Estate Valued at \$200,000 Increases to \$1,000,000 While Litigation Is Going On.

The estate of the late George T. Myers, valued at nearly \$1,000,000, has been amicably divided after litigation extending over a period of 12 years.

The property is to be divided into what is estimated as a half-and-half basis, the property in Oregon being left to Mrs. Georgia F. Stevens, a daughter, while the valuable Alaskan fish properties are taken by George T. Myers, a

George T. Myers Sr., who was a wealthy salmon packer, died on July 12, 1907, leaving a will which bequeathed the major portion of his estate to his Stevens contested the will, and since that time it has been argued many times in the courts of the state, even being heard before the supreme court three times. Twice the supreme court voted to a tie over the problem, but in December, 1918, the court handed down a decision favoring Mrs. Stevens. Before the beginning of the long legal fight, the estate was valued at slightly over \$200,000. Since that time, while the litigation was being carried through the courts, it is estimated that the property has increased until it is now worth approximately \$1,000,000.


