee deportations now on trial here was biased. He had made up his mind, and he wasn't a "waverin' man."

Barker typifies the spirit that has prevailed among the talesmen. They speak their mind at once, and as a result lawyers have been able to speed up the process of choosing jurors to try the first of more than 200 well known defendants charged with kidnapping over 1100 men and escorting them into New Mexico.

The jury is now half completed. Attorneys have been required to make little effort to bring out the beliefs of men under examination.

The same fundamental of fair play and outspokenness has characterized the attorneys on both sides. On several occasions attorneys have challenged talesmen for prejudice when observers were certain the prejudice favored the challenger.

Utah Sheriff Comes For Langdale, Held For Many Robberies

Sheriff J. T. Williams of Provo, Utah, arrived in Portland Wednesday with extradition papers for Charles Langdale, alias "Red" Cross, one of the three hold-up men who were arraigned before Judge McCourt Tuesday afternoon.

Langdale is wanted in Utah to answer charges of having robbed the Mendenhall bank of Springfield, October 8. The bank was entered at 1 o'clock in the afternoon by three unmasked men, who, at the point of a revolver, forced the cashier to open the safe and then crawl into it on his hands and knees. The bandits secured \$15,000 from the raid and made their escape in an automobile.

Three of the men, Thomas Devers, Jim Miller and Frank Smith, were followed and captured. They pleaded guilty to the charge and received sentences of from five years to life. It is said that their confession implicated Langdale. Langdale, Robert Hall and Russell Higginbotham were arrested here following a series of bold hold-ups in Portland. They are said to have confessed to the crimes. They are held under three indictments, although many more hold-ups are laid to them.

Langdale is also wanted in Minneapolis.

Columbia Smelt Jar H. C. L. in Portland; Receipts Are Large

Columbia river smelt are now coming so freely to the Portland market that they are putting a big crimp in the cost of living—providing the consumer will take advantage of the situation.

Receipts of smelt were shown from all portions of the Columbia river west of Portland. The supplies are now so liberal that they are selling in the wholesale trade at 8 cents a pound and even lower. This means that retailers could make a reasonable profit on them at 10 to 12 cents a pound.

Los Angeles, Feb. 5.—(I. N. S.)—Two burglars were shot and fatally wounded early today when caught in the act of loading merchandise, stolen from a haberdashery on South Broadway, into a stolen taxicab.

One of the wounded men gave his name as Ray Lawrence of San Francisco and said he had a sister, Miss Alice Crowley, living at 367 Balboa street, Richmond. Letters in his possession gave the name of Frank Waters.

The other burglar refused to talk and, believing death was near, called for a priest to confess him. From letters found in his possession the names of C. Ryan and Charles W. Reilly were obtained.

Patrolman H. L. Barlow shot both men after they had attempted to shoot him when he stepped upon the running board of the stolen taxicab, after he had watched both men loading the stolen goods into the car.

The loot amounted to about \$400 in silk shirts and other wearing apparel.

Lad Is Injured in Collision With Car

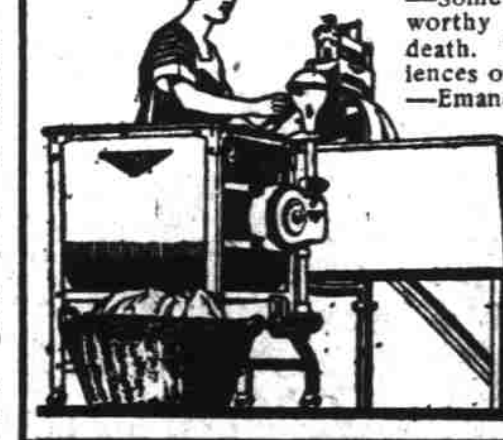
