

JUGO SLAVS STORM U. S. EMBASSY TO SHOW FRIENDSHIP

Cheers Are Offered for Wilson
and America in Demonstration
Against Allies' Ultimatum.

Vienna, Austria, Jan. 29.—(By
Courier to Paris, France, Feb. 18.)—
The qualified Jugo Slav rejection of
the entente ultimatum was drafted
in a solemn crown council of the
kingdom under the presidency of
Prince Regent Alexander and in-
cluding such national leaders as
Foreign Minister Trumbich and M.
Pashitch, president of the Paris
peace delegation.

Cables were read in the council from
the Jugo Slav representative in Wash-
ington and a decision was reached to
decline the ultimatum but to express re-
spect for the entente's point of view
and a desire to continue the present
good relations to the end in solving the
problem.

STORM EMBASSY
When the decision was announced
later to the public, Prince Alexander,
who, attired in a military uniform,
attended a concert at the Belgrade
Casino, received a tremendous popular
ovation. The city was stirred from its
usual calm and crowds appeared before
the American embassy, cheering for
President Wilson and H. Percival Dodge,
the American minister, until the latter
appeared on the balcony and made a
speech thanking the Jugo Slavs for the
sympathy they had expressed for the
president of the United States. He said
he hoped the appeal of the Jugo Slavs
would reach friendly ears and that the
final decision would be in accordance
with justice.

Some of the crowd broke through the
cordon of generalissimo and made a
hostile demonstration. The Jugo Slav
government is being stormed with telegrams from
all parts of the country demanding that
the ultimatum be rejected. The next
move is up to Italy. If she asks for
the execution of the pact of London and
the demand is allowed by the entente
force will have to be used, as the Jugo
Slavs are not made of stuff which can
be considered submissive.

From an authorized official source I
have the following statement:
"The ultimatum was the cause of
greater emotion throughout Jugo Slavia
than was caused by the annexation to
Austria of Bosnia and Herzegovina
with such dire consequences to the
world. The bitterness and disillusion
of the Serbs is only feebly echoed in
the newspapers. A democratic paper in
Belgrade says:
"We have lost all illusions regarding
the moral conceptions of the peace con-
ference which does not differ from the
former conferences in the old Europe.
But we are young and the world is be-
fore us. Many times our friends have
learned the extent of our loyalty and
valor and what we can do when urged
on by hate or love."

HOSTILE ATTITUDE
Another of the Belgrade papers says:
"The western powers seem to wish to
regain by sacrificing our country. This
attitude clearly makes it impossible for
us henceforth to remain in the same
company with Italy. The last decision
of the council of ambassadors shows
that they think the expediency of the
moment is more important than the fu-
ture of the world."

The Croatian and Slavonian news-

papers show a hostile attitude towards
the Serbs, claiming that the latter are
disposed to accept the Paris decision
which above all is detrimental to the
smaller parts of the federation. A
Zagreb paper says: "The government
and nation must unite in stating that we
demand our rights and refuse to cede
the smallest part of Dalmatia. If the
big powers fail to realize that they are
asking the impossible Europe must take
into consideration the fact that the war
is not yet terminated." A Dalmatian
paper says: "Our slogan is Jugo Slavia
for the Jugo Slavs and only a solution
along the line will satisfy us." The
Dalmatian Nova Doba wants to know
what the attitude of the United States
is going to be and says that the last
word has not yet been spoken.

AMERICA IS DENOUNCED AS A FOE TO GERMANY BY MONARCHIST PRESS

Papers Print Fake Stories of Al-
leged Brutality of American
Troops on Innocent Women.

Berlin, Germany, Feb. 18.—While the
attitude of the general public in Ger-
many toward the United States is
rather friendly, and while the liberal
newspapers on every possible occasion
urge that no pains be spared to re-
establish a cordial relationship, the
monarchists, Pan-Germans and their
papers are still indulging in the dis-
semination of false news and editorial
comments, which in their obvious effort
to stir up feeling against the United
States are second only to their vil-
lification of England and France.
One of their favorite methods of as-
sailing the Americans is to print stories
about the alleged brutality of the Amer-
ican troops of occupation on the Rhine,
in their treatment of the native popu-
lation. The Deutsche Tageszeitung,
the Junker organ, a few days ago printed
another report of this kind under the
headline, "A Nun Assaulted by Ameri-
can Soldiers." It set forth that on
January 13, a truckload of American
soldiers seized a nun in the streets of
Coblenz and mistreated her.
"Although two weeks have elapsed
since the crime occurred and the nun
is dangerously ill, the American au-
thorities have taken no steps to punish
the culprit," ran the report. "This is
an example of the discipline of the
noble victors which was promised us
when the Rhineband was occupied."

From Major General Henry T. Allen,
commanding the American troops in
Coblenz, I have received the following
reply to an inquiry as to the facts in
the case:
"These headquarters received a report
that on January 13, a Catholic nun was
carried away in an automobile by four
soldiers. The matter was investigated
but the nationality of the men could
not be definitely determined. Investi-
gation was difficult on account of the
fact that the organization of which the
nurse was a member desired the matter
to be dropped, would give no informa-
tion and would not allow the nurse to
be interviewed. It has been definitely
established that there was no evidence
of an attack."

**FEES ARE ADVANCED
TO DIZZY HEIGHTS

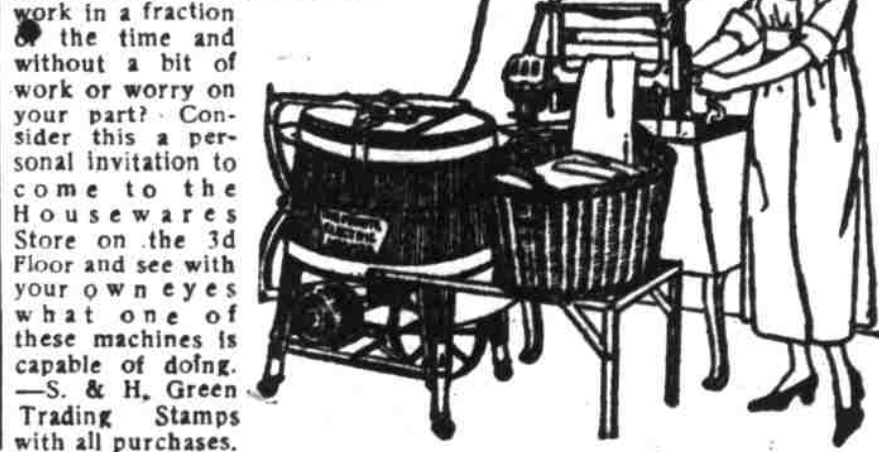
