Four Robberies Are Reported but Loot Value Is Not High

Meeting to Oppose Vaccination—Organizers of the league to "protect the public school children from medical and ecclesiastical exploitation" have called a meeting for Tuesday night at 8 o'clock in the assembly hall of the Multnomah, when permanent organization will be effected. The league is being formed similar to that already in operation in California and is one of the direct forms of opposition to the recent vaccination requirement in the schools.

Williamina Hard Hit—The "flu" epidemic has struck Williamina and nearly the entire population is affected. The public schools are closed and no church services are being held. The country surrounding Williamina is also suffering from the epidemic. In some localities nearly every family has one or more ill. In one family the mother and nine children were ill in bed at one time.

Wheeler Gives Lecture—A "lecture-ette," "The One, Only Underlying Principle in All Good Music," will be given by Roy Marion Wheeler, under auspices of the Schumann society, Tuesday night, Feb. 24, at room A, Central library, Tenth and Yamhill streets. Mrs. Mary Steven Martin will play piano solos and Mrs. San Juel Crawford will sing. There is no charge and the public is cordially invited to attend.

Williams on Rate Committee—Fred Williams of the Oregon public service commission has been appointed a member of the railroad rates committee by the National Association of Railroad and Utilities Commissioners, with headquarters at Chicago. There are seven members of the committee, and practically all sections of the United States are represented.

Professor DeBusk Will Resign—Dr. B. W. DeBusk, professor of secondary education at the University of Oregon, will resign from the state child welfare commission. His place on the commission will be taken by Dr. Franklin Thomas, director of the school of social service at Portland. Overwork was given by Dr. DeBusk as his reason for resigning.

White Salmon Favors Bridge—The White Salmon Commercial club has passed a resolution favoring the proposed bridge between Hood River and White Salmon, forming a link between the Columbia and North Bank highways, and to do whatever is necessary to aid Hood River in the project.

Students Organize Clubs—University of Oregon men are taking an active interest in the coming presidential campaign, with the organization on the campus of Lowden and Hoover clubs. Buttons for Lowden are numerous and the Hoover club has been busy for some time.

Auto Driver Arrested as Drunk—Austin Stowell was arrested at Broadway and Morrison street Sunday night by Patrolman Tilton on a charge of being drunk. Stowell was driving a machine while intoxicated, according to the police. He was able to drive to the police station, under supervision of the patrolman.

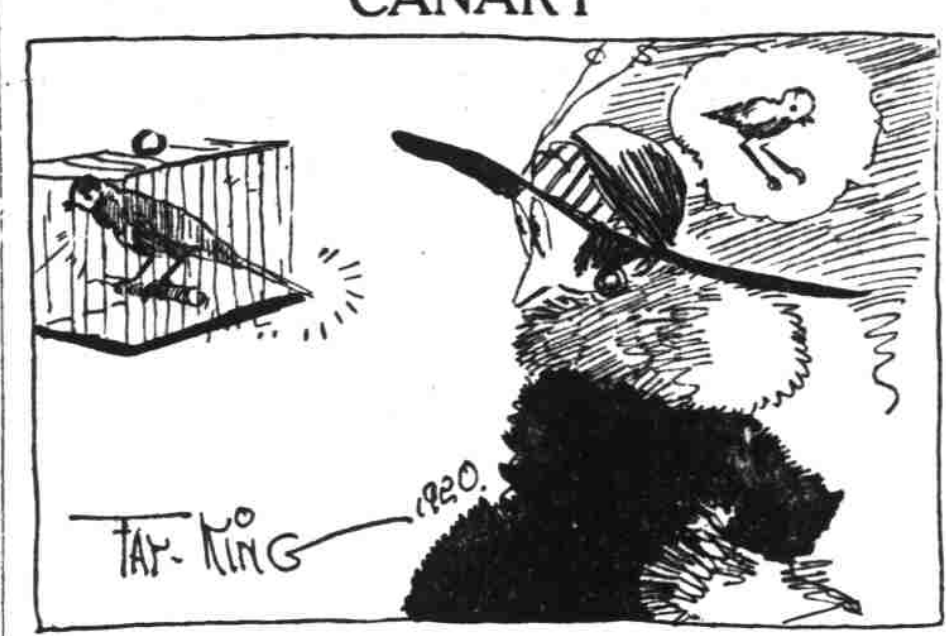

Labor Notes

FRANK E. COULTER of the metal trades and secretary of the Land and Labor league of Oregon, attended the "Triple Alliance" conference in Seattle last week as fraternal delegate.

The Metal Trade council will elect a president Tuesday evening to succeed D. M. Ellis, resigned. The council had adopted resolutions condemning the sedition bill now before congress.

The Central Labor council has under consideration a resolution to admit members of unions as visitors. It excluded the public in order to keep out newspaper reporters some weeks ago.

Organized labor in this city is to carry on a campaign of education against the American plan of conducting industries and manufacturing establishments.

The decision of Circuit Judge McCourt regulating the right to picket will be appealed to the supreme court.

The long drawn out jurisdictional dispute between the Shipwrights and the Carpenters has been amicably settled.

Mrs. Nina Avenet Williams, wife of William Williams, a well-known representative of the Boilermakers, died at Kelso, Wash., Monday last at the age of 25. The funeral was held Friday afternoon at the Finley chapel, attended by many friends and by representatives of the Central Labor council and other labor organizations.

Income Tax Evaders Will Be Prosecuted Collector Declares

Penalties for evasion of proper income tax returns will be stiff, according to Milton A. Miller, collector of internal revenue, who has just received advice from New York telling of a trial in federal court there.

Hyman Benowitz, cotton jobber, paid penalties in court amounting to \$46,470, including a \$2000 fine for perjury, \$10,000 for evasion of the income tax law and an increase of 50 per cent on his original tax of \$67,299. Benowitz pleaded guilty to keeping two sets of books. In addition to the fines and penalties, he will lose his citizenship and spend one day in jail.
