

STATE BOARD TO RECEIVE BIDS FOR 21 NEW BRIDGES

Tenders to Be Opened in Portland, March 23, for Macadamizing and Other Road Work.

Salem, Feb. 20.—Bids on 21 new bridges, overhead crossings and viaducts and on highway improvements, including 38.3 miles of grading and 17.4 miles of macadamizing will be received by the state highway commission at its next monthly meeting in Portland, March 23, according to a statement given out by the highway department here.

Contract for the grading and macadamizing of 17.4 miles of the Dallas-Columbia highway in Jefferson county from Madras to the Deschutes county line will be let at this meeting of the commission. This will be the first state road work attempted in Jefferson county and the county will cooperate to the extent of \$50,000 on this improvement.

In Wasco county 12.5 miles of the Columbia River highway from Seufert to the Deschutes river will also be up for contract. This is a federal aid project, with the state and federal governments sharing the cost of the improvement.

Another federal aid project up for consideration at the March meeting of the commission will be that of the Walla Walla county section of the La Grande-Enterprise highway, on which bids are to be received for the grading of 8.4 miles.

Overhead crossings on the Columbia River highway over the G.W. R. & N. at Big Eddy and Dillon and a viaduct at Seufert will also be contracted for at this meeting.

Among the bridges on which bids are to be received at this time are the following:

Crook county—One bridge over Bear creek, one over Dry creek and four over Crooked river.

Mallheur county—One bridge over Pole creek and one over Canyon creek.

Marion and Linn counties—Steel span over the Santiam river.

Grant and Wheeler counties—Nine bridges on the Sarvite creek—Valdes section of the John Day River highway.

Permission to appropriate 5000 second feet of water from the Deschutes river for the development of 60,000 horsepower is sought in an application filed with State Engineer Copper by J. C. Stevens of Portland. This development contemplates the construction of a concrete dam 115 feet high and 560 feet long and a canal 600 feet long. No estimate of the cost of the proposed project is given in the application.

Application was also filed by A. J. McInturff and son of Enterprise, Or., for the appropriation of 100 second feet of water from the Walla Walla river above Wallawa lake for the development of 682 horsepower at an estimated expenditure of \$51,000.

Other applications for water rights filed with the state engineer were:

By Ludwig E. Kaukonen of Carbonate, Wash. for water from Lightline creek, in Grant county, for mining purposes.

Applegate, Or., waste water from Daniel Gulch and Rich Gulch for the irrigation of 55 acres in Jackson county.

A total of 87,301 gallons of gasoline and 1390 gallons of distillate were sold in Oregon during January by the Shell company of California, according to a statement filed with the secretary of state's office, accompanying the statement was a check for \$322.86, representing the state tax on fuel oil sales, which money goes to the credit of the state road fund.

Application has been made to the public service commission by the Tillamook county court for permission to change the location of grade crossings over the Southern Pacific railroad near Bay City, Hobsonville and Miami.

Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, has gone to Klamath county, where he will investigate reports to the effect that sheep are being imported into Oregon from California in violation of the existing quarantine. Dr. Lytle will cooperate with a federal inspector in his investigations, which, if reports are found to be founded on fact, will result in the prosecution of offending stockmen.

D. C. Lewis of Portland, a member of the house of representatives from Multnomah county, wants a promotion into the senate at the next session of the legislature. Accordingly he has filed his nominating petition for a place on the Republican ballot at the primary election with the secretary of states office here. Lewis declares himself as in favor of "legislation that will bring the state and nation back to normal and aid in lowering the cost of living." Whether he means it or not, he further declares that "legislation in favor of the few and against the many SHOULD BE tolerated." He would repeal all bad laws and those of doubtful expediency. As his slogan he asks that the words, "I will do right be printed after his name on the primary ballot.

Mrs. Junk, Former Salem Musician, Dies

Salem, Feb. 20.—Mrs. Lois Peebles Junk, daughter of the late George A. Peebles of Salem, died at her home in Chepek, Wis., this week, according to word received here. Mrs. Junk was well known in Salem musical circles and was the composer of several songs. She had planned to pursue her musical education in New York, but was prevented by illness. She leaves one daughter, Genevieve. Dr. L. F. Griffith, assistant superintendent at the state hospital, is an uncle.

FILIPINO BOY SUFFERS MANY HARDSHIPS TO GET EDUCATION IN AMERICA

After Finishing at Eugene, He Will Return Home to Teach His Brothers.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Feb. 20.—Leopold Theodore, a student from the Philippines, desired an American education so much that he became a globe trotter, stowaway, soldier, prisoner in city jails, and finally a student at the University of Oregon. Theodore intends to return to the Philippines, after having finished his higher education, and teach his brothers in the native schools. "I've earned every cent of my way through school so far," says Theodore. "I'm going to go back to the Philippines and until in my people a spirit of mutual understanding. The United States is going to give us our independence some day and it is the persons with an American education who are going to be the leaders."

