# MONTAGUE MAKES YOKOHAMA FROM HERE IN 18 DAYS

Steamer Wawalona Expected to Arrive in Portland February 20 With Cargo From the Orient.

The Admiral line freighter Montague, which left the Columbia river January 2, for Yokohama, arrived at her destination January 29, making an excellent run in 18 days, according to a letter received this morning by the local operators from George Enyder, chief engineer of the yessel. Snyder was formerly a government inspector for the shipping board in this city.

No word had been received until this time from the Montague, which is operating in the Portland-Oriental service. She is due to return to Portland April 1. l'oor cable service has probably been the reason for lack of information.

The stetamer Wawalona, operating in the same service, is due to arrive in Portland, February 20, to load for sailing February 24. The Wawalona is bringing hemp, copra cake, cigars and other articles and will replace the Waban, which was recently withdrawn from the service to go to Vladivostok for the government.

The steamer Pawlet, which is now loading at St. Johns, will leave Sunday for the Orient. She will take a full cargo for Yokohama, Shanghai, Manila, and other ports in the Far East






