

## VIENNA CHILDREN GET ONE THIRD OF FOOD THEY NEED

American Charitable Organizations Are Feeding 225,000 in Austria, but This Only Helps.

Vienna, Feb. 18.—(Via Paris, Feb. 23.)—"The Graben," Vienna's leading business street, was covered with a few inches of snow. More huge flakes were falling and all but hiding the lofty towers of St. Stephen's cathedral and dimming the lights in the shop windows. A long column of chattering children crossed the Graben shuffling in their worn shoes through the snow and hesitating near a fallen horse, the driver of which was trying to get him on his feet. The traffic was stopped for a few moments to let the children pass. The policemen and soldiers made a pretense of gruffness as they guided the column across the street, calling upon the youngsters to hurry past the wall of trucks and automobiles waiting to proceed.

Curious bystanders asked one little girl where she was going. "To the Americanische," she replied with a little air of pride in the tilt of her head.

### FEED 225,000 CHILDREN

Then I understood that she was going to the American child feeding kitchen. In one hand she carried a somewhat battered soldier's aluminum dish. From the Baltic to the Adriatic along the wide way where the West meets the East, 2,000,000 children are going every day to the "Americanische" kitchens. In Austria the relief organization is feeding 225,000 children, including 70,000 who have been dangerously undernourished. Lieutenant Stockton, who is in charge of the work in Austria, says that if he had all the funds required he would feed about 300,000 children in Vienna one meal a day and then try to give them more than one meal daily. At present those fed receive one ration a day, equal in calories to about a quart of average milk. The children are given a thorough medical examination, according to which they are divided into four classes. Class A is normal, class B undernourished, class C undernourished to such an extent that illness is threatened, and class D undernourished and ill. Out of 50,000 children examined, 96 per cent belonged to classes B and C.

Starvation in Vienna does not operate as in India, where people die from lack of food. Vienna children contract tuberculosis and die, but they rarely succumb from hunger. Of course class D is fed first and then classes B and C are received in the kitchens. It is hard to change the classification of a child, especially from class B to class A. It is done periodically in order to make room for those whose need is the greatest. A recent examination in one of the quarters of Vienna showed that from 6 to 8 per cent of the children received only one meal a day or one third of what a child really needs in order to keep well and thrive. Hence one can see that if the American aid were stopped the consequences to the children of Austria would be disastrous. The present funds and supplies will permit the feeding to continue until August.

Last Friday 600 tons of American food were received from Rotterdam and 500 tons are on the way from the same port. The food is almost invariably good. No complaints have been made as to the 20,000 tons received. Out of 3000 tons of condensed milk, only a dozen cans were found to have fermented. One brand was found to be delicate, that is, it could not be boiled safely, so it was

cut off the purchasing list. The receiving and distributing organization is almost perfect and the losses are so small that they are disregarded. The pilage and waste are practically infinitesimal. WORK PURELY CHARITABLE

But small as the losses in the American kitchens are, they exceed the combined aid of all the other organizations, a fact which shows the extent of the American aid. The weekly consumption of food during the next few weeks will be about 227 tons. This relief was started in Washington, \$3,500,000 being taken from the profits of the United States Grain corporation. It is a purely charitable organization. Recently a Swiss committee examined a branch of the work in Linz and the members pronouncing it 100 per cent perfect, turned over their supplies to the Americans.

The relief administration is preparing to distribute 50,000 clothing outfits to the children. There are overcoats, shoes and woolen stockings. As each child is card indexed the organization is familiar with the condition of all and it will be a simple task to see who are in need of the clothes.

This enormous relief is making an excellent impression in central Europe. American stock is high and Americans are pointed out as the only ones who crystallize their sympathy for starving Europe into real tangible aid. The alleged failure of the American principle of the free self determination of people at the peace conference turned many Europeans against Americans. Such charitable work, aside from its humanitarian interest, is helping to restore faith in American sincerity. At least the families of 800,000 children in Vienna are going to be good friends of the "Americanische."

## X-Ray Movie Cameras Show Inner Organs Of Animals at Work

Paris, Feb. 23.—By a combination of X-rays and the "Movie" camera, two French scientists, Doctors Lorman and Commanchon, have perfected an apparatus by which it is possible to obtain films revealing the inside of the animal body full working.

The slightest details, such as the beating of the heart, operation of the digestive organs and the working of the lungs are accurately reflected on the screen.

Most of the experiments thus far have been made with large dogs. No tests have yet been made with the human body, owing to the difficulty of applying the X-rays in conjunction with the film photography. However, the inventors assert they are confident they will solve this problem before long.

## Murmansk in Revolt; Reds Capture Town
