Mrs. Maxwell H. Houser has returned to Portland from San Francisco and is at her home in Montgomery drive.



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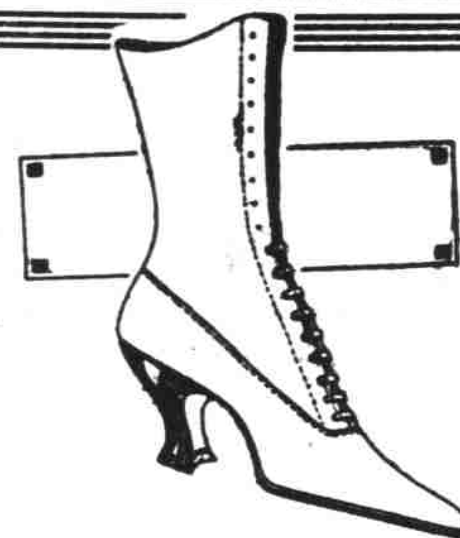
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
