

WILL PORTLAND MERIT FAME AS CONVENTION CITY?

Shrine and Three Other Big Meetings in June to Test Hospitality of Oregon Metropolis.

Portland will make or break on the Shrine convention.

The success of the undertaking is hanging in the balance because of indifference of Portland home owners.

Visitors to four conventions will be in the city at the same time. Rooms for 100,000 persons must be had. The hotels are bought out; schools, churches, public institutions of all sorts must be used; but in addition, 30,000 rooms must be had in private homes.

The average resident when approached, Shrine officials say, says he may have friends of his own in the city at that time, but he isn't sure—but he thinks maybe some of them will come and he will have to keep the room for them.

Immities of the Y. M. C. A. have agreed to turn over their rooms to visitors. Guests of many of the hotels have volunteered likewise. Every downtown hotel is cooperating to the fullest extent in providing housing facilities for the visitors to the biggest convention ever put off in the Rose City.

"We are worried," frankly admits Mark Woodruff, who is handling the housing situation. "We have not only one convention but four to handle when it comes to accommodations. The Shrine convention, the Rose Festival, the Travelers' Protective association and Kiwanis will all combine in declaring Portland to be the finest city in the United States or the most lacking in hospitality, depending upon the sort of facilities provided. Hotels are sending me names of visitors writing for reservations for the first two conventions and stating they wish to remain over for the Shrine convention. Hotels cannot rent rooms under this arrangement, because the Shrine has already reserved every available room for the week of June 22."

"We must have more favorable response from the residence portions of the city if Portland is to hold up her head with other cities of the country in the way of housing accommodations for its visitors. The reputation of the city is at stake."

Volunteer workers from the Shrine are canvassing the city for available rooms. Assignment of rooms is expected to begin April 1.

Sunday Shows Lose Out

Twin Falls, Idaho, Feb. 18.—Twin Falls will not have Sunday picture shows. A petition signed by about 1000 voters of the city favored the opening of the shows while remonstrances, with 2000 signers, opposed the opening. The council voted to keep the shows closed.

PIONEER OF 1852 IS BURIED AT JEFFERSON



George Stockton Miller

George Stockton Miller, pioneer of 1852 and continuously a resident of Oregon since that time, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Stella Miller Wildfong, on February 12. Funeral services were conducted on Sunday, with interment at Jefferson, Or., where he was buried beside his wife near their former home.

Mr. Miller, related to the Stocktons of California, was born on March 2, 1837, and in 1852 crossed the plains to Oregon. On January 12, 1861, he was married to Mabel Jerusha Walter, and to them were born six children, four of whom survive their father. They are: Archie Clifton, George Masters, Everett Miles and Estella Frances Miller Wildfong. Mrs. Miller died on January 7, 1918.

During most of his life in Oregon, Mr. Miller lived close to Eugene and did not come to Portland until after the death of his wife. At Creswell Mr. Miller was for a number of years justice of the peace.

Mr. Miller and others of the pioneer Miller family were prominent in the early history of Oregon's development and Mr. Miller was especially active in community and state affairs.

All Bids on German Liners Are Rejected By Shipping Board

Washington, Feb. 18.—(U. P.)—The senate commerce committee today scrutinized bids received by the shipping board for former German ships. Chairman John Barton Payne of the board was called before the committee to present figures and explain them. Payne told the committee the shipping board had already rejected the bids and another auction will be held next month subject to the approval of congress.

NEW LUMBER MILL AT VENETA TO SHIP OUT 150 CARS PER MONTH

Several Other Mills Have Large Orders Booked, Assuring Long, Steady Run.

Veneta, Or., Feb. 18.—An average of 150 cars a month of lumber, ties and wood will soon be leaving Veneta. In addition large quantities of cream, eggs and poultry are being sent out.

Roberts, Immet & Co. is constructing a mill of 30,000 feet capacity. The R. E. Leiber company is shipping an average of two cars a day from its new mill south of town. Others shipping from this point are the Henry Shannon mill, Lewis Brothers, Elmira Lumber company, F. B. Roberts mill, and the Hanon mill.

The Roberts, Immet & Co. mill, when completed, will furnish employment to about 40 men and the Leiber mill employs as many. The Elmira mill employs 50 and the others from 15 to 25 each.

Many new residences are springing up and the two general merchandise stores are doing a heavy business. The Hazelwood company paid out about \$25,000 in this section last year, according to Manager P. C. Pratt.

William Clark is preparing to erect a blacksmith shop and a residence on property recently purchased, and F. B. Roberts has purchased the New Era hotel property, occupied by Dee Hooper, who will retire.

Accused Man May Depart Tonight for Trial in California

Theodore W. Powell, alias S. R. Powell, alias S. R. Weatherby, charged with manufacturing fake railroad passes, probably will leave tonight or Thursday to stand trial.

Powell was arrested in Portland last week by department of justice officials on California advices. It is alleged that he was one of the ring leaders of the nation-wide organization for making and selling the passes. He has confessed, declares Special Agent W. R. Bryon of the department of justice here.

Mrs. Powell was arrested two days after her husband was taken into custody. She had been hiding.

Judith Gap Offers \$10,000 Bond Issue

A \$10,000 Judith Gap, Mont., general obligation 6 per cent bond issue is one of the latest offerings of the Lumbermen Trust company. Judith Gap is the commercial center of the fertile valley region known as Judith Basin and is tapped by two transcontinental railroad lines. The bonds are of \$500 denomination, dated July 1, 1919, due January 1, 1939, priced to yield 6 per cent.

Persons Who Take Tips Must Divide Money With U. S.

