

HANEY CANDIDATE AT LARGE IN RACE FOR CONVENTION

Former United States District Attorney Comes Out for Election as Democratic Delegate.

Bert E. Haney, former United States attorney, has made formal announcement of his candidacy as delegate at large to the Democratic national convention at San Francisco in June.

In making his announcement Haney says he desires to submit his candidacy to the Democratic voters with the promise that he will cast his vote for president at the convention for the candidate who receives the preference vote of the electors of his party as cast at the primary election of May 21.

Haney for years has been one of the most active members of his party in the state. He started his active political career while a student at Willamette university in 1896, when he aided in the organization of a Salem Democratic club, which carried the Bryan banner aloft throughout that memorable battle.

Upon moving to Portland a couple of years later to take up the study of law he brought his political activities with him and within a short time was elected secretary of the Multnomah county central committee. Later he was elected chairman of the state central committee, which office he held for five years, his term expiring with the election of Harvey G. Starkweather, who now holds the office.

Haney has never been a candidate for elective office prior to this time, and has never held office other than the United States attorneyship, which he recently resigned to return to his private law practice.

U. of O. Dormitory For Girls Is Said to Be Mere Fire Trap

Salem, Feb. 7.—Deputy State Fire Marshal G. W. Allen was in Eugene today investigating a dormitory at the University of Oregon which has been reported to the department as a fire-trap. The building, according to complaints received by the department here, is a three-story frame affair used as a girls' dormitory. A number of girls, it is reported, are housed on the third floor, with only one stairway and no fire escapes, the building being kept locked at night with the keys in the possession of a matron, who occupies separate quarters.

An intensive survey of fire hazards in Eastern Oregon towns is to be made by deputy state fire marshals during the next two months, according to A. C. Barber, state fire marshal. The deputies will begin their work at Ontario next week, going from there to Vale, G. W. Stokes of the department has been in Vale this week investigating the fire protection facilities of that town, which have been reported as being brought up to the requirements of the insurance companies covering a protected town.

Interest in the mining possibilities of the Santiam district in eastern Marion county has been revived here by reports of rich copper ore which is said to have been taken from the Consolidated copper mine and the Silver King mine. Ore taken from the Consolidated mine is said to assay \$2.64 a ton.

SHAVING OF POWER OF SERVICE BODIES CAUSE OF PROTEST

Commissioner H. H. Corey Voices Objection in Letter Written to Representative McArthur.

Salem, Feb. 7.—Final word in adjusting differences of rates and schedules creating an undue prejudice, preference, or advantage against interstate rates is stripped from the state commissions and vested in the interstate commerce commission in both the house and senate bill now pending before congress, according to information received by H. H. Corey of the Oregon commission today.

This action, which is being taken by congress over the protest of state commissions, is declared by Chairman Esch of the house committee on railroads to be "merely enacting into law the decision of the supreme court in the Shreveport cases."

Objection to the provision was voiced by Commissioner Corey in a letter to Representative McArthur, in which he declared that he did not believe the measure "properly protects the rights of state commissions in the regulation and control of intrastate rates and service as heretofore exercised by them." "There appears to be a determined effort being made by legislation to take from the state commissions the power which they have heretofore exercised," according to Corey, who declares that "there is a lack of full information on the part of members of congress in regard to the authority the state commissions have and the manner in which it is exercised and the use which these commissions are to the people of the state in passing upon and adjusting their local disputes and controversies with carriers."

"There is a false impression prevailing that the orders of the state commissions are burdensome to the carriers," Corey insists, adding that "this is not true."

The adoption of the League of Nations without reservations or resubmitting the treaty to other signatory powers for further action on their part is strongly favored by M. Z. Donnell of The Dalles, who on Friday filed with the secretary of state's offices his application for a place on the Republican primary ballot as a candidate for delegate from the second Oregon congressional district to the national Republican convention in Chicago next June. Donnell is the first candidate to announce from the second district, which is entitled to two delegates to the national convention.

Permission to sell \$200,000 worth of its capital stock in Oregon was granted to the Empire Boat & Truck company today by Corporation Commissioner Schulerman. This company, recently granted articles of incorporation, will operate a line of boats on the Columbia and Willamette rivers with a line of auto trucks as feeders for the boat line.

The Portland-Wyoming Oil syndicate was also granted permission to sell \$50,000 of its stock in Oregon. Articles of incorporation were filed with the department today as follows:

Hub company, Medford, \$10,000; general merchandise, A. W. Hubbs, Zoe R. Hubbs and Elsie M. Olson.

Grande Ronde Fruit company, Salem, \$50,000; Joseph J. Nunn, Jennie J. Nunn and B. M. Durland.

The name of the Baker Overland company of Baker changed to the Oregon Motor company in supplementary articles filed today.

