Northwest Lightweights Billed To Clash In Ten-Round Contest Wednesday Night At Heilig

BENJAMIN TO BOX ANDERSON IN TEN ROUND GO WED. EVE

Vancouver Battler in Condition for Battle With Spokane Lightweight Who Took Eastern Fans by Storm—Tickets Will Be Placed on Sale Monday—Record House Is Expected.

JOE BENJAMIN, Northwest lightweight boxer, who took Eastern fight fans by storm under the management of Billy Gibson, manager of Benny Leonard, holder of the world's lightweight championship title, is confident of beating Freddie Anderson, the Vancouver battler, in their 10-round encounter Wednesday night. This bout heads the Portland Boxing commission's smoker in the Heilig theatre.

Benjamin is not expecting an easy victory over Anderson, who is coming, and has been training faithfully for the contest. For the past two weeks, Joe has been working out in the Milwaukee arena, taking on the best available sparring partners.

Gibson is scheduled to arrive here Monday to assist Benjamin in putting on the finishing touches for the contest.

FREDDIE IN SHAPE

Anderson has left no stone unturned to put himself in the best of condition for the battle. His trainer, Dick Dusenberry, has him in the best possible shape for the battle and is allowing him to ease up in his training for the bout. Anderson is regarded as a corner by many local ring followers and some of them believe that his punching ability may prove the undoing of Benjamin.

The Vancouver battler put up one of the greatest ring contests witnessed here in recent years when he fought Peter Mitchell to a 10-round draw a short time back. Anderson came back strong in the bout, after Mitchell had piled up a big lead and earned a draw.

OTHER BOUTS GOOD

Matchmaker Grant has lined up some good goes to back up the main event. He has signed Frankie Rodgers of Seattle for the 10-round semi-windup against Puggy Morton, who made quite a hit on his first appearance here.

Kid Carson, an Eastern welterweight, will tackle Fred Gilbert of Bend, Or., in a six-round preliminary contest. Carson is said to be a corner and if he beats Gilbert he will be given another opportunity to display his ring skill.

Irving Gleason of Seattle will meet Aberdeen Jimmy Duffy in a six-round bout and Ted Hoke and Earl Conners will box the curtain raiser.

Cincinnati, Feb. 28.—Will Hod Eller be the demon he was in 1919, or will the new pitching rules reduce his effectiveness? Will he be classed with the ordinary slabs? Eller's pet, the shine-ball, is killed off by the changed statutes, and he will have to go ahead with the usual set of deliveries. Hod claims that he has something ready to balance the loss of the shine-ball, but it seems a dubious proposition.

BASEBALL PEACE INSURES MAJOR'S OF BANNER YEAR

Crack-of Bat Eagerly Awaited by Fans; Outlook for Season Held Bright for Some Clubs by Eastern Critics; Reds Will Have Some Lineup in the National Race.

NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—(I. N. S.)—Now that the American league factious have laid down their war clubs and the much battered Dove of Peace is roosting serenely over baseball once again, the fan is turning his undivided attention toward the coming pennant races.

The squabbles of the magnates have never been much of a "dish" for the fan. As a rule, he doesn't care a tinker's rap whether the "mags" pull each other's noses or not. He's fed up with that kind of baseball gossip. Hence, the coming of peace was welcome.

With the spring training season almost here, however, fandom is eagerly devouring all of the "advance dope." 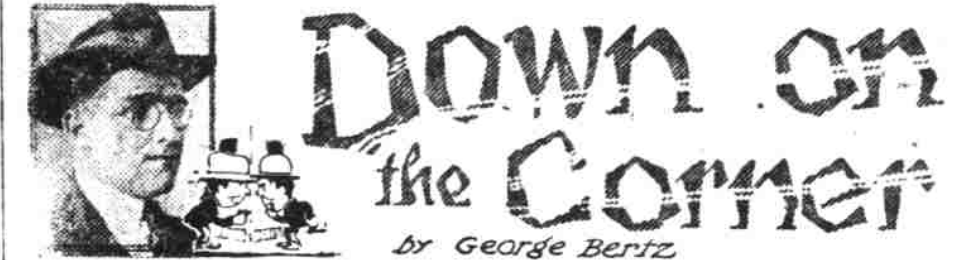

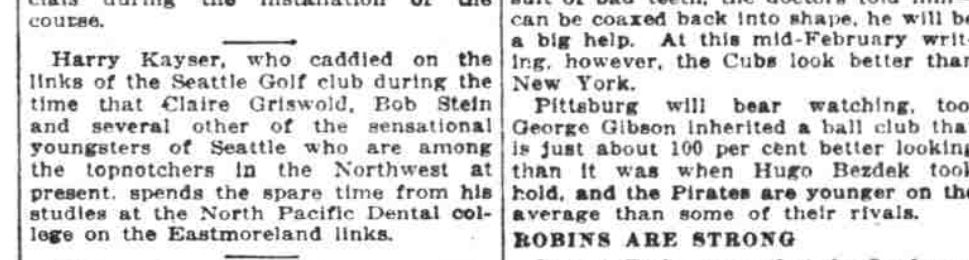
