WEATHER CONDITIONS
 Low pressure prevails from Alaska southeastward to the Plains states and thence eastward to the North Atlantic coast. High pressure over the Pacific and Rocky Mountain states and the country south of the Ohio river, the highest reading being in Western Washington. Precipitation has been confined to small areas in Alaska, British Columbia, Saskatchewan and New York. The weather is considerably colder in parts of Idaho and Western Montana, and is much milder over a large part of the country east of the Rocky mountains. In Iowa and South Dakota the low clouds are more than 30 degrees. At some Middle Western Canadian stations the temperature is more than 35 degrees above normal.

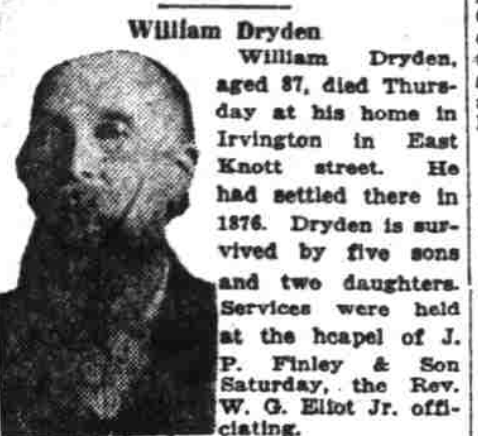
Obsequies Held for Mrs. Victoria Thibert, Who Died on Sunday