Application for a franchise granting the right to raft or boom logs on the Coos and Williams rivers and their tributaries in Coos and Douglas counties was filed with the public service commission today by the Coos Bay Logging company of North Bend.

W. A. Reid has been engaged for another year as secretary of the Marshfield chamber of commerce by the directors of the organization. Reid has served in the office for a year. The directors have also decided to hold monthly luncheons for members.

The Marshfield school board has decided to enforce the vaccination law Monday, when all children who have not been vaccinated will be prohibited from attending school. About 100 members of the anti-compulsory vaccination league have declared that they will not have their children vaccinated.

Another case of smallpox is reported on Coos bay, that of Charles Jackson of North Bend. There are four cases in Marshfield, all mild, and three cases in one family on Coos river. Influenza has not developed here. Jackson is seriously ill.

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VASSERS EMPLOYED

Growers' Body to Increase Capital; Year Is Profitable

Eugene, Feb. 7.—With the record of a most prosperous year the Eugene Fruitgrowers' association, at its annual meeting of stockholders here today, voted to increase its capital stock from \$100,000 to \$250,000. The stock is at present held by 781 fruit and berry growers in this part of the valley. During the past year the association did a cash business of \$957,400.

With the purchase and improvements in a cold storage plant acquired last summer, the building of an ice cream factory with modern machinery and the erection of a new cannery building to be equipped with the latest machinery, the plant is prepared to double its business this year, according to J. O. Holt, manager.

Aberdeen Proposes To Begin and Finish Work 1 Hour Earlier

Aberdeen, Wash., Feb. 7.—Members of the Chamber of Commerce have proposed a daylight saving plan for this city without the necessity of setting back the clocks, suggesting that stores and mills open at 7 o'clock in the morning and close at 4. The suggestion is to be presented at a general meeting to be called by the president of the chamber.

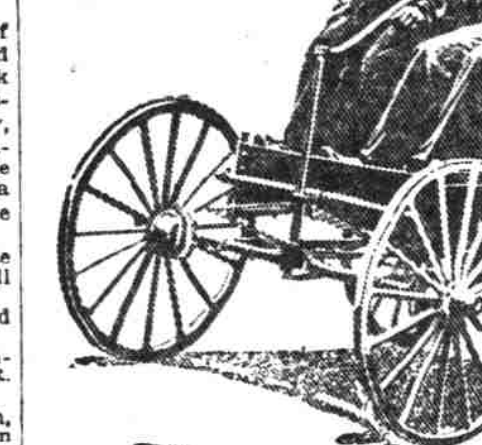

Investment Company Formed

Eugene, Feb. 7.—The Eugene Investment company was organized here last week for the purpose of buying and selling real estate. Plans and specifications have been completed for adding two stories to the Osburn hotel and work on the structure will begin at once and will be completed before the tourist season opens. This improvement will add 61 rooms to the hotel.



Charles B. King Drove First Auto in Detroit

To the Editor: Who made the first automobile driven on the streets of Detroit? Who were the first manufacturers?

The first successful automobile ever driven on Detroit streets was made by Charles King in 1894. This car had a gasoline motor of four cylinders and was of the high wheel type more often called "horseless carriage." With it was possible to develop a speed of about 20 miles an hour.

Henry Ford was working at the same time and in 1895 brought out his first successful car of two cylinders with pneumatic tires and low slung. The Olds Motor company was the first to manufacture automobiles in any quantity.

When Charles B. King first made his appearance on Detroit streets with his "horseless carriage" he attracted so much attention that the police would not allow him the use of the streets excepting between the hours of 2 and 4 o'clock in the morning. The work on the first car was carried on in the machine shop of John Lauer at 112 St. Antoine street. One evening in June, 1894, King and his helpers decided the machine was ready for a trial. They trundled Detroit's first automobile out of the shop to the street, and after a few attempts the machine was started. The course taken was out Jefferson to East Grand Boulevard. At this hour the streets were deserted and little attention was attracted. Later when a trial was made in daylight horses were frightened and the venture attracted such crowds that King was warned to keep off the streets except during the early morning hours.

COMMERCIAL CLUB AT CORVALLIS PROPOSES DEVELOPMENT SCHEME

Budget of \$5000 Subscribed to Cover Expenses of Promotion Work for Current Year.

Corvallis, Feb. 7.—At a meeting of more than 100 business men and farmers of Benton county held last week in the offices of the Corvallis Commercial club, a budget of \$5000 was subscribed for promotion of city and county interests during the year. Headquarters of the new municipal enterprise will be established here under direction of a competent manager.

The principal purpose of the movement is to develop the commercial and industrial interests of Benton county through the establishment of new hotels, a community house, city and county library, new city park and county fair grounds. Efforts will also be made to secure a new postoffice building at Corvallis and to build new city and county hospitals.

