Program to Be Rendered at Central Library—Speakers to Visit Public Schools of City.

Preparations for the celebration of Lincoln's birthday have been made by the Lincoln Memorial society, to be held at Central Library at 2:30 p. m., February 12. The usual parade will be omitted, but all public buildings will display the American flag. Private homes are invited to do likewise.

The program includes an invocation by Rev. Daniel Drew, a former slave, who knows Lincoln personally. Other features include: Remarks by President Charles F. Beebe; song, "America," Mrs. F. L. Hermit Ends Life, Leaving Estate to Bavarian Relatives

Cheshal, Wash., Feb. 9.—V. S. Goetz, 62 years of age, committed suicide recently in the woods 10 miles east of Onalaska in the Burnt Ridge district. His body was found Saturday with the top of the head blown off. A double-barreled shotgun lying alongside, with both barrels discharged, told the story. Goetz lived as a hermit in that district for many years. He had amassed considerable wealth and, according to a will found in his cabin, his property goes to relatives in Bavaria. He left no relatives in this country. The will indicates he had contemplated suicide for some time. J. W. Alexander, president of the Security State bank of Cheshal, is named executor of the estate in the will.

WASHINGTON SAYS HOOVER IS RECEPTIVE

(Continued From Page One)

"In order to answer a large number of questions all at once, let me emphasize that I have taken a day off from the industrial conference in Washington to come to New York solely to attend to pressing matters in connection with the children's relief."

DOESN'T SEEK OFFICE
"I want to say again: I have not sought and am not seeking the presidency. I am not a candidate; I have no organization. No one is authorized to speak for me politically."

"As an American citizen by birth and of long ancestry, I am naturally deeply interested in the present critical situation. My sincere and only political desire is that one or both of the great political parties will approach the vital issues which have grown out of the war and are new with a clear purpose looking to the welfare of our people, and that candidates capable of carrying out this work should be nominated."

STRONG FOR LEAGUE
"If the treaty goes over to the presidential election with any reservations necessary to clarify the world's mind that there can be no infringement of the safeguards provided by our constitution and our national traditions, then I must vote for the party that stands for the league. With it there is hope, not only of the prevention of war but also that we can safely economize in military policies. There is hope of earlier return of confidence and the economic reconstruction of the world."

"I could not vote with a party if it were dominated by groups who seek to set aside our constitutional guarantees for free speech or free representations, who hope to reestablish control of the government for profit and privilege. I could not vote with a party if it were dominated by groups who hope for any form of Socialism, whether it be nationalization of industry or other destruction of individual initiative."

SAYS AVOID EXTREMES
"Both these extremes, camouflaged or open, are active enough in the country today. Neither of the dominations would promote those constructive economic policies that will get us down from the unsound economic practices which of necessity grew out of the war, nor would they secure the good will to production of our farmers and workers or maintain the initiative of our business men."

DECLINES TO PLEDGE
"These issues look forward, not backward. I do not believe in more than two great parties. Otherwise, combinations of groups could, as in Europe, create danger of minority rule. I believe in party organization to support great ideals and to carry great issues and consistent policies. Nor can any one man dictate the issues of great parties. It appears to me that the hope of a great majority of our citizens in confronting this new period in American life is that the great parties will take positive stands on the many issues that confront us, and will select men whose character and associations will guarantee their pledges."

Parties to Declare My Allegiance
"I am being urged by people in both parties to declare my allegiance to either one or the other. Those who know me, know that I am able to make up my mind when a subject is clearly defined. Consequently, until it more definitely appears what the party managers stand for, I must exercise a prerogative of American citizenship and decline to pledge my vote blindly."

"I am not unappreciative of the many kind things that my friends have advanced in my behalf. Let, I hope they realize my sincerity in not tying myself to undefined partisanship."

ORGANIZED LABOR TO MAKE NATION-WIDE CAMPAIGN

Gompers and His Political Committee, Acting for A. F. of L., Denounce Anti-Sedition Bills.

Washington, Feb. 9.—The American Federation of Labor Sunday announced its plan of action in the coming political campaign. The federation decided to wage a fight in every congressional district.

Samuel Gompers, Frank Morrison and James O'Connell were selected as an executive committee. They were authorized and directed to secure such assistance as may be necessary in furtherance of the purpose of the campaign. The committee will approach the vital issues which have grown out of the war and are new with a clear purpose looking to the welfare of our people, and that candidates capable of carrying out this work should be nominated."

CONGRESS HAS FAILED
"The congress of the United States has failed to do its duty. It has failed to meet the emergency. It has given emergency legislation to the executive and reactionary policies. Its dominating thought has been the repression of labor."

"Every effort to secure remedial and constructive legislation has been strangled. Every appeal for redress has met with subtle and open hostility. The halls of congress have been used by labor's enemies to foster and spread a vicious propaganda and the enactment of laws to exercise their normal and lawful activities for the protection and promotion of their interests and welfare. Labor has appealed for relief in vain."

"The hour has arrived when those who believe in the maintenance of democratic institutions must marshal their forces in defense of their rights and ideals."

