WEATHER CONDITIONS

Precipitation has occurred on the North Pacific coast, in Western Tennessee, and over a belt reaching from Minnesota to New England. The weather is mild over the eastern half of the country and in the Northern Rocky Mountain region and the temperature is now above normal except in the Pacific Northwest, where it is below normal. In Alberta and Southern Saskatchewan the rise in temperature amounts to more than 20 degrees.

M'INTOSH QUILTS JOB AS PURCHASING AGENT TO GO INTO BUSINESS

J. L. Hooper Appointed to Take up Duties With City March 1; Accepts Resignation.

Peter McIntosh, city purchasing agent and assistant to the commissioner of public finance, placed his resignation before Commissioner Pier Friday afternoon to take effect March 1. McIntosh has accepted a position as secretary and manager of the Gary Coast agency, a corporation handling auto trucks in Oregon, Washington and Idaho with headquarters in Portland.

Pier, in accepting McIntosh's resignation, stated that the city as well as the bureau of finance suffered a real loss in that McIntosh was particularly fitted for the work he has carried on for the last three years. J. L. Hooper, who is in charge of the municipal store in Brooklyn, has been appointed to fill the vacant position. Hooper was formerly purchasing agent for the Northwest Steel company. He is a veteran of the Spanish-American war.

McIntosh was appointed as purchasing agent under Dan Kellaher in July, 1917. He has served under Commissioners Kellaher, T. L. Perkins, C. A. Bigelow and Pier. From 1910 to 1915 McIntosh was affiliated with the juvenile court as probation officer and was later chief probation officer.

Delegations From Two Counties Get Road Assurances

Crook county's road troubles were alleviated Friday by the decision of the state highway commission to withdraw the proposed cooperative agreement with the federal government on the construction of the Crooked river grade from Prineville to the Shorty Davis ranch. The government was unwilling to cooperate for the reason that the road was not a through road.

The state and county will proceed with the contract already entered into and the federal fund will be applied in the improvement of the road between Prineville and Redmond which will be graded and graveled where it is necessary to make it a substantial road at all seasons.

Another county delegation sent home in a better humor than in which it came was from Baker county. The county wanted state cooperation on a section of the road between Baker and Cornucopia. There seemed to be some misunderstanding whether this had been formerly promised or not. Everything was made smooth by a statement of the commission that it was committed to the policy of cooperating on this road and that it was only a question of funds. If the proposed bond amendment is favorably acted on in May making available more funds the commission promised to give Baker county fair treatment.

A survey was ordered of the road between Redmond and Sisters on application of County Commissioner Miller.

Streetcar and Auto Collide; Two Hurt

Mr. and Mrs. J. Spady were taken to St. Vincent's hospital, Friday night, suffering from injuries that resulted when the automobile in which they were riding was struck by a streetcar at Twenty-second and East Sixty-seventh street north. Spady received cuts on his head and face, and his right knee was apparently dislocated. Mrs. Spady suffered from cuts and an injury to her right side.

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KAISER TO PUT HISTORY OF PORTLAND'S WATER SYSTEM IN BOOK FORM

Has Spent Six Months Gathering Information That Reaches Back to the Early Days.

Complete statistical data and history of Portland's water system since its early beginnings are being compiled by Lawrence S. Kaiser, superintendent of the water bureau, who hopes to publish the information in a book, with photographs.

Kaiser has spent six months in gathering information concerning the city's water system since its early days. Pictures of Henry Failing, the water committee's first chairman; Isaac W. Smith, superintendent of the bureau in 1877; and other men who helped establish the present plant will be included in the history. He will ask the city to provide funds for publication.

ORDINANCE IS TABLED
 Mayor's Illness Forces Postponement of Smallpox Appropriation.

Construction of the smallpox isolation hospital on land adjoining Kelly Butte rock quarry will not be completed before May 1, according to Commissioner Barbur and Building Inspector Plummer.

An emergency ordinance, appropriating \$35,000 for the building, was laid on the table last Wednesday because of the illness of Mayor Baker. Commissioner Barbur announced this morning that the mayor would no doubt be well by Monday, which will allow the passage of the ordinance. Deputy City Auditor Grutze declared that not a cent over \$10,000 could be appropriated on account of the condition of the general fund. Plummer estimates that it will cost far in excess of \$35,000 to complete the building.
