

CITY HOSPITAL TO BE ERECTED FROM BUILDING PROCEEDS

City Council Figures Out Way of Raising Money Needed for Proposed Smallpox Institution.

Outside sale of the building and property in Fourth street between Yamhill and Morrison, until recently used as a fire station, will be accomplished at once, if possible, to provide funds for the creation of a smallpox hospital, the city council Monday decided.

The council determined upon emergency measures to secure otherwise unavailable funds for the hospital and the sale of the fire station was the most acceptable solution of the financial problem. The building will be advertised for sale in the hope that the city can get at least \$75,000 for it. Since it was vacated by the fire company so that the city might profit from the rental revenue, the structure has been converted into market stalls.

MAY PRUNE BUDGET
Should such a plan fail to produce the necessary money the council will again vigorously attack the budget with the hope of pruning off enough either to pay for the hospital or to add to the sale proceeds toward the same end. Both measures failing, it was decided, a street campaign or ordinary "drive" for funds will be resorted to.

Mayor Baker appointed Commissioners Pier and Bigelow with City Attorney La Roche to investigate thoroughly possible means of financing the building, should suggested methods fail. They will report to the city council on Wednesday morning.

Commissioners expressed themselves as absolutely in accord with the construction of the permanent smallpox hospital, but admitted they were at a loss to know how the city could raise the money.

Commissioner Bigelow suggested the building of temporary cottages or dormitories such as are used at the Cedars, Mayor Baker and Dr. George Parrish, city health officer, however, asserted that a makeshift building would be worse than none at all.

TO RETIRE VETERAN WOMAN
Mrs. Ellen Tott, superintendent of the smallpox cottage at Kelly Butte for 33 years, will be retired on a pension of \$40 a month by special ordinance introduced by Commissioner Mann on Wednesday, the council announced. A trained nurse, selected by Dr. Parrish, will take her position. Retirement November 14.

It will be two weeks before excavation for the new hospital is completed, announced Commissioner Barbur. The work has proceeded slowly in that the ground is too soft for the use of teams.

Tuberculosis Work In State Swells; Nurses Investigate

The United States public health service is cooperating with the Oregon Tuberculosis association in continuing and enlarging the work for tuberculosis soldiers and rejected civilians. Miss Mary E. Cronen of the Tuberculosis association is devoting her entire time to the care and supervision of these men throughout the state.

Miss Jane C. Allen, state supervising nurse, working with the state board of health and the Oregon Tuberculosis association, is in Southern Oregon in the interest of public health nursing. She will visit the public health associations of Linn, Lane and Jackson counties and investigate prospects for demonstrating the work in Douglas county. While in that section of the state she will attend the annual meeting of the Jackson County Public Health association.

Miss Helen Hartley, who will be assistant to Miss Allen, is expected to arrive soon from the East, where for three and a half years she was supervising nurse of Iowa.

Thursday she will address the Reed college assembly. Anyone interested will be welcome. Dr. MacLean will remain a guest of the college until Friday morning, when she will view the Columbia river highway.

Friday afternoon from 3 until 5 o'clock a tea will be given in her honor at the University club by the Association of Collegiate Alumnae. At 4 o'clock she will speak. In the evening she will be the honor guest at a dinner to be given by Mrs. Helen Ladd Corbett. On Saturday the Association of Collegiate Alumnae will sponsor the Civic League luncheon at the Hotel Benson and Dr. MacLean will be the speaker. Members of the association have reserved 100 places for the luncheon. Dr. MacLean will leave for Seattle on Saturday evening.

Food Bargains Are Placed on Sale by Government Store

Canned sweet potatoes were placed on sale Monday at the government retail store, Fifth and Pine streets. Although standard No. 2 cans, the price is only 7 cents.

Pears, standard No. 2 1/2 size cans, retail for 12 cents. This is far below regular retail price, and is possible only because the army is selling surplus wartime food supplies, explains E. A. M. Fowler, superintendent.

Included in recent stocks are 2000 hot water bottles, which are selling for only one third of the prices asked by regular stores, it is said. Their price is 96 cents each.

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WIFE DEFEATS HER HUSBAND'S PURPOSE OF GETTING DIVORCE

Evidence Showed Husband Agreed to Pay Wife for Not Contesting Suit.