LABOR DEMANDS ACTION
"It is intolerable that a people who have sacrificed so much for the world's safety for democracy should be forced to submit to any restrictions of the glorious liberties inherited from the founders of our nation. The perpetration of our fundamental rights and the enactment of essential executive legislation demand the election of men, regardless of their political affiliations, who are truly representative of American ideals and liberty."

CONSCIOUS OF ITS RESPONSIBILITIES
"Impressed by the grave problems resulting from the great war, the American Federation of Labor at its annual convention in June, 1919, adopted a reconstruction program. This program defined the essential national policies and legislative enactments required to establish a full measure of justice and opportunity for labor."

FARMERS TAKE PART
"Because of new emergencies which arose since that convention it became imperative that the representatives of organized labor and farmers should assemble and confer to devise ways and means for securing their rights and liberties as free men and citizens."

"On December 15, 1919, a conference of representatives of labor and farmers met in Washington. This conference expressed 'labor's grievances, protests and demands.'"

"No favorable legislative action upon the recommendation contained in the American Federation of Labor reconstructions program or those expressed at the December conference has been taken by congress. Instead, many congressmen have endeavored to enact legislation providing for compulsory labor, and to restrict the patriotic and sacrifice of the masses of labor of America during the war, under the guise of anti-sedition laws the effort has been made to repress free association, free speech and free press."

Scorned by congress, ridiculed and misrepresented by many members of both houses, the American labor movement finds it necessary to vigorously apply its long and well established non-partisan political policy.

QUESTION OF ANNUAL ROSE EXHIBIT WILL BE WEIGHED TONIGHT

Decision to Be Made on Show Project at the Annual Meeting of Society.

Shall there be a 1920 Rose show? The question will be debated tonight at the annual meeting of the Portland Rose society at 8 o'clock in the Chamber of Commerce. The Rose Festival association has assigned the festival dates, June 24 and 25 as the dates of the Rose show. But the national Shrine convention will be held in Portland June 21, 22 and 23, and the rose culturists say the demand on their blossoms will be so great during the Shrine meetings they will have nothing left to exhibit. On the other hand, the Rose Festival association is understood to have intimated that if the Rose society does not comply with its arrangements no appropriation will be forthcoming to help meet the expenses of the show. The Rose society desires to hold the Rose show on Monday and Tuesday, June 21 and 22, pointing out that it will give a preceding Saturday and Sunday for preparation and that the street exhibit of millions of perfect blossoms, if made as originally planned, will be most happily staged while Shrine delegates are here in greatest numbers.

Another subject to come before the annual meeting of the Rose society is the restoration of rose bushes injured by the recent cold weather. Bushes having an east exposure are said to have been particularly injured and severe pruning will be necessary to restore their health.

SPIRITED FIGHT ON VACCINATION ORDER PROMISED

Restraining Hand of Court Is Sought Against Measure Affecting School Children of City.

L. D. Mahone announced this morning that he would this afternoon apply to Presiding Judge McCourt for a temporary injunction restraining the city health officers from carrying into effect the vaccination order. At the same time, he said, he will file papers seeking a permanent injunction against the order. Many affidavits will back up both applications.

The recent orders of the health board are to the effect that all school children will have to be vaccinated, or remain away from school for a period of three weeks. Those opposed to the order claim that there is no epidemic of smallpox and no need for such drastic measures.

"My duty as state health officer is simply to carry out the law in the matter," said Dr. David N. Roberts this morning, when told of the injunction suit. "Why remove meat inspection, market inspection and all other sanitary measures? Vaccination is a sanitary measure. I consider it as important as quarantine measures to prevent smallpox."

TWO LAWS UPHELD

State and U. S. May Both Prosecute for Dry Law Violation.

In an important decision handed down this morning, District Judge Hawthorne holds that both the state and federal authorities can proceed against a man who is accused of violating prohibition enactments. The decision came in the case of the State of Oregon against Ed Tracy, who is held under both state and government charges. His attorney argued that it was placing a man in jeopardy twice for the same offense, thus violating the constitution. The prosecution based its argument largely on the second section of the prohibition amendment to the constitution, which says that the several states shall have concurrent power to

enforce the article by appropriate legislation. Oregon had such legislation for some time prior to the enactment of the federal amendment. The court ruled that inasmuch as Tracy had not entered a plea, he was not in jeopardy. Judge Hawkins also stated that it was not in the power of a district court to pass upon the right of a federal court to bring a subsequent procedure after a conviction or acquittal in a state court.

Acquitted of Selling Bad Eggs
M. Steinberg, accused of selling decomposed eggs, was found not guilty by Judge Kavanaugh in the circuit court Saturday. Steinberg's defense is accused of having enticed 7-year old Ruth Johnson, who lives in Sellwood, to a vacant house on the afternoon of Sunday, September 20.

Frank Sino Sentenced
Frank Sino, who was found guilty by a jury of the charge of nonsupport, was sentenced this morning by Circuit Judge Kavanaugh to serve one year in the county jail, and paroled.

Alton to Be Tried
J. C. Alton, 60 years old, comes up for trial in the circuit court Tuesday morning on the charge of kidnapping. Alton is accused of having enticed 7-year old Ruth Johnson, who lives in Sellwood, to a vacant house on the afternoon of Sunday, September 20.
