Apollo Club Is Heard in Concert

FOR two weeks it has been a series of uninterrupted concerts, recitals and grand opera performances, and the end is not yet. Nevertheless, the Apollo club attracted a good sized audience to its second concert of the twelfth season Thursday night at The Auditorium.

The fact that this is the twelfth season in itself is strong evidence of the seriousness of purpose of the club, who form the component parts of this splendid ensemble of 65 voices, and offers proof sufficient that meritorious results are obtained. The concert Thursday night was up to the usual high standard of excellence. The soloist on this occasion was Walter J. Stevenson, basso, a local business man and singer, whose vocal equipment is such that he might be envied by many a professional on tour, both in concert and opera. His program numbers were "The Lute Player," by Allington, "Up From Somerset," by Sanderson, but the song that reached the hearts was the encore, "Your Eyes," by Forbes, so beautifully given that a repetition was the apparent desire of the audience. Instead, however, he sang for the double encore, "Holding Down," by German, also a work well suited for his deep, resonant voice. It would be interesting indeed, to hear Mr. Stevenson in grand opera.

The chorus, directed by W. H. Boyer, opened the concert with a rollicking hunting song by Bullard, and "Open Thy Heart," a catchy arrangement for voice of Bixie's well known Spanish serenade. The Hatch transcription of Grieg's "Poeme Eclogue" turned out to be a happy novelty. Of the numbers best presented were "Marionette," sung without instrumental accompaniment; "Widdicombe Fair," west of England folk song; "O Captain, My Captain," a setting by Bohannon to the poem of Whitman written just after the assassination of President Lincoln, and "Bendamer's Stream," as arranged by Lewis.

The accompanists were Edgar E. Courson, William C. McCulloch and Ralph W. Hoyt.

The next concert of the club is announced for April 1, when Florence Macbeth, soprano, will be the soloist.

National Guard

Colonel C. E. Dentler, U. S. A., Inspector-Instructor of the National Guard of Oregon, has secured for the organization nearly half a million dollars of first class equipment, sufficient to place a regiment of 2500 men in the field equipped to a shoeless.

There are less than 500 in the regiment now and the federal officials expect there will be 1500 as a minimum shortly. Colonel Dentler recently invited the American Legion post in this city to join the National Guard in a body and take the lead in the nation.

Company C of the old Third Oregon had a platoon in Paris that was considered the best drilled unit in the American army. It is to give a public competitive drill at the Armory Wednesday night. Its opponent will be Company I. It is expected that a large audience of old and new national guard men will attend. Old Company C was commanded by Captain Crossley, now lieutenant colonel, and it is hoped to have him command the platoon. Company I will be commanded for that drill by Lieutenant Hanson, formerly commander of the crack platoon. Company I men are drilling every night.

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Mitzi Wins Once More at the Heilig

MAGNETIC, mesmerizing Mitzi, in tight and in evening gowns, again sings, dances, laughs and pouts her ingratiating way into the hearts of musical comedy devotees in her newest Savage offering, "Head Over Heels," in which she opened her local engagement at the Heilig last night.

Mitzi is most, though not quite all of "Head Over Heels." There is a chorus of sprightly girls and boys, not an extraordinary singing aggregation, for big vocal effort is not required, but a quite satisfactory, neatly costumed and well drilled background for the midge Mitzi. There is a troupe of acrobats, too, cart wheelers and hand springs, who will probably have no difficulty in getting a big time vaudeville engagement if they want it at the conclusion of their present contract. Mitzi ostensibly is a member of this acrobatic company, too, so the aroma of the sawdust ring hovers throughout the performance and one can discern a suggestion of circus band blare in Jerome Kern's music, incidental to the play.

As said, there are no really big song numbers in the piece. Mitzi's sweetly reminiscent lullaby is the hit of the play, and Mitzi does it all alone throughout, the piece being particularly adapted to her own inimitable style of voice and delivery. To further emphasize her diminutiveness Mitzi has a big bass along again. He's Edward Selis, "Signor Bambinetti," and his song "Me" is featured.

What the chorus may lack in voice is more than compensated for in "pép," the dancing numbers being especially entertaining.

Standing out happily in the comedy role is the personality of Joe Keno, who as an irrepressible press agent with a penchant for puns, is refreshing. His "mattresses," plural for matron, is typical of his style.

There's enough of a plot running through "Head Over Heels" to give it the required love angle, with Mitzi, of course, the sweetheart, who, locked out in the beginning from her lover's office, enters via transom and wins her way into the heart of a true lover, played by Boyd Marshall, after a series of misunderstandings.

"Head Over Heels" is good entertainment. Mitzi makes it especially good. The local engagement continues through tomorrow night, with matinee tomorrow afternoon.