When Joseph Turk applied to Judge Tucker Friday afternoon for a default decree of divorce, alleging largely that his wife, Pauline, was slovenly and extravagant, the judge doubted some of his assertions and ordered that a subpoena be served ordering the defendant to appear in court.

On the witness stand Monday morning, Pauline Turk testified her husband had told her that if she would not contest his divorce suit he would pay her \$100, but that if she did contest it she would not get one cent. He has already paid her \$30, and she displayed an agreement given her by Turk, in which he agreed to pay the remaining \$70 the minute the decree was granted. He also offered to pay her \$50 a month for the support of their children.

After hearing the woman's statements, Judge Tucker ordered that the case be thrown out of court.

Ruth K. Jones, in her complaint for divorce filed this morning against William V. Jones, asserts that they were married on September 10, 1915, and that shortly after that her husband insisted that they migrate to Germany, the home of his birth and adoption. During one of their numerous quarrels he threw an ash tray at her head, but it missed and broke in two when it hit the wall. He also threatened her life, she says, and kept her in constant fear.

Druggist Arrested Second Time
T. Harry Murphy, proprietor of the Harrison street pharmacy, who a short time ago pleaded guilty to leaving his store without having a registered pharmacist in charge, has again been arrested on a similar complaint. A fine of \$200, which was suspended, was imposed by Judge Jones of the district court on the first charge. He is expected to contest the new case.

\$5000 DAMAGES Sought
A suit for \$5000 personal damages against Hemphill's Trade schools was filed in circuit court Monday morning by W. A. Miller, a transportation inspector of the P. R. L. & P. company. Miller alleges that on November 6 he was a student at the school, and, without taking due precaution, they had him attempt to solder a gasoline tank with an acetylene torch. There was some explosion of the tank and an explosion resulted, seriously burning Miller about the face and body, and doing injury to his eyes.

He also asks for \$133.75 hospital fees.

Parman Indictment Dismissed
An indictment against Frank Parman charging burglary in a dwelling, was dismissed Monday by Presiding Judge McCord upon recommendation of the district attorney's office, and he was released from jail. Parman was indicted at the same time as Joseph De Bense and John Eberly, who are now awaiting trial, but was never connected with the two. He served 18 months in the army.

Arrested on Forgery Charge
Gordon Nelson, wanted in Pendleton on the charge of forgery, was arrested in a Broadway hotel Monday by Deputy Sheriff P. V. Rexford. Nelson is said to have cashed \$600 in spurious checks lately.

Stevens to Organize Association in City For Fire Protection

Fire prevention boosters Wednesday night will organize a local chapter of the National Fire Protection association, when Jay Stevens, former Portland fire chief, speaks at the Chamber of Commerce. The meeting is sponsored by the Portland Association of Credit Men, but everyone is invited.

Stevens, father of the association, spent Sunday in Portland on his way to Spokane, where he is organizing a similar chapter. He is visiting all large Pacific Coast cities and interesting business men and officials in fire protection work.

To be shown here Wednesday is a four-reel motion picture directed by the veteran fire fighter and showing methods of preventing conflagrations and incidental property losses.

Samuel E. Eddy, vice president of the Ladd & Titton bank and president of the local Credit Men's association, will preside at the meeting. He has invited Governor Quinn, Mayor Baker and state officials to attend and view the film. Eddy is chairman of the fire prevention committee of the National Association of Credit Men.

Man Thought Dead Shows Up After Wife's Remarriage

Ogden, Utah, Feb. 17.—With a husband that has suddenly come back from the dead, making one more husband than she could legitimately have, Mrs. Martha Bates yesterday rushed frantically before District Judge A. E. Pratt in this city and asked for the annulment of her marriage to Joseph Bates. She had heard that her first husband, William Douglas, whom she believed "killed in action" in France, had reappeared in Wyoming.

Mrs. Bates was married to Joseph Bates in Ogden several months ago. This ceremony came some time after she had received the government report that William Douglas had been killed in the fighting on the western front.

Switchman's Hand Amputated
Amputation of Arthur F. Pike's right hand was necessary at Good Samaritan hospital Monday night following an accident at the Northern Pacific terminals. Two cars ran over his hand. He is a switchman and lives at 322 Salmon street.

