

BENSON GROUNDS FOUND SUITED FOR VOCATIONAL WORK

"We find the grounds and facilities available for carrying on the work of rehabilitating disabled soldiers at Benson Polytechnic school, excellently suited to our needs," said E. F. Johnson, supervisor of training of the federal board of vocational education, after he and Claude H. Anderson, district vocational officer, and Fred Hamilton, supervisor of replacement training, had spent the morning inspecting the building.

Resulting from a recent agreement with the school board, the federal board is preparing to get some of the war department machinery from the salvage department and install it at Benson for the use of disabled soldiers, the same to be taken over by the school on the termination of the use of the school by the federal board.

"We have met with splendid cooperation from the school board," said Johnson, "and we expect to carry on our work without any interference whatever with the regular functioning of the school and at no cost whatever to the board. We expect in another year to have 150 disabled soldiers in training at the school. We even hope to develop the best trade and industrial school this side of Minneapolis and at Minneapolis will eventually draw students from all the states west of the Mississippi river, with the exception of a few states around Minneapolis."

Members of the federal board left Portland for Seattle at 1 o'clock this afternoon, after completing their inspection of Benson Polytechnic school.

Application for Portland Railway Extension Denied

Salem, Feb. 27.—The application of the city of Portland for an extension of the Portland street railway lines from their present terminus in St. Johns to the public docks, a distance of approximately one mile, is denied in an order issued by the Oregon public service commission Thursday. The denial of the extension order is made by the commission upon a stipulation entered into between the city of Portland and the Portland street railway system, which admits the existence of a public necessity for the construction of the extension as applied for, but also admits the lack of sufficient patronage to justify the investment which such an extension would entail. In the stipulation the street railway company expresses its readiness to operate at actual cost an extension such

as is asked if the commission of public docks will build the line, which would cost approximately \$35,000.

Farm Hands Line Up With Labor Unions

Washington, Feb. 27.—(U. P.)—Farm hands, now receiving the highest wages in history, are organizing labor unions in many sections of the country, a survey showed today. Wages demanded are discouraging food production, the agriculture department asserted in an official statement.

Babe Injured on Birthday
Pendleton, Feb. 27.—Two-year-old Carroll Kennedy suffered severe burns on both feet Thursday, her second birthday, when she tipped a kettle of boiling water over the stove. No permanent injury is expected.

Suicide Is Father Of Coquille Woman

Marshfield, Feb. 27.—Jean Barandon, French chemist, who shot himself in New York, is the father of Mrs. J. H. Dalen of Coquille. Dalen served in the United States aviation corps and in France married Dr. Barandon's daughter. He now operates a spruce cut-up mill in Coquille. Dr. Barandon was for a time in Coquille with his daughter. Dalen says he is a highly educated man and a fine chemist and was much embarrassed because he could not properly master English.

Byron, Convicted of Land Frauds, Puts Up \$6000 More in Bail

C. L. Byron, twice convicted on land fraud charges, today posted an additional \$6000 bail fixed by the federal court when a stay of execution of the sentence imposed upon him here was granted. The stay came about through the necessity for Byron's appearance at Seattle, where, although once convicted and now under sentence, he is to be tried again. The sentence against Byron is 15 months at McNeil's island and a fine of \$1000. It was alleged that Byron's fraud scheme was an ingenious method of fleecing prospective land buyers through the mails and in person and the convictions against him now, according to his attorney, P. V. Davis of Seattle, are sufficient to cause his detention for a life term. Davis is in Portland today
