

FINES ARE LEVIED ON 5 VIOLATORS OF FEDERAL LAWS

Pollution of Streams, Fishing in Deadline and Having Deer Meat on Hand Result in Fines.

R. E. Leber of Veneta was fined \$25 at Eugene for permitting sawdust to be discharged into the waters of a tributary of Long Tom creek. Deputy Game Warden H. A. Mack and Ed Hawkes have reported to the fish and game commission. A similar fine was imposed on T. T. Chave, manager of the Effenberger lumber company of Donna, for fluming sawdust in the stream. Chave had been arrested previously and had agreed to take care of the dust at once. Earl Ford of Tillamook was fined \$25 for setting a net at the mouth of Stillwell ditch inside the 100 feet dead line. C. W. Loughery, deputy game warden, reports. From Lakeview comes the report from Deputy Game Warden H. D. Stout that Dick Cowman and Cargon Jergamo, both of Odell, had been fined \$5 each for having deer meat in their possession.

Contracts Awarded For Pine and Fir Of Okanogan Forest

Assistant District Forester Fred Ames has opened bids on 700,000 feet of yellow pine and 40,000 feet of Douglas fir, located in Okanogan national forest in section 20, township 29 north, range 23 east. The Lake Chelan box factory was awarded the contract at \$2 per thousand for pine and \$1 for Douglas fir. On the Rainier national forest, 2500 cords of western red cedar shingle boards in sections 15, 16, 17 and 18, township 11 north, range 8 east, were sold to the Spaulding Timber company of Kosmos at 60 cents a cord.

FRENCH CAPTAIN TOOK OWN LIFE

Former Crown Prince Narrates Touching Incident of Battle of Argonne.

Berlin, Feb. 18.—In his book dealing with the fighting qualities of the soldiers of the various nations involved in the great war, the ex-crown prince relates the following touching incident regarding a French captain:

"Without desiring in any way to deny the great personal bravery of the French soldier, I believe that in hand to hand fighting he is inferior to ours. The French infantry usually advanced only when their splendid artillery had visibly prepared the ground.

"I recall one particular instance, when the French infantry did not follow its leader at all into close fighting. During the attack in the Argonne we could plainly hear the command, 'A la bayonnette! En avant, mes braves!' (Use the bayonet! Come along my brave lads.)

"A French captain, revolver in hand, jumped out of his trench and ran toward us. He was perceived by the none of his men was following him. As if by command our side ceased firing. At this the French captain saluted our trench with a graceful movement of the hand, then put the revolver to his head and shot himself. We buried the brave Frenchman with the honors due him."

to the compilation in Who's Who in America, was born at Brooklyn, N. Y., and is nearly 47 years of age. In addition to a degree of bachelor of arts at the Brooklyn Polytechnic institute, Dr. Chandler received his master's degree at Columbia in 1896, and his Ph. D. at the same school in 1899. He traveled and studied in Europe for four years.

He is a member of the Modern Language association of America and expresses himself as an authority on English as author of the following works: "Romances of Roguery," an Episode in the History of the Novel, 1899; "The Literature of Roguery, 1907; Aspects of Modern Drama, 1914; editor of texts in Tudor, Shakespeare and Modern Student's Library; contributor to Library of the World's Best Literature and New Encyclopedia Americana. In addition to his record as an educator, Dr. Chandler has been in demand as a summer school lecturer at Columbia and elsewhere.

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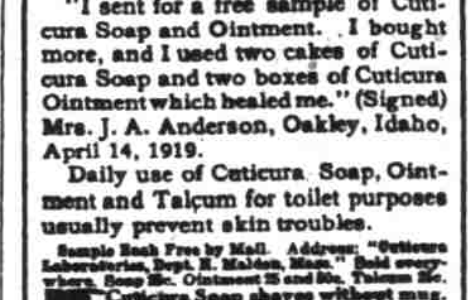
