WEATHER CONDITIONS
A great low pressure area apparently extends from Northern Alaska and the Canadian interior to the North Atlantic coast, and the pressure is moderately low over the Southwest. The barometer is high over the remainder of the country, being highest in the Middle Mississippi valley. The weather has remained fair except in Alaska, New York and New England. The temperature is below normal over the Eastern half of the country, in Oklahoma and Texas, and over parts of the Pacific slope, but is 25 degrees or more above normal in Southern Idaho and in Northern Alberta. In the Ohio and Middle Mississippi valleys, Lake region and North Atlantic states, the temperature is generally 20 degrees or 25 degrees above normal. Zero weather prevails in the Upper Mississippi valley and Upper Lake region.

Rotarians Honor High Officials—Portland Rotarians will be hosts Tuesday to high officials of the organization. Clayton M. Williams, district governor of rotary, will speak at the luncheon in the Benson hotel, and other guests and speakers will be Alex McFarlane, past district governor, John Kearns, president of the Vancouver Rotary club, and John Scott, president of

the Victoria Rotary club. The visiting Rotarians, accompanied by delegates from the Portland club, will visit the Salem Rotary club on Wednesday, and the Astoria Rotary club on Thursday. The Rotary officials are here partly in the interest of the district Rotary convention soon to be held in Victoria, B. C.

Alleged Bootlegger Arrested—Andrew Kosovich, proprietor of a soft-drink establishment at Second and Davis streets, was arrested Sunday afternoon by Officers Drennen and Meacham on a charge of violating the prohibition law. Several bottles of alleged bootleg whiskey were seized as evidence. Andrew Berg and Tapa Evanoff were arrested in the building. Berg is charged with being drunk, and Evanoff is held as a vagrant. The trio will be held for the federal authorities.

School Superintendent Goes East—J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction, left Salem Saturday for Chicago, where he will attend the annual convention of the National Society for Vocational Education. This convention will meet on February 19, 20 and 21. Mr. Churchill will then go to Cleveland, where he will participate in several meetings of the department of superintendents, which is a part of the National Education association.

Arid Project Proposed—D. C. Hannay, attorney for the Medford irrigation district, was in conference with Perry Cupper, state engineer, at Salem last week with regard to a proposed contract whereby the Rogue River Canal company would furnish water for the development of the irrigation project. It is proposed to obtain the water from Little Butte creek, according to plans submitted to the engineer. The irrigation district contains about 10,000 acres, and is located in Jackson county.

Secretary Seeks Students—C. A. Kells, educational secretary of the Portland Y. M. C. A., was in Hood River last week seeking young men to take advantage of a scholarship fund provided in the annual meeting of the War Council from funds left unspent following the war. Hood River county's quota of the fund reaches \$160, and three young men will receive funds for their tuition fees.

Swiss Enters State University—Friedrich Augustin Buhler, native of Lucerne, Switzerland, diamond mine speculator in South Africa, linguist, teacher, salesman and newspaper man, has registered in the University of Oregon as a special student. He intends to devote his attention principally to the study of law.

Logging to Be Resumed—The Eufala company camp, a few miles northeast of Kelso in Clatsop county, will resume operations this week. This camp has been shut down since December. The camp employs more than 300 men when operating to capacity. Most of these reside in Kelso.

Chief Jenkins Resumes Duties—After being absent from his desk for three weeks, Chief of Police L. V. Jenkins returned this morning completely recovered from smallpox. His face is checkedered a trifle, but he feels fine. The chief spent the greater part of the morning handshaking and receiving congratulations over his recovery.

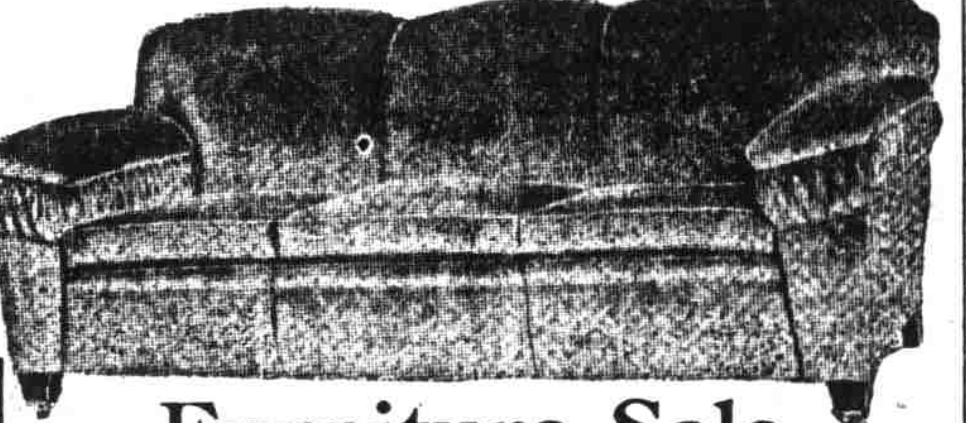

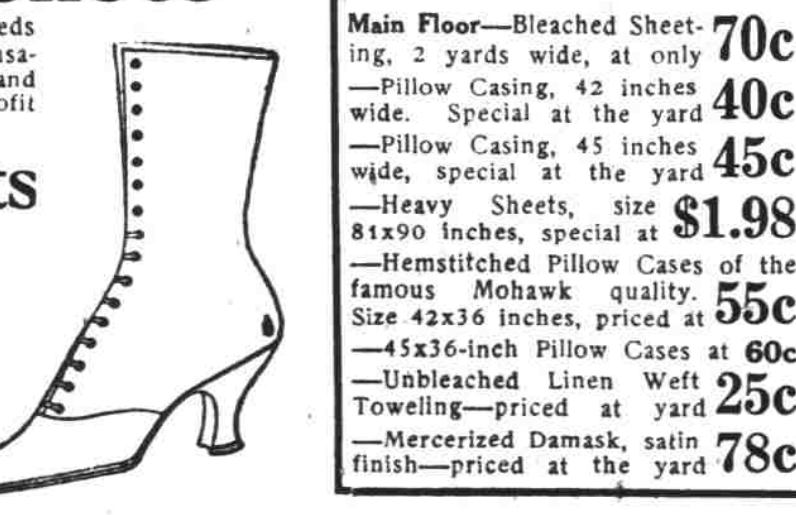