It is not the hope of the promoters to accomplish the entire program in one year, but the progressive farmers and business men of the county are determined to push to completion every municipal improvement that can be accomplished in that time.

Propose Uniform Plan for Numbering Portland Streets

Three business firms on Sixth street carry the numbers "147" over their doors while two homes on the same street near Hoyt are numbered "144," according to information given out by W. S. Scans of the city building department and J. P. Gehr of the records division.

So many complaints have reached Gehr of residents indiscriminately using whatever number they choose that he will immediately investigate all cases. This morning Gehr visited merchants on Sixth street who have corresponding numbers and renumbered the homes.

"This mixup is further proof that a uniform system of 100 numbers to a block should be installed all over Portland," asserted Gehr. "People seem to think they can use any number they choose, no matter whether it conflicts with others. It makes trouble for the postoffice as well as the building department."

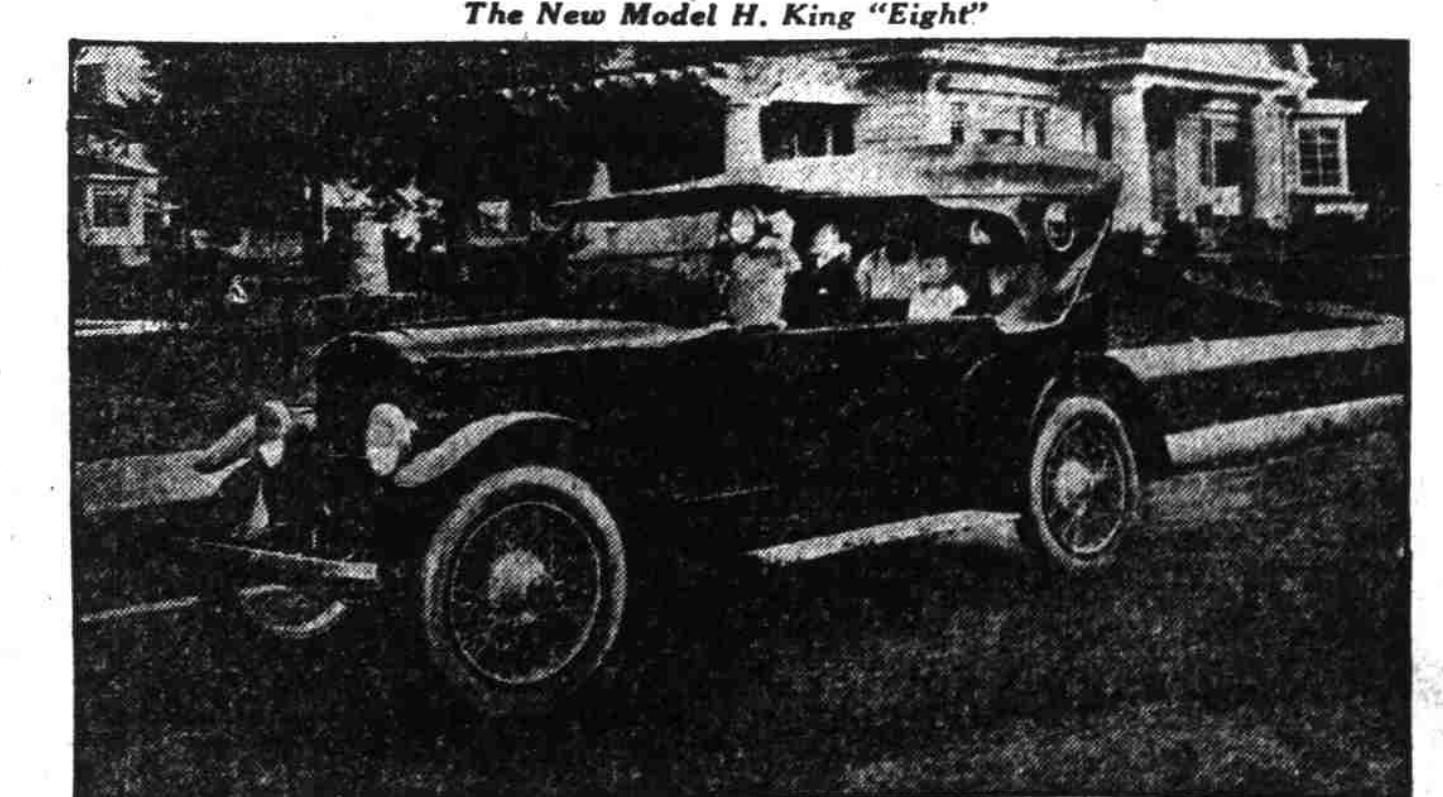
