CHANDLER GOES HOME WITH GOOD WORD FOR REED

Cincinnati Educator Pleased With Local Treatment at College, and Portland Delights Visitor.

Dr. Frank W. Chandler, dean of the college of liberal arts at the University of Cincinnati, departed for his home Monday night after entertaining and being entertained by Reed college faculty and students. His "get acquainted" visit did not result in his immediate selection as president of the Portland institution, for, under the terms of the arrangement for Dr. Chandler's visit here both he and the college board of trustees reserved time "to think it over," as James B. Kerr, member of the board today said.

There had, in fact, been no intention of closing a contract with Dr. Chandler. The Reed board will consider the eastern educator's fitness for the presidency and, should he be found suitable, a formal invitation will be sent him. If Dr. Chandler likes what he found here he will accept the presidency. The dean was delighted with conditions at the college and with Portland, he said prior to his departure Monday night. He sounded what he believes to be the keynote of Reed's position in educational affairs when he declared: "To thrive, the college must serve the city. It must attain the faith of the community through community service to a point where it will be wholly a part of the community, protected and sponsored by it. Your city and your college are delightful."

Dr. Chandler addressed the Reed student body at a meeting Monday morning, but left no hint as to how he will consider an offer of the presidency should it be made.

Mr. Kerr anticipates early correspondence with Dr. Chandler regarding the position vacated by the resignation of Dr. William T. Foster.

Eugene Teachers Oppose Retention Of Superintendent

Eugene, Feb. 24.—War has been declared by the Grade Teachers' association of Eugene on W. R. Rutherford, school superintendent. At a meeting held Monday afternoon the teachers discussed what they termed "the present critical situation." In resolutions they declared that harmony with the present school administration was out of the question and that without harmony no progress could be expected. The grade teachers voted and informed the board of directors that should Rutherford be retained as superintendent another year, under no circumstances would they accept situations in the Eugene schools next year.
