

LOCAL MERCHANTS HEAR OUTLINE OF COMMUNITY PLANS

The large employers of labor are interested in the success of community service was evidenced by the fact that 30 of them gathered Wednesday morning at the Chamber of Commerce to hear presented the plans and purposes of this new organization. William F. Woodward, president of the Portland Community Service association, presided and outlined the work as a continuation of the war camp community service on a peace time basis, experience having taught the workers in the war organization that what was useful and pleasurable to the soldiers and sailors in recreation, sport and self-improvement is as much needed by the 10,000 or more young men and women employed in Portland, who are without homes.

"If the big employers of Portland will catch the vision of community service and make possible the program which has been suggested, they will go a long way toward solving their labor problems, I predict," said Mr. Woodward.

"If I didn't believe in community service as a grand thing for the young people in my employ I would believe in it as a good investment from the standpoint of dollars and cents for my firm," said J. H. Joyce. "My observation is that employees do more and better work when they have the right sort of entertainment during their leisure hours."

Albany, Or., Feb. 25.—Purchase of 34 acres of ground formerly used for the Round-Up here, was decided upon Tuesday by Linn county fair board to be used as a site for the coming county fair next fall.

Five large barns and a central pavilion will be erected before the opening of the fair. The pavilion will be used for industrial exhibits and the administration building. H. S. Hofer, manager of the Greater Albany shows met with the board and his shows were engaged for the fair.

A large track for racing will be constructed probably in time for the fair next year.

White Collar Clerks Decide on Overalls As Official Uniform

Albany, Or., Feb. 25.—White collars, tailored suits and similar habiliments will no longer adorn the persons of the male clerks employed in the local post office if the plans for the "overall brigade" initiated here mature.

Following the plan of the corduroy clubs, organized in California, the clerks in the postoffice who are backing the organization here plan to wear overalls while performing their daily duties until prices of clothes have lowered to a more reasonable scale.

Chamber at Medford To Be Reorganized

Medford, Feb. 25.—The board of directors of the Medford Chamber of Commerce has entered into a contract with the American city bureau, whose headquarters are in New York city, to conduct a campaign for the chamber's expansion and reorganization into a first class modern community service organization, with 400 active members, paying annual dues of \$25 each. In addition to the \$10,000 realized from membership fees the bureau contracts to raise a budget fund of \$10,000 to be subscribed by business men and private interests who would be benefitted by the enlarged and more active chamber. The bureau's men are here.

Stock of Chickens From O. A. C. Sent To Distant Climes

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Feb. 25.—Fame of the egg-producing poultry stock of the Oregon Agricultural college has apparently spread throughout the world.

Two shipments of Barred Plymouth Rocks have been made to Australia by the poultry husbandry department of the college. Four shipments of White Leghorns and Barred Rocks to Hawaii were made by the same steamer, one to the government station.

L. H. Pettit and Albert Moore, prominent breeders of poultry in Australia, have been securing stock from the college for several years, and are now advertising the O. A. C. stock for sale in Australia. One of these breeders entered a pen of 10 hens in a contest in Australia

and obtained a record of more than 200 eggs a hen.

Gem L. Henquin of Liege, Belgium, has written to Professor James Dryden of the college, famous for the production of high producing birds, asking for "some hints about keeping fowls on a similar scale as you have in America, but not in so large flocks."

According to the writer, the German armies destroyed practically all poultry in Belgium.

He is an attorney and at present is practicing on a permit, recently extended until the supreme court can hold a hearing on his request for admission to the bar. 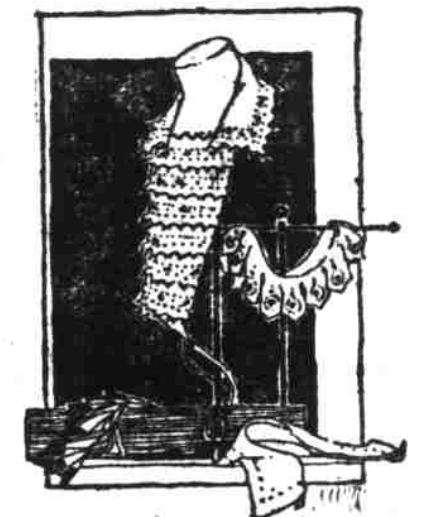
