



Younger Women Steer Course of League of Voters

THE truth of Victor Hugo's sage epigram, "There is one thing more than kings and armies—the idea whose time has come to move," has never been better exemplified than by the ultimate outcome of the suffrage movement, the idea of which started to move more 50 years ago and has gone steadily forward until it is now a part of the constitution of the nation.

The celebration of the victory, in the form of the convention of the National Women's Suffrage association recently held in Chicago, was a notable event in many respects and none of these was more significant than the dropping from the active ranks of the old suffrage leaders, who have given their time and ability in leading the great movement to victory, to the newer and younger element.

The convention wished to elect Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, retiring president of the suffrage organization, head of the League of Women Voters, but Mrs. Catt said that she felt the time had come for her to retire from leadership, declaring that she would like to see the older leaders in all women's activities gracefully retire in favor of younger women and that she felt that the old leaders staying in power too long hampered greatly the advancement of the work at hand and made it impossible for new leaders to be developed. Mrs. Catt declared, however, that she still wanted to work, and accepted the chairmanship of the committee on elections and election laws. She was made honorary chairman of the league.

The new league is headed up wholly by young women, women filled with the zeal and enthusiasm of youth, with splendid educational backgrounds and with a forward looking program that promises much for the success of the organization.

Mrs. Maud Wood Park, the newly elected chairman of the league, brings to that office an active connection with the suffrage movement, covering a period of several years. She was appointed congressional chairman of the National Women's Suffrage association in 1917 and for the past two years has been intensively campaigning for the federal suffrage movement, her "front door lobby" being a notable feature of the campaign. More than any other person, Mrs. Park is responsible for the growth of suffrage among college women. She is a graduate of Radcliffe, '28, and a native Bostonian. Upon Mrs. Park's invitation, Miss Alice Stone Blackwell, the well known Boston suffragist, spoke at Radcliffe and interested Mrs. Park so much that she attended the meeting of the National Women's Suffrage association when it assembled to celebrate the eightieth birthday of Susan B. Anthony. So enthused did she become that she at once wrote letters to 14 Radcliffe women to arouse an interest in a suffrage society among college women, and from this small nucleus grew the College Equal Suffrage league, an organization with a membership numbering many thousands, among whom are prominent college women from all over the country.

Mrs. C. B. Simmons, president of the Oregon Equal Suffrage alliance, who attended the convention in Chicago, announces that a large luncheon and organization meeting will be held in Astoria, hereafter to launch in Oregon the League of Women Voters, which she hopes will become state-wide in its scope and interest and will include organization of women of all interests and from all walks of life.

London Professor Asserts That Open Neck Blouses Healthful

The "pneumonia blouse," as it is wrongly called, worn by women, does not cause pneumonia but is conducive to good health. "The open neck acts as a chimney to the clothes, letting heat and moisture escape," writes Professor Leonard Hill, who has been making researches for the British medical research committee.

After bemoaning the fetid that women's open neck styles are dangerous, Professor Hill goes on to give more pointers about healthy clothing. He writes: "Tests show that to conserve the warmth of the body, it matters little whether clothes are made of linen, cotton or wool, so long as they are light and cellular and allow free evaporation. 'Flannellette' is just as warm as flannel, although it does not seem so warm when first put on. But a wet wool garment is warmer than a wet cotton one. 'For ordinary wear by people who do not get wet or perspire greatly, cotton or linen is just as healthy as wool. 'The drying of clothes is of great importance, for dry clothes become warm on taking up moisture from the skin. That is why people put their heads under the clothes on getting into bed on cold nights—the moisture of the breath heating the dry bed clothes.'"