Theodore worked his way through the normal school in Manila. He then emigrated to Hawaii, there being appointed interpreter for the Filipinos in Hawaii during the visit of the congressional party.

Theodore made up his mind at a very early age to come to America for an education. Arriving in San Francisco on a freighter at the time of the epidemic with 35 cents in his pocket, he found it difficult to get work. Chinese being preferred to Filipinos.

He then sailed to Alaska, working there three months in a cannery on Cook's Inlet. After coming south he was drafted into the army but was discharged at Camp Lewis because he was too short. Later he was arrested as a "slacker" and remained in jail for several days. Theodore worked in the shipyards in Portland, where he contracted influenza. Discharged after three days as cured, he remained to work at the hospital. He saved \$130 at this position and thinking this amount enough to get him an education, started for college.

Keeley Announces Charge to Be Filed Against Marshall

Salem, Feb. 20.—Unless Attorney General George M. Brown institutes suit against William A. Marshall, chairman of the state industrial accident commission, to compel the return to the workmen's compensation fund of the \$4000 paid to Edna Blanche Dibbern of Portland as compensation for the death of her husband, an employee of the Grant Smith-Porter Ship company, or the forfeiture of Marshall's \$10,000 bond, Lee Roy E. Keeley, Portland attorney, will himself institute such action, charging Marshall with misappropriation of \$4000 from the workmen's compensation fund and with malfeasance in office.

This contemplated action was made known by Keeley here in consultation with District Attorney Max Gehler of Marion county with reference to placing the case before the Marion county

grand jury in an effort to secure an indictment against Marshall as a basis for criminal action, charging deliberate misappropriation of the funds of the state industrial accident commission in the Dibbern case. Keeley has given the attorney general until Monday to act, he said.

Keeley first interested himself in the Dibbern case as the alleged attorney for Mrs. Dibbern. He alleges that Mrs. Dibbern was not entitled to the \$4000 received as a lump sum, on the ground that lump-sum payments can be made only to non-residents. Keeley's demand for 40 per cent of the settlement was ignored and court action later by Keeley to compel Mrs. Dibbern to return the money was lost.

Crumline L. Fowler, Resident of Kelso, Washington, Dead

Kelso, Wash., Feb. 20.—Crumline L. Fowler, better known as "Pete" Fowler, died Wednesday. He was a native of Cowitz county, born at Freeport in 1864. He is survived by his wife and eight children.

Mrs. Nina Williams died of pneumonia at the home of her uncle, M. H. Nelson, north of town. She became ill shortly after her arrival here for a visit. She leaves her husband and little son. The body was taken to Portland for burial, Saturday.

Eugene Legion Boys And Major White in Mix Over Ball Dates

Eugene, Feb. 20.—American Legion boys who have charge of the legion dances and Major William G. White, custodian of the armory, are in a mix-up as to when the legion may hold its dances in the armory. The legion wants Saturday evenings and Major White says that evening has been rented to an orchestra. Major White asserts the legion has never contributed a cent to maintaining the armory, although it insists on the right to use the armory without consulting the custodian.

By May 1, nine airplanes will be assigned to forest patrol service, according to Major Albert D. Smith, who spent several days here while waiting for the for to disappear. It was also hinted that if the people of Eugene vote for a municipal airplane field, the war department might erect hangars on the field here. A De Havilland is to be included in the forest patrol service this year, he said.

If citizens fail to stay at home and away from crowds, the city board of health threatens to clamp the lid on tight and make Eugene a closed town. At present 500 school children are staying at home and as many more citizens are suffering from influenza.

Firm Must Pay Taxes
Boise, Idaho, Feb. 20.—On motion of First Assistant Attorney General Dean Driscoll, an order was issued Wednesday by Judge F. S. Dietrich of the United States district court, directing the Mountain States Telephone & Telegraph company to pay approximately \$65,000 of its 1919 taxes in seven counties, pending the income of suits instituted by the company to enjoin the assessors of the prospective counties from collecting the taxes assessed against the company.

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Molalla's New Lath Mill to Be Ready for Operations March 1

Molalla, Feb. 20.—E. R. Todd and J. D. Owen, local business men, have completed arrangements for installing a lath mill near the Willamette Valley Southern railway depot in this city. Work on building is under way and will be ready for the machinery upon its arrival. The plant will have a capacity of from 40,000 to 50,000 lath a day. Slabs will be hauled to the mill with trucks from several sawmills close to town. The mill will employ from eight to 12 men, and it is planned to have it in operation by March 1.

From Pendleton Seymour goes to Baker and Malheur counties.

Professor E. L. Westover of the dairy extension department of the college is in Walla Walla county this week, lecturing in the interest of the silo campaign being conducted in the northeastern counties of the state. He will be in Umatilla county next week.