Silverton Store Robbed
The marshal at Silverton called the police this morning and asked them to be on the outlook for a thief with 14 razors and 200 pocket knives. The store of W. R. Ray was broken into there Saturday night and those articles stolen.

NEW TRAFFIC MANAGER OF LUMBER ASSOCIATION



H. N. Proebstel, formerly chief rate clerk for the North Bank traffic department at Portland, and until recently examiner for the Portland district freight traffic committee of the railroad administration, has been appointed traffic manager of the West Coast Lumbermen's association, effective March 1, to succeed L. S. McIntyre, who has resigned to form other connections.

Proebstel has been in the association offices in Seattle since February 1, familiarizing himself with the work and giving special attention to the car shortage. He has been engaged in traffic work for 14 years, serving various roads having headquarters in Portland, including the Southern Pacific, Union Pacific and North Bank lines. For a year prior to formation of the railroad administration, he was traffic manager for the Wittenberg-King company, dried fruit packers at Portland.

McIntyre has been traffic manager for the association for 2 1/2 years. Previously for seven years he was in the general freight office of the Milwaukee railroad.

Lady Nancy Astor wears a simple black velvet toque in the house of commons. She is so far the only woman member of parliament, the Countess Markievicz, Sinn Fein member, having refused to take her seat.

Yakima Business Men Organize to Fight Union Labor

Yakima, Wash., Feb. 17.—The fight for the open shop launched in Yakima by a temporary organization of associated industries was heightened by the completion of the organization, when 100 representative business men of the valley, employing 2250 workers, adopted a constitution and decided to take a stand against the domination of radical labor leaders.

Labor leaders have circulated petitions and are seeking to divide forces by getting new scale contracts signed. Because the master plumbers have refused, all union men quit work Saturday night.

Prevost Held for Murder of Brown

Mount Clemens, Mich., Feb.—(I. N. E.)—Lloyd Prevost was bound over to the district court on a charge of first degree murder in connection with the slaying of J. Stanley Brown, wealthy resident of this city, found murdered in his automobile on a lonely road near Mount Clemens last December.

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SPECIAL INHERITANCE TAX AUDITOR IS NAMED FOR MULTNOMAH WORK

State Treasurer's Policy of Investigating Estates Necessitates Additional Help.

Salem, Feb. 17.—Increased business in the inheritance tax department of the state treasurer's office due to the policy of State Treasurer Hoff, which involves the investigation of each estate, has necessitated the appointment of a special inheritance tax auditor to have charge of Multnomah county estates. R. A. Reid of Portland, formerly deputy in the office of the county clerk of Multnomah county, has been assigned to this work, commencing his duties last week.

Estates to the aggregate appraised value of more than \$15,000, the bulk of which are Multnomah county estates, await investigation by the department. This addition to the staff of the inheritance tax department, it is pointed out, is more than justified by the marked increase in the revenues of the department through the enforcement of Treasurer Hoff's policy of investigation.

H. J. Eberly, deputy in the office of State Forester, left Monday night for March field, Riverside, Cal., where he will undergo a course of instruction in the work of an airplane observer in connection with the forest patrol work which the army will conduct in this state during the coming summer. Eberly expects to spend a month at the aviation school.

The county court of Coos county has made application to the public service commission for permission to construct a grade crossing over the tracks of the Southern Pacific railroad.

The Enterprise Electric company of Enterprise has filed an application with State Engineer Cupper covering the appropriation of 60 second feet of water from wallows near the development of 1027 horsepower at a power plant to be constructed above Wallowa lake.

Application has also been filed by H. Earl Cross of Prineville for the appropriation of water from a spring for domestic supply.

Announcement of his appointment as a member of the railroad rates committee of the National Association of Railroad and Utilities Commissioners was received by Fred Williams of the Oregon public service commission Monday.

Illness has considerably depleted the ranks of the state employees in the Capitol building this week. Among those who failed to report for duty Monday were Sam A. Koser, deputy secretary of state; Don H. Upjohn, private secretary to Governor Olcott; and Mark McAllister, deputy corporation commissioner.
