

THOMAS R. HAYES TELLS STORY OF TANGLED ROMANCE

Gave Woman Presents, Believing She Was Sister and Not Wife of Joseph Basgall, He Says.

Under the impression that he was engaged to Joseph H. Basgall's sister, when in fact he was engaged to Basgall's wife, Thomas R. Hayes testified in municipal court Thursday afternoon that he gave Mrs. Basgall at least \$2000 during the time of their "engagement." Endearments were exhibited freely by the defendant in the presence of Mrs. Basgall's husband, according to Hayes' testimony.

Hayes said he furnished clothing and money to Mrs. Basgall, believing her unmarried, for nearly two years. A note signed by Basgall, admitting an obligation incurred by his wife to the extent of \$600, and agreeing to pay Hayes the money, was admitted as evidence. Hayes stated that although he had observed conduct that made him suspicious, he did not know until two weeks ago that Anna and Joseph Basgall were married to each other. He was told by a friend, he said.

After Hayes had been examined by the prosecution, because of a technical question in the proof in the case, Hayes was released until February 10. Charges of larceny by bailment against Hayes and James Hurlbert were dismissed on motion of the district attorney.

Hayes and Hurlbert were charged with failing to return a picture and frame they had sold to Delilah Clancy. The picture was delivered and returned again for display purposes, the complaint, dated August 28, said.

WE CAN SAVE EUROPE, SAYS F. VANDERLIP

Home life has become disorganized. Economic disorganization in Europe must have an unfavorable influence on our own affairs. If over there political difficulties are not solved, it will affect our interests here. Just as we have a considerable public opinion sympathetic to Russia, so might there be a body of opinion here sympathetic to Europe.

UNREST IN MENACE "An increase in radical thought in America would be engendered by radical political movements in Europe. The present situation is creating idleness and hunger among the Europeans and those are the two principal factors in developing political unrest.

"There is a feeling that you can take out of a patent medicine bottle. The cure is for Europe to produce more so that Europe can pay for what it must import. But it is hardly to the point to insist that Europe must go to work and stop at that. Certainly Europe must work, but it must have something to work on and raw materials to work with, and in the meantime it must have food to support the people. Just now the people of Austria and other central European countries are exhausted and dying of starvation.

MORE CREDIT ILL ADVISED "I doubt the wisdom of our government granting more credits to Europe. At the same time the credits that are needed must run for too long a term to make it feasible for banks to make the grants. Besides, our banks have expanded their credit facilities for domestic requirements to quite as high a point as is safe. That means the credit should come from our investment funds, which have been largely dissipated in the recent past by our flotation of new companies. We have great demands for domestic promotions and for such work as rehabilitating our railroads, which

are now in need of 600,000 cars. Nevertheless, we can at the same time assist Europe. We can expand our lending ability very much by practicing economy and stopping the present craze for extravagance.

HOME INVESTMENTS BEST "But our investments are not disposed to adventure into foreign securities. They can get very high returns from domestic securities and they lack understanding and experience in foreign securities. Such investments as they have made abroad have not altogether been happy in some instances. The remedy can only come with a realization by our investors that they would affect our own intimate connection with European affairs and of the reaction on us of any economic breakdown in European countries.

"In investing our funds to help Europe's recovery the idea would be to float loans here as they did during the war. The task is one primarily for financiers, bankers, representing the principal lending countries, that is, those which have a surplus of food and raw materials. This council of bankers would have to study the European industrial situation and ration such credits as it could grant.

MUST FOSTER INDUSTRIES "It would foster credits wisely with a view to starting industries and keeping people from starving. The credits should be extended only in the form of food and raw materials.

BRIGHT SPOTS SEEN "While the facts are pessimistic, there are some bright spots. England has done marvelously in getting her industries adjusted. Belgium, too, has done very well. But elsewhere the revival is not sufficient to warrant optimism. In some places only 20 per cent of industrial revival has occurred. Nevertheless, we can do our part in helping Europe by the United States, the situation should become much brighter.

"The only possible solution is in our hands. Russia cannot give immediate help. She has no raw materials on hand and her paralyzed railway system makes transportation very difficult. It would do no good for us to cancel the debts Europe owes us, for what Europe needs is the food and raw materials we can supply.

MARKET ROAD ACT FUND TO COUNTIES REACHES BIG SUM

Use of Money Is Contingent on Each County of Oregon Matching the State Appropriation.

Salem, Feb. 6.—Approximately \$883,460.22 will be available for various counties of Oregon under the market road act during 1920, according to figures compiled by the state highway department. Use of the funds by the counties is dependent upon the raising of a similar amount by the county.

C. A. Sweek of Burns, attorney for the new irrigation district being organized in Harney county, was a capitol visitor Thursday, in consultation with State Engineer Copper relative to the plans for the district. The district covers approximately 80,000 acres in the vicinity of Burns and will include the holdings of the Pacific Livestock company, the Oregon Cattle company and practically all the irrigated and partially irrigated lands now taking water from the Silves river. Land owners in the district will vote on the organization of the district February 10.

The Sutherland Valley Water Users' association has filed with State Engineer Copper a petition for permission to appropriate 25 second feet of water from Calapaloo creek for the irrigation of a large orchard tract near Sutherland.

Applications for water rights were filed as follows: C. D. Nickelsen of Hood River, waste water for domestic purposes and the Pullman water for springs for Mrs. C. N. Bradford of Fife, or, water from Long Hollow creek for the irrigation of 25 acres in Crook county. Mary J. Hill of Kerby, or, water from the west fork of Illinois river for the irrigation of a 25 acre tract in Josephine county. Gus Adelberger and Charles Conrad of Marshfield, water for springs for domestic use on three different tracts near Marshfield.

Of a total of 1262 accidents reported to the state industrial accident commission for January, 10 were fatal, according to the monthly report. Fatalities were an average of 1.2 per cent, a commission in 881 cases during the month.