New York, Feb. 18.—Walters, porters, barbers, bellboys and others, who are lucky enough to get tips, must keep tab on them and give Uncle Sam a "divvy." The collector of internal revenue today called attention to the fact that these gratuities must be included on the income tax return, because they are regarded as part of the salary or wages. Women who collect alimony, however, escape taxation on that portion of their income.

Military Tournament Program for O. A. C. March 13 Completed

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Feb. 18.—Complete plans for the huge military tournament scheduled for March 13 have just been announced by the committee in charge, with Edward C. Hanford, major of field artillery, as chairman. The event will take place in the college armory in the evening.

The program will consist of two parts—the military tournament proper and a physical education exhibition put on by the co-eds under the supervision of Miss Edna Cocks, professor of physical education for women. More than 100 women will participate in classical drills and ceremonies.

Captain George A. Powell of Portland will be master of ceremonies. John C. Gray of Santa Rosa, Cal., has been appointed vice president of the student assembly, the only sophomore representation in that body. This action was taken by the executive committee of the college to fill the vacancy caused by the failure of Cecil Dunn of Portland to return to college.

Smith Makes Flight From San Francisco To Eugene in 5 Hours

Eugene, Feb. 17.—Major Albert E. Smith, who plans to leave today by plane for Camp Lewis, made the flight from San Francisco to Eugene in five hours' flying time. He was six hours on the way, but stopped for an hour to visit at Red Bluff. The distance of 300 miles between Riverside and Fresno was made in four hours, as the major was obliged to make a stop in the desert on account of engine trouble. The 200 miles between Fresno and San Francisco took two hours. He easily made the Skeki range at an altitude of 14,000 feet. Heavy fogs have held him in Eugene.

Dynamite Explodes; Rancher Is Injured And Youth May Die

Albany, Feb. 18.—Ross Pierce, 18, son of D. T. Pierce of Crabtree, and Melvin Prime, well known Crabtree rancher, were seriously injured by the accidental explosion of 25 dynamite caps Tuesday. Pierce is in a hospital at Lebanon and may die. The accident occurred while they were blasting stumps on Prime's place.

Verd Hill, wealthy rancher at Independence, is made defendant in a sensational divorce suit filed here Tuesday by Frances E. Hill. Custody of their only child, \$20,000 permanent alimony and one-third of Hill's real property, estimated at nearly \$100,000, are asked in the complaint. Objections to her religion and his alleged penuriousness are among reasons given for the suit. The couple were married December 28, 1914. Mrs. Hill formerly was Frances Heimick of Albany.

Everybody Has Flu At Shelburn and No Nurses, Is Report

Albany, Or., Feb. 18.—The influenza is raging in Shelburn and practically the entire population is stricken with the disease. It has been almost impossible to obtain nurses to take care of the sick. Every child in the town of school age has the malady.

Charles Hoskett died at his home in Millersburg following an attack of pneumonia. He had been in bed for 55 years. He is survived by his wife and two children.

Subscriptions are coming in for the fund to erect a memorial community center house for the ex-service men of Linn county, \$200 being received in the past few days.

Eugene's Dry Record For February Broken

Eugene, Feb. 18.—With only .05 of an inch of rainfall since the last week in January, all records for a dry February have been broken. Last year the February rainfall was 8.4 inches, and the normal is close to six inches. There is no snow in the mountains. Due to this lack of rainfall, roads throughout the county are in good condition, and it is possible to drive over the McKenzie pass. In spring plowing farmers are fully a month ahead in their work.

Ashland Post Plans Banquet on Feb. 22

Ashland, Feb. 18.—Ashland Post No. 14, American Legion, planning and together banquet for Washington's birthday. Certificates from the French government to relatives of boys who died in service in France will be presented at a public meeting. In March, together with the National guard company, the legion will present in concert the O. A. C. Cadet band, followed by a dance in the armory. The post will shortly establish an employment bureau. It has 130 members.

Irish Bonds Sold
The Dalles, Feb. 18.—After speeches made Sunday in behalf of Irish independence, several thousand dollars' worth of bond certificates of the prospective republic were sold.

Women Have First Disagreement Over League Advisability

Chicago, Feb. 17.—(I. N. S.)—First disagreement in the ranks of suffragists over the new League of Women voters, organized at the suffrage victory convention here to supplant the National Woman Suffrage association, occurred today.

A number of Democratic and Republican delegates to the convention joined in expressing their disapproval of the league generally, on the contention that it is unnecessary. They held the view that the federation of women's clubs could ably replace the national suffrage organization when it goes out of existence.

Mrs. George Bass, national chairman of the women's branch of the Democratic party, was reported to be working openly against the league.

At today's session, the convention voted for recommendations that compulsory citizenship classes be established in all public schools and for making possible the naturalization of married women.

\$40,000 Church for Bend
Bend, Feb. 18.—Immediate construction of a new \$40,000 Methodist Episcopal church here is announced, decision having been reached Sunday night. Congested conditions of the present church and expected growth in the city explained Rev. J. Edmar Purdy, pastor, are reasons for an immediate building program. The Methodist church will be a neighbor to the new \$50,000 Catholic church now under construction.

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Death Dealing Ripe Olives Taken From Market, Says Wells

"The public need have no fear in eating ripe olives in that the brand that caused six deaths in New York has been taken off the market," announced State Chemist A. S. Wells today, following a conference with Dr. David N. Roberg, state health officer, and Grant J. Morton, United States food and drug inspector.

So many inquiries have been pouring into the dairy and food commissioner's laboratory during the last few days regarding ripe olives and other canned goods that the conference was called.

"Any spoiled canned goods may be infected with bacillus botulinus, which recently killed six in a family in New York," said Wells. "Fruit or vegetables put up by housewives may even contain this poisoning. If a can or jar of food has the slightest odor of decay it is far safer to throw it away, rather than take the risk of poisoning those who eat it."
